Junction, Kansas, May 23, 1863.

Davis County has paid to date a United States tax of four hundred dollars.

From companies of the 2d Colorado passed through town Friday morning.

Fort Scott has been chosen the County Seat of Bourbon County by about four hundred majority.

The Council Grove Press don't exchange with us. Must be pitching into this section of country "right sharp."

We have received a "pretty graft" of Putnos. Sorry we can't transfer it to block, with which to ornament this column.

The Rev. J. Paulson, lately ordered to supply this place by the M. E. Conference, has been appointed Chaplain of the Eighth Kansas.

F company, of the Second Colorado troops arrived at Fort Riley last Tuesday. There are several Junction boys in this company.

Paul Kramer, one of the parties in the late terrible fracas, has so far recovered from his wound as to be walking about.

Last Wednesday was the two hundredth birthday of William Bradford, who introduced printing into the American Colonies.

Who says it can't rain in Kansas? Last Thursday evening we had a second edition of Noah's flood. We prophesied rain, and it has come.

Major-General Sedgwick, who figured so extensively in the four day's battle at Chancellorsville, was three years ago in command of Fort Riley.

Daniel Mitchell, Esq., of this place has been appointed on the Board of Commissioners to locate the Agricultural College lands, vice R. S. Miller, resigned. He is most eminently qualified.

Leavenworth has recently received into its coffers some seven or eight hundred dollars from a tax on dogs. Junction could raise a like amount, or rid itself of a number of intolerable nuisances.

We received calls from Captains Hall and West of the Second Colorado. Hall was in all those glorious fights of the First Colorado. West is a typo, which would induce us to bet heavy on him.

Too little attention is paid the cultivation of the potato in this State. Invariably the supply runs short in the spring, and even seed potatoes are sometimes difficult to obtain. Steeler & Strickler have a fine lot for seed.

Friday and Saturday, the 29th and 30th of this month, are the last days for which work upon the roads are to be called for. Those who have not already complied are requested to meet at Bartlett's Ferry, armed and equipped as the law directs, or in lieu thereof pay three dollars.

The Rev. William Willson, of Leocompton, has been chosen by the Presbytery of Highland as their Representative in the Old School General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church. An honor fitly conferred, and the more gratifying inasmuch as several secess and soreheads have had him under charges before said Presbytery.

Company E, of the Second Kansas, composed principally of Junction boys, recently had one of its members shot at Fort Scott for desertion. He did not belong to this neighborhood, but was a straggler, having previously deserted from a Wisconsin regiment. His name was John Somers.

Knoxbury has safely arrived at home, and says: "We promise a regular issue of the Dakota hereafter, unless compelled to 'skeddadle' from the land by the uncomfortable proximity of bedecked, bedaubed, be-damned and blood-thirsty Santee Indians. Don't seem to be neighborly, up there."

The Junction City Sabbath School was reorganized last Sabbath upon a permanent and effective basis. It is now in possession of an interesting library, and everything else necessary to its efficiency. It is hoped every child in the neighborhood will be gathered within its folds. The Rev. Mr. Todd was chosen Superintendent, and Dr. Seymour Secretary and Librarian.

Chickering.—The Leavenworth Times says that a grading machine is in operation on the Leavenworth, Pawnee and Western Railroad, which, with four hands to run it, will do the work of a hundred hands. The road bed is being prepared very rapidly. The iron horse will be snorting around Junction ten years before it will Council Grove.

Panorama.—The company of Colorado troops which passed through here a few days ago, had with them four prisoners, quite a number of contraband ponies and cattle, and a wagon load of fun. Three were found without any visible means of support, and not being able to give a satisfactory account of themselves, were provided for; the other was found on Cow Creek, selling whiskey to Indians. He was inciting to insurrection, and consequently ought to be shot.

Baker—formerly a merchant in this city; but now living in Missouri, about four miles below this city, and demanded his money. His wife gave up what they had, after which one of these inhuman monsters deliberately shot Mr. Baker. He was not killed, however, and Mrs. B. threw herself between him and them, when the one who had not fired, went around and shot him again, killing him. There was no one else on the premises, and Mrs. B. remained with her dead husband all night, the only living occupant of a domicile rendered desolate by those fiends in human shape.
