South America is destined to be one of the great beef producing regions of the world. It is estimated that in two years from now the number of cattle in the Argentine Confederation will number 28,000,000, against 13,000,000 in 1877. The enormous increase in the number of cattle has brought down the price so that good fat steers are selling at \$6 and \$8.

Judge Martin of Topeka made a new and stringent ruling Saturday in liquor cases. He said that any man who carries a key, and with it gains admission to rooms where whiskey is kept, and violates the law by drinking and putting his money as pay for drinks in a tin box, or any man who makes keys, knowing that they are to be used for this purpose, or puts locks for such keys on doors leading into rooms where liquor is kept, or any man who in any way connects himself with a key that unlocks doors into rooms where he can get liquor to drink is just as much a violation of the prohibitory law and just as liable for prosecution as is the man who furnishes the liquor to be drunk. Judge Martin evidently believes that the way to repeal a law is to enforce it, and yet his ruling is nothing more than a fair interpretation of the spirit and intent of the law.

A New Texas Party.
The Executive Committee of the white Republicans at Fort Worth, Texas, on May 27th, issued an address to the Republicans of the State setting forth the reasons for forming the party. There are clubs in thirty-three counties, numbering over 7,000 influential white Republicans now organized. The address sets forth that after twenty years of freedom and labor by the whites for them the colored race does not appreciate what has been done for them; that they have drawn the color line; have not voted the Republican ticket in counties where they are three to one; that they are bought and sold in the political market; that disastrous failure has resulted to Republicans in Texas because of this lack of principle and demands to rule; that the colored voter has been used in the South to bolster office-holders; to create factions that the party might continue only strong enough, so that unprincipled white and colored men might hold offices; that the colored men has learned the theory. "What are we hear for, if not for the office," and knows no higher patriotism; that many white Republicans refuse to act with the party on these accounts; that the party has been crippled, and it is impossible to increase its strength; therefore they cut forth from the negroes and form the white Republican party on the platform of the National Republican party, of equality of all in law, education of the masses and protection to the American laborer. They call for organization in all counties of the State, and the placing in the field of a full State ticket.

THE CHICAGO CONVENTION.
The National Republican Convention assembled in Chicago on Tuesday, and a temporary organization effected with Mr. Lynch, of Mississippi, as temporary chairman, and Mr. Sabin as temporary secretary. The selection of Lynch is a triumph of the Arthur men, the competition being between Lynch, an Arthur man, and Powell Clayton, of Arkansas, a delegate in favor of Mr. Blaine. The convention adjourned until 11 o'clock Wednesday morning, but at the time of going to press yesterday we were unable to gain further information.

Still on Deck.

There has been much talk of late about the State Temperance Union being disorganized, demoralized, and about to go out of business, &c., &c. I desire to say that no officer of the Union has resigned. The Glanders in Kansas.
The number of cases of glanders in the state is becoming alarmingly great, especially as there have been three well authenticated cases in the human family. Two men in Ottawa county have died of this terrible disease. A justice of the peace was attacked by the disease, and within twelve hours after it developed itself was a corpse, after intense suffering. Another case is now reported from Jackson county, that of a little girl who was inoculated accidentally through a slight scratch on her hand by a pet horse. She lingered but a short time, when death kindly put an end to her sufferings. In all cases is this disease fatal to man. Reports come to Dr. Holcomb from nineteen counties of the state where the disease is known to exist or is suspected, sometimes the symptoms are so blind as to deceive the veterinarian. One case was that where Dr. Holcomb was called on to examine a horse, which had his special attention not been called to it, he would never have suspected the presence of the disease. It was known that when ever this horse changed hands glanders followed in other horses. The last owner suspecting it, called the aid of the veterinarian, who, with all his skill, was in doubt. The owner, however, said: "Order the d-d horse killed." It was done, and upon post mortem examination, his head was found reeking with rotteness. This one horse had spread the disease in several localities, his track being as noticeable as the path of a cyclone through the state. So far as reported there have been only one or two men who have objected to the killing of their animals, all the others considering the total loss a gain to themselves and their neighbors. The law does not recompense the owner for animals destroyed, but the additional safety to mankind is reward enough. There are many cases of suspected glanders reported, and as fast as possible Dr. Holcomb inspects the animals, and orders them killed whenever he finds the disease.
