

A. J. Evans returned from Topeka Thursday evening where he spent several days trying to convince the legislature that the bill introduced authorizing the city of Cimarron to compromise its bonded indebtedness was a just and good one and ought to be passed. Judge Hoover who accompanied him, returned Friday night. The prospects for the passage of the bill is very bright and these gentlemen seem to think that if the right showing is made to the investigating committee next Monday it will go through all right.—Cimarron Jacksonian, Feb. 19.

A Senatorial committee of the Kansas Legislature, composed of Senators E. F. Wallace, T. C. Field, and M. Campbell, and clerk Ben Wallace, were in the city Monday evening, on a return from Cimarron, where the committee made an examination of the city's indebtedness. The committee left about 11 o'clock p. m., for Anthony, where they went on a similar mission. In the event of a compromise of the general indebtedness of the cities named, the legislature must provide some way for the compromise of the debt that these cities owe to the school fund of the State, on the same plan that the compromise of the other debts is made. A good portion of the school fund of the state is in bonds issued by counties unable to pay at this time. In case any portion of the school fund is cut down by reason of compromise or default, the deficiency must be made good out of the general fund of the state. Ford county does not owe the state for the purchase of school bonds.

The Dodge House.
A. H. Boyd, the new hotel proprietor, has changed the name of the Oriole Hotel to Dodge House. The name of Dodge House is familiar to Mr. Boyd, for he built the original Dodge House in 1872, and was one of its proprietors for more than ten years. The name of Dodge House was familiar to the people of the west, and in the palmy days of the city's prosperity the Dodge House had an enviable reputation. Some few years ago the Dodge House was destroyed by fire, and in christening the name of his hotel, Dodge House, Mr. Boyd preserves an old land mark and brings up pleasant recollections of the past. The old Dodge House enjoyed a patronage given to few hotels, and it is hoped Mr. Boyd will restore a business as good as that given to the Dodge House of former times. Mr. and Mrs. Boyd are meeting with good success in this new hotel, and as they have a long line of friends and acquaintances among traveling people, they will not be a great while in building up a magnificent business. They are keeping an excellent house, and have the best of accommodations.

\$300 Reward
For the recovery of Geo. B. Doolittle's body, dead or alive. He is supposed to have been murdered.

Geo. B. Doolittle is aged 35 years; height, 5 feet, 8 inches; weight, 140 pounds, light complexion, blue eyes, very light mustache. He is wearing either a plain black suit, or a brown and yellow fine checked coat and vest, with black and grey pants. He wore shoes, and a white Stetson hat (size 7 1/2). Wore a navy blue overcoat, with velvet collar, considerably worn. Is bow-legged, and has full set false upper teeth. Carried a tan colored imitation leather grip. He went to Van Buren, Arkansas, in January to buy cattle, and remained there two weeks. He then (on January 23) bought a ticket to Plummerville, Ark., and paid fare to Little Rock, Ark., since which time nothing has been heard of him.

He had between \$1,300 and \$1,400 in cash when he left Van Buren. He is insured in the Modern Woodmen of America. For his body, dead or alive, \$200 will be paid by Minneola Camp, No. 2205, M. W. A., Minneola, Kansas, and \$100 by Mrs. Doolittle, Wilburn, Kansas.
