News From THE STATE SOLDIERS' HOME At Fort Dodge, Kas.

The teamsters are busy hauling coal. Evans dropped off some big lumps at our box.

We have some friends in Hutchinson and we told them that we would scarcely know how to conduct ourselves when we got a congressman from the Short grass country.

According to a report made by the Senate committee on pensions, there are 50,855 war pensioners in the state of Kansas. During the past year \$3,936,336.50 was paid out to them. This includes the amount paid to widows.

We have been abroad (to Hutchinson) and just returned (from Dodge City) Sunday evening and our items are scarce. Furthermore the weather has been rough, the ground slippery and the flesh weak. But as Horace Greeley would say, "The way to resume is to resume."

According to Judge Gaynor of Iowa, soldiers have first claim in appointments. There was a vacancy in the office of county. Several old soldiers applied but their claims were ignored, the board claiming that the law did not apply because the office was an elective one, but Judge Gaynor held that the law did apply in such cases and they must appoint the soldier. In this respect Iowa is ahead of Kansas. An Iowa law also allows an old soldier \$800. free from taxation. In making assessments, the assessor exempts \$800. Fully one-tally two for Iowa and Kansas is the boasted "old soldier state" too.

We think your views as to primaries are about right. A great objection against primaries is that a minority often elects. Now if there are only two candidates running it is all right, but when three or four, or a half dozen are running it is likely to be all wrong and a small minority is likely to elect. We tried primaries in our county East, several years and we finally gave it up as very unsatisfactory and went back to a delegate convention system. To show how primaries work, take the vote in Shawnee county as reported in the Topeka Capital. For instance look at the vote for Register of Deeds, to wit: Nadler J. Hodgins, 2601; Jno. L. Howard, 484; Roscoe C. Squier, 1179; Harry Nichols, 1388; A. M. Baird, 627; J. C. Shaffer, 545. Six candidates for Register of Deeds, 6,244 votes cast, and 2601 votes nominated the candidate. As the lawyers would say, that is "anomalous, irrelevant, incompetent, and leading."

Review of Weather.

For week ending Wednesday, March 21, 1906, as furnished by T. J. Conditine of the local Weather Bureau.

The weather continued cold, raw and disagreeable almost throughout the entire week. The highest temperature during the week was 54 degrees and occurred on March 20th, the lowest temperature was 10 degrees and occurred on March 16. The average daily temperature was 21 degrees which, when compared with the average of the past 31 years shows a deficiency in that element of over 20 degrees per day. The average precipitation for the week as deduced from the record of the past 31 years is .21 of an inch and the actual precipitation as recorded at this office was .24 of an inch.

Compared with the corresponding period of last year the temperature is decidedly lower and the precipitation .27 of an inch below that of 1905.

There were no high winds during the week and the prevailing wind direction was easterly.
