Discontinued.

It will be news to most of our people that the state of Kansas has been maintaining an alleged experimental station at Garden City, but it has. Now it is to be discontinued for the whole thing has been a very unprofitable experiment to the state, and utterly worthless to the farmers of this country. The management of the station adopted ideas that have been discarded in this country years ago, and consequently the people are not a whit the wiser than if the station had never been in operation. The object of the station was to prove whether water could be pumped in sufficient quantities from deep wells to irrigate our uplands, but as there never was any water in the well this question was never settled. Then attention was turned to the velocity of wind, and it was learned that the wind did blow in western Kansas, although it was never published officially, we believe. Last summer a year ago a small quantity of broom corn was raised, which was labeled "exhibit 26, x9, z12, 1g1," etc., but which a competent judge said was all of the same grade. The only actual and real thing about the station was the salaries and expenses,—Garden City Herald.

The other "experimental" things which have cost the state some money in salaries and pumps should be abolished with the salaries too. There is an "experimental station in Ford county. We have not heard from it for a long while, and presume it too has gone dry.
