

**SHAFFER.**

This is the name of an individual who was elected on the so-called "Whisky Ticket," for the office of County Commissioner in the eastern district of Ford county. He is a prohibitionist, but he sought and desired an election to office by the friends of the "whisky ticket." In consideration of this support, Shaffer pledged himself to vote to award the county printing to the **DODGE CITY TIMES**. This paper supported the "whisky ticket" with the name of Shaffer printed thereon. Now this hypocritical fanatic makes objections to the **TIMES** because it does not endorse prohibition—because we are not a political, hypocritical, lying demagogue. At the meeting of the Board of County Commissioners on Monday, Shaffer violated his obligations by proving treacherous to those who had placed him in position. He has shown himself to be a man devoid of confidence and principle. His ingratitude lies in the fact that he promised to support the **TIMES** in consideration of the support given him. He has proved false to N. G. He sold his principles to obtain an election, and he sold his obligations for a very small consideration. A man of this caliber cannot be trusted to manage public affairs. His soul is not broad enough for a public capacity. The confines of a small fanatical set is his limit.

Shaffer is a sort of small intriguing politician. Here is his letter, written previous to the election to County Clerk Myton:

**SPEARVILLE, Nov 1, 1881.**

**FRIEND MYTON:**—I have been requested to write you in reference to putting my name on the ticket for County Commissioner. I think I would like to do so, and if elected will try to discharge the duties of that office faithfully. If it is put on please have some small pasters printed so as to paste them over Imel's name instead of scratching, and see that they are put on before the tickets are distributed. I would not like to risk scratching. Send some to me and I will see them distributed, and will paste my name on them. As to favoring the **TIMES**, it is my favorite paper, and as a matter of course I should favor it. Mikesell will go over to the German Settlement this week to work for the ticket.

Please send me some extra pasters. I can make use of a few perhaps. Also your own name, if you have any. Sometimes a man will vote for a friend, who cannot be prevailed upon to vote the whole ticket. Do not fail to have the pasters printed and put on the tickets. I will pay for the printing. Anything that I can do for you or the ticket I will do cheerfully. Respectfully yours,

Shaffer is a paster—one of those shrewd men who would resort to any means to secure an election. He would paste his name over the name of his opponent, thereby obtaining votes by deceit and fraud. We did not print any "pasters" for Shaffer, but suppose his scheme was successful, as he was elected.

If the friends of prohibition seek to enhance their cause by proscribing the **DODGE CITY TIMES**, it is all right; we accept the situation. People who accept favors under such circumstances will find that it is a poor rule that does not conform to physical and natural laws, which have the inevitable force of compensation. Whether in a good or bad cause, there isn't money enough in the Ford county treasury to deter or change our course, and we shall remain steadfast to our principles and true to those who repose confidence in us.

**DEATH OF A. A. JACKSON**—Adm A. Jackson died in this city on Saturday last, of pneumonia after a few days illness. The remains were buried in Prairie Grove Cemetery, and were followed to the grave by a large number of citizens. The Odd Fellows and Fire Company were in the procession, which were preceded by the Dodge City Silver Cornet Band. The deceased had been employed by Walter Streeter. He was about 32 years of age. A sorrowing wife is left to mourn his loss.

At a special meeting of the Dodge City fire company, held on Monday, Jan. 9, 1882, Messrs. F. J. Durand, Fred. T. Wenie, Henry Wright, H. E. Grylson and T. B. Rice were appointed a committee to draft resolutions respecting the death of A. A. Jackson, a charter member, and so offer respect and condolence to the bereaved widow and relatives of deceased. The following preamble and resolutions were drafted by the committee and unanimously adopted.

WHEREAS, It has pleased God in His infinite wisdom to remove from our midst A. A. Jackson, a beloved brother and one of our number, and

WHEREAS, As such brother and member we deeply mourn his loss as the loss of one who during life was ever prompt and attentive to the post of duty; ever cheerful, kind and courteous, and who enjoyed the friendship and esteem of those who knew him; therefore, be it

Resolved, That we mourn his loss as that of a good and faithful member of our company, one cut down in the prime of a vigorous life, whose cheerful countenance and lively disposition will be greatly missed at our happy gatherings.

Resolved, That as a token of our high esteem and universal respect for our deceased member, that our place of meeting and our fire implements be draped in mourning for thirty days.

Resolved, That we extend our deep and heartfelt sympathy to the widow and relatives of our deceased member and brother in this their sad affliction.

Resolved, That the secretary of this company be instructed to have the foregoing preamble and resolutions inserted in both of our city papers, and copies forwarded to the widow and relatives of our deceased member.
