DURRANT IS HANGED.

SHOWS RARE NERVE TO THE END.

In a Speech From the Gallows Forgives His Persecutors - Talks With Hope About Next - Emmanuel Church Murderer Becomes a Catholic.

SAN QUENTIN, Cal., Jan. 4. -At 10:35 o'clock this morning W. H. T. Durrant, generally known as Theodore Durrant, was hanged in the prison here for the murder of Blanche Lamont, one of the two young women brutally put to death in Emmanuel Baptist church in San Francisco, April 3, 1895.

Durrant, who had been received into the Roman Catholic church only a short time before the end, was marvelously cool on the scaffold. His last words were: "I am innocent."

Death appeared to be painless. His neck was broken by the fall. In fifteen minutes the body was cut down.

Warden Hale did not attempt to hurry matters, but allowed all possible time for the supreme court at Washington to take some action. Finally when word was flashed across the continent that the supreme court declined to interfere, the warden ordered the program of the day to be carried out.

The prison officials were all enthusiastic in their praise of Durrant's nerve. He proudly declined all offers of stimulants to enable him to make a bold showing on the scaffold. The criminal was apparently proud of his race, and vowed that he would "Die like a Durrant."

Durrant's most urgent request of Warden Hale was that no autopsy be held on his body. He also requested that the rope with which he was hanged be burned. His wishes in both these respects were observed by the warden.

MANY MURDERS EXPIATED.

A Louisiana Negro Hanged, With Two Others Killed Ten Men and a Woman. NEW ORLEANS, La., Jan. 3. -At Hahnville, a small town in St. Charles parish to-day Louis Richards, alias Pierre, alias Creole, George Washington and Foxey Morris, all negroes, were hanged for murdering and robbing a Jewish peddler named Zeigler, last June.

"Creole" confessed, implicating the other two. "Creole" also confessed that since 1884 he had murdered at least nine men and one colored woman on various plantations.

Sickles Wants His Leg.

NEW YORK, Jan. 10. -After thirty years of hobbling about the world on crutches, General Daniel E. Sickles is about to petition the government he fought for to give back to him his leg. He lost it in "Bloody Angle" at Gettysburg. It found its way by devious ways into the army museum at Washington. Blackened with the erosion of years, stripped down to the bare and shattered bones, it hangs on two brass rods, cheek by jowl with the articulated skeleton of a walrus.

Fatal Fight Over a Cow.

PARIS, Mo., Jan. 10. -This morning about 4 o'clock Perry Reid, constable at Santa Fe, arrived here with Thomas Humphreys and his son, so lodged in jail for fatally cutting William Sharp at Santa Fe last night, in a dispute over a cow belonging to Humphreys.

Death of a Noted Editor.

DETROIT, Mich., Jan. 10. -Judge Albert G. Boynton, for twenty-five years political editor of the Detroit Free Press, died last evening at the Alma (Mich.) sanitarium. He had suffered from kidney troubles for two years past.

Resigned After 48 Years' Service.

NEW YORK, Jan. 10. -Rev. Dr. John Hall has announced to his congregation his resignation as pastor of the Fifth Avenue Presbyterian church. He has held the place forty-eight years.

Fusion of Oregon's Silver Forces.

PORTLAND, Ore., Jan. 10. -Action has been taken in the city looking to the union of all of the free silver forces at the coming state election in June.

French Cruiser Ordered to China.

PARIS, Jan. 10. -The cruiser Duguay Trouin, flagship of the French Pacific squadron, has been ordered to Chinese waters.

The Atholton Bridge Sold.

ST. JOSEPH, Mo., Jan. 10. -A leading railway official of this city is authority for the statement that the Atholton, Topeka & Santa Fe railway has purchased the Atholton bridge, and in turn executed a lease with the Burlington & Quincy railroad for facilities at the stock yards.

Car to Make a Coasty Stop.

LOEDEX, Jan. 10. -The car and curia will receive their friends at the Paris exposition in 1900 in their own pavilion, which will cost \$450,000.

KANSAS MINE DISASTER.

Three Men Lost Their Lives From an Explosion at Chicago.

PITTSBURG, Kan., Jan. 10. -Full particulars regarding the explosion at Chicago Saturday night were not obtainable until yesterday about noon. The mine is badly damaged and the three men who were thought to be alive were taken out dead. They are: Sohn Posing, 29 years old, who leaves a wife and three small children; Charles Winters, single, 25 years old, the only support of an aged father and mother, and Antone Weinberger, single. The true cause of the explosion is not known, nor can it be accounted for by the best experienced mine operators in the district. It was without doubt an explosion of dust created by the work of the shot firers. No. 5 is the largest shaft the Mt. Carmel company is operating, and this winter it has been working about 300 miners and is operating both day and night shifts. The explosion occurred between shifts or the results would have been almost a repetition of the famous Frontenac explosion.

MOSES P. HANDY DEAD.

The Editor and French Exposition Commissioner Passes Away in Georgia. AUGUSTA, Ga., Jan. 10. -Major Moses P. Handy died at the Hotel Bon Air at noon to-day. The body will be taken to Berlin, Md.

Major Handy has been an invalid the last two months. He became ill in Paris, whither he had gone as the special commissioner of the United States to the French exposition of 1900. He recovered sufficiently to make the journey to America and came here at once.

A TOWBOAT BLOWS UP.

The Percy Kelsey Destroyed and a Leat Six on Board Killed.

PITTSBURG, Pa., Jan. 10. -The tow boat Percy Kelsey, owned by W. H. Brown & Son of this city, blew up while going down the Ohio river, near Glenfield, Ohio, about 11 o'clock this morning, and six or eight of the crew were killed, and at least four of the others injured. The boat was literally blown to pieces and the cargo scattered and lost.

FOUR NEGROES LYNCHED.

Two Arkansas Mobs Avenge a Brutal Assault and a Murder.

LITTLE ROCK, Ark., Jan. 10. -Four negroes have been lynched in the vicinity of the Bearden within the last few days. Two, Devoe and Huntley, accused of brutal assault, a year ago, were hanged near Harlow Mill ranch, about three miles north of Bearden, while the other two, murderers, met their fate near the town of Little Bay, a few miles south of Bearden. The work was done by two separate mobs.

Elopers Captured.

FORT SCOTT, Kan., Jan. 10. -James Henretta, of Muscatine, Iowa, with the aid of the police located his wife, who eloped from her home with a fellow giving his name as John Jackson, four months ago. The woman is 45 and the man 40 years of age. Until six weeks ago they had been living in St. Joseph, but left there a day before the woman's husband arrived. When arrested to-day the woman had about \$1,000 on her person. Her husband says before leaving she sold part of the household goods and took the balance with her. They have been married but seventeen months. The woman has decided to return with her husband. Her lover is in jail here.

Would Blackmail a King.

BUDAPEST, Jan. 10. -A sensation has been caused by the arrest of Rosa Benke, a music hall singer, together with several male accomplices, on the charge of blackmailing King Alexander of Servia. It is said that they also tried to blackmail Prince Ferdinand of Bulgaria and ex-King Milan of Servia when here recently. The arrests were made at the latter's instigation. Some curious disclosures are expected.

Lady Somerset Retires.

NEW YORK, Jan. 10. -A London cable says Lady Henry Somerset has given up all public work. She has resigned the presidency of the Woman's Temperance association and will take a prolonged rest ostensibly under the orders of her physician. It is believed, however, that differences with her colleagues in temperance work have greatly influenced her retirement.

A Fictive Woman Sued.

DENVER, Col., Jan. 10. -J. H. Gallagher, a druggist of Sheldon, Iowa, has filed a suit in the district court here against Mrs. Andrew Sanbo, asking \$10,000 for alleged breach of promise of marriage. He says he spent \$1,000 in entertaining during their courtship and lost \$2,000 by neglect of his business, having come to Colorado to visit her.

No Pardon for Boss McKane.

ALBANY, N. Y., Jan. 8. -Governor Black will not pardon or commute the sentence of John Y. McKane, former political leader, whose term of seven years' imprisonment in Sing Sing will expire in April next by limitation.

John T. Brush's Home Burned.

INDIANAPOLIS, Ind., Jan. 10. -"Lombardy," the home of John T. Brush, the base ball magnate, three miles east of here, was wrecked by fire this morning. It was of unique architecture, built of stone and cost about \$25,000. The loss is estimated at \$20,000. The furniture and bric-a-brac were removed.

A Lynching at Colfax, Wash.

SALT LAKE, Utah, Jan. 10. -Black Eye, an alleged murderer confined in jail at Colfax, Wash., was taken from jail by a mob early this morning and lynched.

CONGRESSIONAL.

Jan. 7. -The feature of the session of the Senate was a speech delivered by Mr. Teller of Colorado regarding press reports that the recent efforts to make it appear that Secretary Gage had tendered his resignation as a member of the Cabinet to President McKinley were a part of a conspiracy of the silver men to disrupt the Cabinet and create dissension between the President and his advisers. Mr. Teller branded the publication as an insult to the advocates of the free coinage of silver. He was satisfied that the President and Secretary Gage were in full accord on the financial question. He attacked the Republican party because it was a party advocating the gold standard and expressed his intention of doing all in his power to defeat the party in 1900 and to drag the present administration from power, because the policy of the party was, in his opinion, inimical to the best and highest interests of the people of the United States.

The civil service debate continued throughout the day in the House. The speakers were Messrs. Gillette of Massachusetts, Burton of Ohio, Republicans and Fitzgerald, Democrat of Massachusetts, in support of the law. Messrs. Cummings, Democrat of New York, Paris, Republican of Indiana, Mahoney, Republican of New York, Driggs, Democrat of New York and Bradley, Democrat of New York in opposition to, and Mr. Kerr, Republican of Ohio in favor of the modification of the law.

Jan. 6. -The friends and enemies of the civil service law exchanged broadsides in the House to-day. The heaviest guns on each side were brought into action. Mr. Grosvenor, of Ohio, against the bill, and Mr. Johnson, of Indiana, for the bill, each made exhaustive speeches and kept their respective sides in constant warfare. Mr. Lloyd, of Missouri, was the only other speaker. He favored the repeal of the law.

While the Senate was in session two hours, practically no business was transacted beyond the passage of a few bills, among them one providing for a congress of American Indians at the Omaha exposition. Jan. 5. -Congress reassembled after the holiday recess. The House proceeded at once with the debate on the clause appropriating money for the civil service commission. The law was attacked and defended by a number of members. Dockery and Robb of Missouri advocated its repeal in full.

In the Senate there was a lively debate over recommendations suggested by cabinet officers for modifications in the civil service law so as to permit them to make appointments of confidential employees. Mr. Davis, chairman of the foreign affairs committee, gave notice that on next Monday and every day thereafter, he would call up the Hawaiian annexation treaty for ratification.

MEMPHIS WIDOW'S CRIME.

Shot a Prominent Physician and Then Committed Suicide.

MEMPHIS, Tenn., Jan. 10. -In the outskirts of Memphis this afternoon, Dr. Shep A. Rogers, professor of anatomy at the Memphis Medical college, ex-president of the board of health, and one of the most prominent physicians in the city, was shot by Mrs. Mary Sandbrink, a widow. After shooting Dr. Rogers, the woman turned the revolver to her breast and sent a bullet through her heart. The cause of the tragedy is veiled in deepest mystery. It is said that the woman was infatuated with the physician, and on one occasion had threatened to kill herself in his presence.

Dr. Rogers regained consciousness for a few minutes. He made a statement that Mrs. Sandbrink decoyed him to the fatal spot by writing him a note. He says the woman had greatly annoyed him with her attentions and threatened to shoot him on several occasions. Physicians say there is a bare chance for his recovery, but that the entire lower part of the body will be permanently paralyzed. The family of the dead woman has not as yet made a statement, but it is understood that they claim Dr. Rogers was engaged to be married to Mrs. Sandbrink, and for some reason did not carry out his part of the contract.

SHOT WIFE AND HIMSELF.

Jealousy and Drink Prompted Attempted Murder and Suicide Near Fort Scott.

FORT SCOTT, KAN., Jan. 5. -H. Catt entertained callers at his home four miles south last night. He has a big orchard there and makes a brand of elder well known throughout this section as a satisfactory substitute for beverages usually considered stronger. All drunk freely and Catt's son, Walter, became badly intoxicated. Being naturally jealous, and observing his young wife's whisper to her brother-in-law, he drew a revolver and shot her twice. Then he fired a bullet into his own brain.

Catt will die, but his wife has a good chance to recover. All the family except Catt, his wife and his mother had retired when the shooting took place, so the elder Mrs. Catt is the only person who knows the particulars and is in a condition to communicate them.

Girl Tied to a Tree.

LYNN, Mass., Jan. 10. -Annie Phinney, aged 23, of Haverhill, well dressed and good looking, was found tied to a tree in the Swampscott woods to-day, where she had been left to die by two strangers, who had enticed her to a road house and drugged her with poisoned liquor. She told her rescuers a tale of terrible abuse, and the police are looking for her brutal assailants.

Bartley Must Serve His Term.

LINCOLN, Neb., Jan. 7. -The supreme court has rendered a decision affirming the penitentiary sentence of twenty years imposed upon ex-State Treasurer Bartley, convicted in the district court of Douglas county of embezzling \$735,000.

Burglars Make a Big Heist.

CHICAGO, Jan. 8. -Burglars entered the residence of W. W. Jacobs, at 12 Waverly place last evening, and carried away mining stock valued at about \$70,000, besides a collection of rare coins, musical instruments, rare books, jewelry, silverware and clothing.

To Form a Black Tie Trust.

CHICAGO, Jan. 6. -A block tin trust is in process of formation, and while it is yet in its earlier stages, it is announced that the capital stock of the new company will be \$12,000,000.

CONDENSED NEWS.

Advices to the Interior department indicate that the Indians are accepting the new order in the Territory quietly.

Commissioner Evans has ordered special examiners to keep a sharp watch for pension attorneys' advertisements.

A number of pensioners, alarmed by the prospect of publication of the list, have asked that their pensions be canceled.

C. F. Grosvener of Lawrence, Kan., went to St. Joseph last Sunday and he has not been seen or heard from since.

Great Britain probably will loan China \$16,000,000. France and Russia have been negotiating to raise the money.

A list of 133 children between the ages of 6 and 14 has been furnished the police board of Fort Scott, Kan., with directions that their attendance at the city schools be enforced under penalty of going to the calaboose. The list includes only children who have failed to comply with the compulsory education law.

The public debt December 31, less cash in the treasury, showed a decrease for the month of \$10,114,295.

Secretary Gage says that the monetary commission's currency reform plan in some respects is better than his.

A counterfeit of the \$100 silver certificate of 1891 is so dangerous that Secretary Gage will call in notes of that issue.

The government receipts for December, exclusive of the Union Pacific payments, were \$27,931,494; expenditures, \$26,216,663.

It is reported that Senator Platt of Connecticut will resign to become commissioner of insurance.

Secretary Bliss informed the Creeks that any attempt to oppose the order of things in the territory would be a waste of time and money.

Widow Florence Acres committed suicide in East St. Louis because a young man refused to marry her.

Weyler, erstwhile so proud, is much humbled. He apologized to Sagasta and the queen regent.

Russia is reported to have tricked China by saying that the British were coming to capture Port Arthur.

Great Britain is said to have taken a firm attitude on the Chinese question - that she will not recognize China's grants to other powers.

The Ripley county court house at Doniphan, Mo., was destroyed by fire, but the contents were saved. There was no insurance.

About 1,100 postoffices throughout the country were assigned to the money order class on January 3. This makes approximately 25,000 postoffices at which money orders may be now obtained or cashed.

Dr. Robert L. Dabney, one of the most prominent educators of the South, died at his home in Knoxville, Tenn. Dr. Charles W. Dabney, president of the University of Tennessee, and assistant secretary of agriculture under President Cleveland, was his son.

Ex-Governor Wm. J. Stone is being boomed for the presidency.

The Wabash train from Kansas City to St. Louis caught fire and consumed all the property of "In Old Kentucky" theatrical company, including three valuable performing horses.

F. B. Loomis, minister to Venezuela, says that there is a great field for American manufacturers in that country.

At present the friends of Hawaiian annexation seem to lack four votes of the two-thirds required in the Senate for ratification.

The value of United States naval yards and stations is more than \$60,000,000. Nearly \$9,000,000 was required last year to maintain warships in commission.

The monetary commission appointed by the Indianapolis convention has made public its scheme of currency reform. The plan is embodied in a bill that will be introduced by Congressman Overstreet.

The Herring-Hall-Marvin Safe Co., New York, failed owing to high salaries paid.

Chicago aldermen voted to allow each a private secretary and their chose relatives.

Canada and the United States will work together to aid Klondike prospectors.

Timothy T. Hier, a deputy constable at Carthage, Mo., was caught burglarizing a store.

The navy department has ordered 100,000 pounds of a new smokeless powder.

Finney county, Kan., began the new year with an empty poor house and no one in jail.

It is said that the fusion nomination for Congress in the First Nebraska district will be offered to Mr. Bryan.

Two congregations at Harrison, N. Y., were driven from their churches by cold and held services in a 2nd house.
