



COMMENDS HOCH.

Ex-Gov. Crawford Discusses the M. K. & T. Case.

Says Governor Could do Nothing Else.

PARTY IN HARMONY.

Kansas Republicans United for Contest—Democratic Managers Abandon Attempt at Political Trick.

Topeka, June 27, 1906.—Ex-Governor Samuel J. Crawford, Kansas' war governor, is recognized by experts everywhere as one of the most reliable authorities on land grants and territorial affairs, in the United States. Mr. Crawford, discussing the M. K. & T. case and Governor Hoch, said:

"That land grant was made by congress in 1866 to the state of Kansas, in trust for a railroad through the Indian Territory to Red River.

"It embraced the odd numbered sections of public lands on each side of said road, for a distance of ten miles with the usual provision for selecting indemnity lands within an additional ten mile limit at the date of this grant there were no public lands in the Indian territory. They had all been previously sold and conveyed by patent to the several tribes of Indians, through whose lands the road runs. There were no public lands within twenty miles of the line of this road in the Indian Territory, and consequently no land to which said grant can attach. Most of the lands have been allotted and patented to the Indians, but after said allotments were made, some of the tribes still had a large surplus of unallotted lands.

"Should the government purchase these surplus lands from the Indians and extinguish the Indian title in such way as to make them public lands then, and not till then will there be lands in the Indian Territory subject to the railroad grant.

"But in anticipation of some of these surplus lands becoming public lands the railroad company seeks to have the courts pass upon the grant.

"The state of Kansas has no interest in the matter one way or the other. It is simply a trustee and I do not see how the governor could have done otherwise than permit the beneficiaries of the grant to establish their rights, if they have rights in the courts.

"I think Governor Hoch did exactly right, because the sooner the question is permanently settled the better it will be for all concerned."

There is an unusually good brand of harmony prevailing in Republican ranks in Kansas this year. Two years ago half of the politicians were mad at the other half and secretly hoping that some of the candidates for office could be defeated. W. J. Bailey, ex-governor was not in the campaign; he felt that he could not support a part of the ticket. This year he has signified his willingness to speak whenever called upon by the state committee and he will make as good a speech as any Republican on the stump. Another bar-fighter and former enemy of Bailey's who will take the stump and support the ticket is Congressman Curtis, of the First district. Curtis and Bailey have not been friendly for years and this apparent dropping of the old quarrel will be pleasing to the Republicans all over the state. Both men have strong followings in the state and the fact that the leaders are working together will make the followers more friendly and harmonious in their dealings.

The same condition exists between E. W. Hoch and W. R. Stubbs and their friends. There has been a coarseness between Governor Hoch and Stubbs for some time, but this trouble has been patched up and Mr. Stubbs will now support the ticket. The two men are again good friends and will work together. There are fewer private quarrels in the party this year than usual and unless there is a next winter, the party will enter campaign of 1908 in better condition than ever.

Senator A. W. Benson, the junior Kansas senator is expected to co-home from Washington as soon as congress adjourns and make speech for the republican state ticket.

The desperate straits in which the Democratic leaders have been placed in an attempt to reduce Governor Hoch's majority is shown by the trick which the party managers attempted to play last week. It has been the custom in Kansas for years to put the ticket on the ballot with the nominees for Justice of the supreme court first and then the name of the nominee for governor. The Democratic leaders in charge of the present campaign thought they saw a chance to violate this custom and make votes for their candidate for governor. They believed that they could by placing Col. Harris at the head of the ticket get a few more votes for him than they would if his name should be placed below those of four candidates for places on the supreme bench. The plan was seriously considered for weeks. Later it was determined by the state committee that the trick would have a reactionary effect and would be regarded as a confession of weakness of the balance of the ticket. After a consultation with the secretary of state they decided to drop it. Tricks of this kind show the extremity to which the Democrats have been driven in an attempt to make a showing creditable to themselves in the state this year. Some of their leaders say they made a mistake in the organization of their state committee and they are now trying to retrieve their shattered fortunes.

W. H. Ryan, chairman of the Democratic state central committee recently declared that within thirty days he would have "every old soldier in the state organizing Harris clubs." Mr. Ryan evidently knows little about the old soldiers of Kansas. He believed that because the old soldiers were dissatisfied with the action of the supreme court in electing a reporter that they would also oppose Governor Hoch. P. H. Coney, commander of the state department of the G. A. R. said:

"Mr. Ryan is talking through his halter. He does not know the old soldiers of Kansas. They have no intention of fighting the ticket. Because we opposed the supreme court because it did not elect one of our friends to office it does not mean that we are prepared to slaughter the ticket for the benefit of a man who tried for four years to wipe out our union. We may admire the nerve of a man who commanded a regiment against us for four years and then comes into the 'Old Soldier State' of the union and presumes to ask for our votes, but we cannot go so far as to support him."

The traveling men of Kansas have an unusual interest in the success of the Republican state ticket this year for the very simple reason that one of their number has a very important place on that ticket. Incidentally it is the first time that a traveling man has been honored with a nomination on the state ticket of either party in the state. Mark Tully, of Independence, Republican nominee for treasurer of state, is one of the best known and most popular commercial travelers in the state. He has been a traveling salesman in Kansas for almost a dozen years. In Southeastern Kansas where Tully is best known the traveling men are to a man supporting Tully and the Republican state ticket.

A. W. Smith, the well known McPherson county republican, had had a few things to say about Republicans supporting Col. Harris which will help to set things right among the old soldiers who fought in the union army. Mr. Harris made a speech some time ago at Salina and an unreliable daily newspaper which is supporting Col. Harris declared that "Farmer" Smith was hooted down because he mentioned the fact that Col. Harris achieved his title in the Confederate army. Mr. Smith has written the following statement on the subject:

"I have the courage now to stand up before any Kansas audience and express my convictions as I did at Salina. I have the highest personal regard for Col. Harris, but when I got into the election booth to cast my ballot I will recall the four years' service I gave to my country less the nineteen months I served and starved in southern rebel prisons. The cause for which my good friend Col. Harris fought and in which he led a Virginia regiment does not appeal to me as a paramount reason why he should have my vote or the vote of any other ex-Union soldier. True, the war is over, but its history will live forever, notwithstanding the efforts of a few of Col. Harris' friends to have it obliterated and forgotten during the pending campaign in Kansas."
