DO WE WANT A STATE REUNION

It would give a low excursion rate to Dodge City

FROM ALL OVER KANSAS

And many who want to look at investments here would make the trip.

At the meeting of the local Grand Army post this week the matter of securing the state reunion was discussed. Captain Sweeney president of the district association was present. He believes that Dodge City can secure the state reunion if the people here want it. Every year Dodge City has practically all of the trouble and expense in entertaining the district association that would be necessary for a state reunion.

The reunion here last year was a bigger affair than the state reunion has been upon several occasions. The state reunion would give us this advantage: We could secure low railroad rates from all over the state instead of having our rate confined to the western portion of Kansas. With a speaker or two of national reputation we could draw people from all parts of the state. Eastern Kansas people are looking toward investments in lands here. A low rate would be taken advantage of by them. They want to see the country and we want them to see it.

The local post appointed a committee to talk this matter over with the people. If the people want it they will have to decide at once and send a committee to the state encampment which meets at Parsons on May 22. If the people of Dodge City don't want it the district association officers and the local post will not try to crowd it on them.

LIBRARY IS A WINNER

Proposition Carried by twenty-six Majority

VOTE ON TUESDAY WAS A SMALL ONE

Apparently no opposition to School bonds—Vote canvassed tonight.

The vote of the city election held Tuesday will be canvassed by the city council this evening. From the unofficial figures reported from the various wards, the library proposition, the only thing upon which there was any contest, has carried by 26 or 27 majority. The vote cast was a light one all around. It is understood that in the first ward the library proposition lost by 9 votes and in the fourth ward by 3 votes. In the second 12 or 13 majority for the library is reported and in the third it carried by 26 majority.

No figures have been given on the school bond proposition but there seems to have been little or no opposition to it. There was only one ticket in the field for city officers.

With the library proposition carried the association will be ready to draw on Mr. Carnegie for funds for the building. There will be a hustle now to get a suitable site for the library.

In addition to this it is expected that the signal service department will soon be ready to erect a building for the weather bureau office.

Work on the Schekowsky elevator will be started at once and also upon a number of new residences over the city, and there is also the big Churchill business block to be erected this season.

The greatest building boom for years is just starting in Dodge City.

LUCILE WRIGHT DEAD

Shot and Killed Herself This Morning in Missouri.

A telegram was received here this morning containing the shocking news that Lucile Wright had committed suicide at Holden, Mo. The dispatch merely said: "Lucile Wright shot and killed herself a few moments ago." It was signed by Miss Tevis.

Lucile Wright was known by everybody in Dodge City. She was a daughter of B. M. Wright and was brought up here. She had been married but had secured a divorce two years ago. A few weeks ago she went to Kansas City. She was in poor health and was taking treatment there. It seems that a few days ago she went to Holden to visit May Tevis who has been an intimate friend for years. She had been despondent at times but the news of her sudden and sad death has come wholly unexpected to her friends here.

LIBRARY SITE

The next move by the library association will be to secure a site for the building. There is a splendid site which could easily be turned over for that purpose. The little building and lots near the Christian church, owned by the city schools will not be used for school purposes after this year, as new rooms will be built at the second ward building. It is the best site available for the library. The library is to be a valuable adjunct to the schools and the board of education could sell the site for a nominal figure, practically donate it for this purpose. In this way the town would furnish a site, instead of the burden falling upon a few public spirited business men. This is too good, and all around too fair an arrangement to overlook.
