Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Kansas, two-thirds of the members elected to each house concurring therein:

SECTION 1. The following proposition to amend the constitution of the state of Kansas is hereby submitted to the qualified electors of said state for their approval or rejection, to-wit: The constitution of the state of Kansas is hereby amended by striking out the whole of section 17 of article 2 of said constitution, and inserting in lieu of said section the following, which shall constitute section 17 of article 2 of the constitution: section 17. All laws of general nature shall have a uniform operation throughout the state; and in all cases where a general law can be made applicable no special law shall be enacted; and whether or not a law enacted is repugnant to this provision of the constitution shall be construed and determined by the courts of the state.

SECTION 2. This proposition shall be submitted to the electors of this state at the general election to be held in the year 1909 for their approval or rejection. The amendment hereby proposed shall be designated on the official ballot by the following title, viz: "Amendment to the constitution relating to laws and their construction by the courts," and shall be voted for or against as provided by law under such title.

SECTION 3. This resolution shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the statute-book.

Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Kansas, two-thirds of the members elected to each house concurring therein:

SECTION 1. The following proposition to amend the constitution of the state of Kansas is hereby submitted to the qualified electors of the state for their approval or rejection: That section 3 of article 12 be amended so as to read as follows: Section 3. There shall be a probate court in each county, which shall be a court of record, and have such probate jurisdiction and care of estates of deceased persons, minors, and persons of unsound minds, as may be prescribed by law, and shall have jurisdiction in cases of habeas corpus. The court shall consist of one judge, who shall be elected by the qualified voters of the county, and hold his office two years. He shall hold court at such times and receive for compensation such fees or salary as may be prescribed by law. The judicial power of the county, and the appointment or selection of a probate judge pro tem, when the probate judge is unavoidably absent or otherwise unable or disqualified to sit in any case.

SECTION 2. This proposition shall be submitted to the electors of the state at the general election of representatives in the year 1906 for their approval or rejection. The amendment hereby proposed shall be designated on the official ballot by the following title: "The probate judge amendment to the constitution," and shall be voted for or against as provided by law under such title.

SECTION 3. This resolution shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the statute-book.

Resolved by the Legislature of the State of Kansas, two-thirds of the members elected to each house concurring therein:

SECTION 1. The following proposition to amend the constitution of the state of Kansas is hereby submitted to the qualified electors of the state for their approval or rejection: That section 2 of article 12 be amended so as to read as follows: Sec. 2. Dues from corporations shall be secured by the individual liability of the stockholders to the amount of stock owned by each stockholder, and such other means as shall be provided by law; but such individual liability shall not apply to railroads, corporations not corporations for religious or charitable purposes.

SECTION 2. This proposition shall be submitted to the electors of the state of Kansas at the general election of representatives in the year 1906 for their approval or rejection. The amendment hereby proposed shall be designated on the official ballot by the following title: "Amendment to the constitution relating to the individual liability of stockholders," and shall be voted for or against as provided by law under such title.

SECTION 3. This resolution shall take effect and be in force from and after its publication in the statute-book.
