—The A. O. U. W. lodge of this city will elect officers on next Monday evening. All members of the order in the city are cordially invited to be present.

—Mr. Wilson Soule spent a few days last week in the city, returning Sunday afternoon to his home in Rochester. He accompanied J. W. Gilbert on his return from Europe.

—R. E. Rice, who has been employed for several months in Pueblo, Colorado, took advantage of the cheap rates and is now visiting his old friends and neighbors in this city.

—Miss Fannie Thome, our county superintendent of schools, returned home last Thursday, from her trip to Cincinnati, Ohio. Her many friends gladly welcome her home.

—The GLOBE-REPUBLICAN extends thanks most heartily to the mayor and city council for the favor they saw fit to bestow upon us in awarding the contract for the city printing.

—Miss Anna Edwards one of the teachers of our city schools, left for Larned and Pittsburg, Kansas, yesterday, where she will spend vacation with friends and relatives.

—Mrs. B. F. Milton and children departed for Clinton, Missouri, yesterday, to which place they go to visit relatives and friends at their former home. We wish them an enjoyable trip and safe return.

—Judge Frost came down from Garden City Saturday, and visited with his family who have been here, the guests of Mr. and Mrs. A. J. Anthony for a week. They returned home Sunday afternoon.

—Monday morning the heaviest rain of the season fell, soaking the ground thoroughly. It came quite slowly and a large part went into the ground. It has given the croakers the lock-jaw and spread a smile over the farmers' faces.

—Mr. B. F. Milton, one of the leading democratic statesmen of this city, departed for Boston, Massachusetts, last night, on business connected with the Pioneer Loan and Trust Company, of which he is the legal representative.

—Mr. E. H. Merwin, assistant postmaster at Larned for the past six years, has accepted a situation in the Canal Company's office. We have known Mr. Merwin for several years and can testify of his qualifications and straight business methods. The Gilbert Brothers are to be congratulated in securing the services of so competent a man.

—W. E. Hendricks, one of our prominent legal lights, went to Topeka yesterday, where he will file a motion in the United States circuit court to open up the judgment rendered against the city on the Grant scrip case. He proposes to visit Leavenworth before he returns. We suggest that he take in Quindaro on his trip and get weighed on the hay scales before he returns.

—It is but little over a month until the Fourth of July. Shall our people celebrate, and forget for a while to whine about hard times? We hope they shall. At the best there will be but a comparatively small amount of money to spend then and there will consequently be need of more work and planning. So if Dodge city celebrates Independence Day she must commence work early.

—Jas. A. Arment, census enumerator for the city, will commence his rounds Monday, June 2. So let the people prepare answers to the questions which will be propounded.

—Saturday night a citizen's meeting was called at the court house to discuss the present situation of the Presbyterian college. A plan of procedure was finally agreed upon which may be briefly stated as follows: The board of trustees to secure title to the building and premises, pay off all just liens, receive the balance of the endowment fund, then send a man east to solicit funds to make up the endowment agreed upon.

—With the assistance of Judge Abbott and twelve other good men and true, eight of our most prominent citizens—prominent for a week at least—broke into the county jail; and the court insists, with emphasis, that they shall remain there from thirty days to six months, besides adding a little fine on the side to pay for damages sustained. But this not saying that prohibition prohibits.

—The missionary society of the Presbyterian church, which gave the Trade Carnival and Ye Olde Folkes Concerte, will, because of the urgent request of many of our business men and citizens, do as they agreed on the night of the entertainment, give it again; wishing thereby to please those who stood by the management in their great undertaking. The next entertainment will be better than the first, for the drill, though excellent, can be improved, and the concert will be entirely new. The date will be given later.

—Capt. J. H. Finlay, who has just returned to the city from his trip to Warsaw, Illinois, to which place he was called on account of the sickness and death of his father-in-law, Mr. Hill, will without doubt, sever his business connections with this city, as he will take charge of the extensive business interests formerly operated by Mr. Hill. We regret to lose the captain from our midst as he is an agreeable gentleman, a good lawyer, and above all, one of the most congenial fellows we have ever met. We hope his absence from Dodge is only temporary.

—Last Saturday night two of the prisoners confined in the cell in the northeast corner of the county jail, Pifer and Sam Kimball, succeeded in breaking out by cutting through the ceiling up into the county clerk's office and then jumping out of the window. It is quite certain that they had outside aid, as the implement by which they effected their escape was a large knife with a saw cut on the back. Pifer has been tracked and will probably be re-captured but no trace of Kimball has been found. The latter was under a thirty day sentence for selling liquor, while Pifer was awaiting incarceration in the penitentiary for twelve years.

—Yesterday morning we received with the compliments of Mrs. J. T. Metcalf, a handful of the nicest strawberries that ever grew in Ford county. One of the largest measured four inches in circumference and they were of finer flavor, too, than any brought from a distance. From this and many other experiments it is evident that strawberries can be raised here as successfully as anywhere, when the water can be had at the proper time and sufficient quantity. There is a small fortune for someone who will plant a few acres under the ditch to strawberries. After supplying the town and country there is a limitless market west of us in which our people can compete to advantage above all others. Who will start this industry?

—The closing exercises of the city schools were attended with the usual interest. The afternoon entertainment was unusually well attended and the little people who furnished it acquitted themselves creditably. In the evening the opera house was comfortably filled, notwithstanding the rain. The speaking and music were of a character to interest all classes of listeners more than in the afternoon but we doubt if they were better appreciated, not that the high school pupils fell below their juniors in merit, but on account of the rain beating on the roof or some other cause not near all could hear. But the advancement that is apparent, even in the entertainment, is something to be proud of; and we are glad that the board have seen fit to secure Professor Webb's services for another year.

—The passenger trains on the Santa Fe have generally been two or three hours late the last week. The trains are made up with twelve to fifteen coaches besides baggage, express and mail cars, and all loaded to their full capacity. Everybody is traveling. In fact rates are so low that only the wealthy can afford to stay at home. Our city is full of strangers viewing the country, and some of them rejoice in our prosperity to the extent of liberal investments; and many of our citizens have gone away for business or pleasure. So great is this mania for travel that we are utterly unable to keep track of the arrivals and departures. Among our citizens who have left are Mrs. B. F. Milton, who goes to Missouri; Miss Lillie Williams; Clifford Markley, to Chicago. Miss Carrie Markley, to Cincinnati; Miss Dollie Martin, Galesburg, Illinois; Miss Flora Swan, Great Bend, Kansas.

Council Proceedings.

DODGE CITY, KAS., May 21, 1890. The council met in regular session at eight o'clock p. m. Present, R. W. Evans, mayor, Chas. Beeman, P. H. Sughrue, S. Stubbs, J. J. Summersby, W. J. Fitzgerald, councilmen; absent, R. Gaede, J. T. Hubbard, councilmen.

The minutes of the last regular meeting were read and approved. The letting of the city printing was the first business taken up and the following propositions considered: To the Honorable Council of the City of Dodge City:

The Times Publishing Company agree if it is made the official paper of Dodge City to do the city printing at the legal rate less 50 per cent. discount. (Signed) TIMES PUBLISHING CO., BY JAMES MARTIN Manager.

To the Honorable Mayor and City Council of Dodge City, Kansas: Gentlemen—I will contract to do the city printing for the years 1890 and 1891 for half legal rates, which is five cents per line. Also I will do the job work, consisting of legal blanks at the same price as G. W. Crane, of Topeka, according to his printed price list. (Signed) W. F. PETILLOX.

DODGE CITY, KAS., May 8, 1890. The GLOBE-REPUBLICAN agrees to do the city printing for the period of one year from date of letting, for one-half legal rates on all ordinances and other legal publications passed by the council. The regular and special council proceedings to be published free of charge. One-half legal rates equal a sum of fifty cents for first insertion of one inch or ten lines of nonpareil type, each insertion after the first at the rate of twenty cents per ten lines nonpareil. A vote by ballot resulted favorably to the GLOBE-REPUBLICAN and the mayor named said paper as the official paper of the city for the ensuing year. The same was awarded the printing of all legal publications by the following vote on a call of the roll: Chas. Beeman, S. Stubbs, J. J. Summersby, W. J. Fitzgerald, W. C. Shinn voting eye; P. H. Sughrue voting no; J. T. Hubbard absent and not voting.

The resignation of R. Gaede, councilman from the Fourth Ward was accepted. Mr. Shinn moved that the mayor call a special election in the Fourth Ward for the election of a councilman to fill vacancy caused by the resignation of R. Gaede. Carried.

Mr. J. S. Martin in behalf of Lewis Post G. A. R., extended an invitation to the city council and all other city officials to join said post in a body in the ceremonies of the day. A motion carried asking the mayor to issue his proclamation requesting all business houses to close on May 30th from nine o'clock a. m. to four o'clock p. m.

The letting of the job work printing of the city was on motion of Mr. Sughrue postponed until next regular meeting. Mr. Shinn placed Mr. J. J. Summersby in nomination for president of the council. The gentleman was unanimously elected to that office.

The finance committee reported their approval of the police judge's report for the month of April 1890, and on motion said report was accepted and placed on file.

The committee on streets and alleys submitted the following report: We, the committee to whom was referred the petition of Samuel Swan and others requesting that the said Samuel Swan be allowed to erect and conduct a booth or fruit and confectionery stand at or near the intersection of Second Ave. and Front street, as follows: That the property owners and tenants of the property adjacent to said intersection on the west side thereof object to permission being granted according to the request of said Samuel Swan and are constrained to report adversely to said petition. W. C. SHINN Chairman, CHAS. BEEMAN, Com.

On motion the above report was adopted and placed on file. On motion the committee on streets and alleys was authorized to have such work done on the streets as was necessary and demanded immediate attention without delay for formal action of the council concerning same.

Mr. Fitzgerald moved that the city marshal be required to strictly enforce the ordinance in regard to dogs running at large in the city. Carried. The clerk read a royal mandate signed by King Rex II. and bearing the seal of the Capital City, addressed to the honorable mayor of Dodge City, Kansas, through the department of the Lord High Chancellor at Ogden, Utah, commanding the names of some of the most distinguished and beautiful of the fair ladies of Dodge City be transmitted to the Lord High Chancellor from which to make selections for the honor of assisting as Maids of Honor on the occasion of the coronation and carnival fête to take place at the royal capital July 1st, 1890. A motion carried to receive the communication and that a committee be appointed to select names in compliance with above mandate. Mayor Evans appointed W. C. Shinn, W. J. Fitzgerald and S. Stubbs, and requested said committee to report at next regular meeting.

Mr. Sughrue moved that the matter of laying the water pipe on Avenue C. in accordance with a petition on file be referred to the committee on light and water. Carried. On motion the city clerk was ordered to notify the agent of the A. T. & S. F. R. R. to repair the crossing of said railroad and Second avenue and to put said crossing on the established grade of the street.

On motion council adjourned. Attention: L. G. GROBETT, City Clerk.

Omaha, Superior and Southwestern Railroad.

A special from Superior, Nebraska, to the St. Louis Globe-Democrat, dated May 21st, says: "The civil engineers of the Freeport, Elkhorn & Missouri Valley railroad, with a corps of surveyors, started out this morning to survey a route for the extension of that road to Dodge City, Kansas, and thence to El Paso, Texas. The new road will be known as the Omaha, Superior & Southwestern, but it will be, as is also the Freeport, Elkhorn & Missouri Valley road, a part of the Chicago and Northwestern system. The distance from here to Dodge City is about 150 miles, and the route will be in an almost direct line. It is expected that the work of construction will be begun soon, and the line to Dodge City completed this summer. The new road will give the Chicago & Northwestern system great advantage in securing business from the southwest."
