SOME REUNION ATTRACTIONS

The big reunion is now only a little more than two weeks off, and it is the general opinion that this will be the greatest of all the reunions held by the Southwest association.

The Vice President of the United States is certainly an attraction worthy of any meeting, and the association is very fortunate in securing Charles W. Fairbanks for the reunion. The Vice President will be here on Friday, and will speak at one of the meetings held on that day.

Governor Frantz, of Oklahoma, the new state, will be another attraction that should draw the crowds. Governor Hoch of Kansas, and his opponent for the office at the coming election, Col. W. A. Harris, will be here.

Probably all of the candidates for state offices will be at the reunion a part of the week, and it will be a chance for the people of the western half of the state to see them all in a bunch.

The Justices of the supreme court and other men of note in Kansas will be present. Senator Long will be here for a speech, also Senator Benson, the new senator appointed by Governor Hoch to fill the vacancy made by the resignation of Senator Burton. Both of our senators are able speakers.

Department Commander Patrick H. Coney, of the G. A. R. of Kansas, who is a candidate for National Commander, will be present all week.

The many eminent speakers are sufficient attraction to be worthy of drawing a crowd from all over the state, and no doubt will do so.

All who attend the District reunion will have an opportunity of attending the Ford County Fair on the afternoon of each day of the reunion. The program will be a good one and will be worth seeing.

The park in which the meetings will be given is one of the largest and best in Kansas and is a fine place to enjoy a week's outing.

Hundreds of tents have been engaged for the week, and all who desire to camp on the grounds will be furnished tents.

It will be a great week for Western Kansas and no one who can possibly attend should think of missing it.

The people of Dodge City will exert themselves to make the visit pleasant to all comers. The dates of the reunion are: August 28, 29, 30, 31 and September 1.

Another Candidate Out.

The candidacy of P. R. Hobbie for the office of Probate Judge is announced in this issue of the GLOBE-REPUBLICAN. Hobbie is one of the old settlers of this town and county, and he is widely and favorably known here. Death of Mrs. Averill.

Mrs. Maude Averill died on Sunday morning, at a little after 1 o'clock after lying in an unconscious condition for seventeen days. The funeral was held from the risk, which is being used by the Methodist church, on Monday afternoon.

Mrs. Maude Naolla Henry Averill was born September 13, 1879 in Benton county Missouri, and came to Kansas with her parents Mr. and Mrs. Henry in 1885.

She was married on July 1900, to Clarence C. Averill, of Dodge City, and was left a widow by his death, March 28, 1903. Mrs. Averill leaves a son five years old, a father and mother, two sisters, Mrs. Ed Burrell, of Long Beach, California and Mrs. W. I. Baxter of Salt Lake, and two brothers, Don and Dan Henry.

CITY SCHOOLS

Will Begin the Term on September 10th This Year.

School will begin in Dodge City on September 10th this year, for a term of nine months. The date of beginning was set by the board of education at its meeting held Monday night.

The tax levy was made at the last meeting, 18 mills for the general fund and 3 mills for the sinking and contingent fund.

The resignation of Karl Miller handed in at the last meeting was accepted by the board, but nothing was done toward filling the vacancy.

Everett Baker was given the position of janitor of the Second ward school.

There seems to be a big peach crop everywhere this year, and peaches will be cheap. They are selling now in Hutehinson for sixty cents a bushel, delivered. Oklahoma has an immense crop and there seems to be plenty of them all over eastern Kansas. While there are not enough orchards in this county to supply the demand, the peaches that are shipped in will probably be cheap enough so that everyone can get a supply for their needs.

The Methodist camp meeting begins today and will continue until August 21. August 17 will be Home Missionary day and addresses will be given by Presiding Elder Irwin, Mrs. Imboden, and Mrs. Ramsell, of Garden City. All members of the church and all members of the Home Missionary society are requested to be present at the meetings.

A Good Concession.

The Rock Island R. R. have agreed to give Dodge two trains daily during the Reunion. In addition to the regular train as it now runs. There will be a train up from Bucklin in the evening, and return about 8 o'clock in the morning. The fast trains on the main line will stop at Fowler, Meade, Arkalon, Plains, Liberal and Guyman, and the trains on the Bucklin and Dodge branch will be held at Bucklin to make close connection with all trains on the main line.

GREAT WHEAT FARM.

Will be Opened up by Illinois Man in Ford County.

Eugene L. Taylor, of Nokomis, Illinois is here looking after his land interests. Mr. Taylor now owns five sections of the best land in this county, land that while it is unimproved would sell readily for \$68,000. Mr. Taylor came in to Ford county years ago and proved up on a quarter section which he still owns, for this particular Taylor family does not seem to believe in selling land when they once get it. Mr. Taylor is at present living on land in Illinois that was bought by his father from the government. After proving up on the claim here Mr. Taylor returned to Illinois. A few years ago he decided that the time was ripe to load up on Kansas land. He began buying in land adjoining his homestead west of Ford, a quarter section at a time. It cost him from \$1.50 to \$2.50 an acre, and he secured in all five sections.

This year he got 300 acres broken out and will put it in wheat this fall. The coming year he expects to get 640 acres more under the plow, as a beginning to a big wheat farm.

Some day he expects to move to Ford county and when he does he will buy a few sections more of wheat land.

Mr. Taylor is a thorough believer in the Campbell system of soil culture and thinks that by following that system a good crop can always be raised in this country.
