

CAN WILL MAKE A RAILROAD OUT OF ROCK ISLAND

Has Unlimited Funds at Disposal.

PUTTING 85 POUND STEEL ALL OVER THE SYSTEM

"We're going to make a railroad out of the Rock Island, and don't you forget it," remarked D. W. Cain, general manager of the Rock Island lines of the southwest, headquarters at Topeka, Kan., in Kansas City last week. "They have given us money without stint, and we are going to use it right. We are putting down eighty-five pound steel all over the system. Every mile is to be ballasted with rock or gravel. For miles and miles we plan to be able to run trains at a rate of speed as high as ninety miles an hour. We are fixing the roadbed to that end and we are getting the equipment for it. Fifty-three out of an order of 115 heavy locomotives for fast service will remain to be delivered, but they are being delivered to us right along. We are also getting lots of other equipment."

Shortage of Rails.

Topeka, Kas., Oct. 8.—General Manager Cain of the Chicago, Rock Island & Pacific railroad, stated tonight that the company was having great difficulty securing steel rails for the relaying of the main line. He stated that the company had only enough rails on hand to keep the track laying gangs busy another week, and that the work would have to be stopped unless rails could be secured.

CHINESE SOLICITOR OF SANTA FE KILLED

Fresno, Oct. 7.—Last night Lou Mong, Chinese solicitor for the Santa Fe Railroad company, was shot at five times by highlanders from San Francisco.

Mong was found in a dying condition in his room. He had been warned of his approaching fate and had appealed to the police for protection. He was taken unawares and killed. The shots were all fired at close range. Enmity of highlanders who are of the Hoh Sing tong, was brought about when Mong testified against some tong in San Francisco.

Are Looking for Water.

A special train yesterday carried General Manager A. G. Wells, General Superintendent L. L. Hilliard, Division Superintendent J. R. Hitchcock, Acting Chief Engineer Morris and Manager of Oil Properties F. T. Peris of the Santa Fe to Cajon Pass, where they spent some time in looking over the improvements being made to better the trackage facilities, says a San Bernardino paper. They also spent some time investigating as to developing a water supply there. All the water the company uses now at Cajon is secured from other owners, but the company is endeavoring to develop its own water there, as it is a most reliable source and a large amount of water being used there for the engines.

ARIZONA AND COLORADO TO BEGIN WORK AT ONCE

It now begins to look as though the Arizona and Colorado railroad would begin construction work in Arizona if not immediately in New Mexico, says the McKinley County Republican. The Republican has been informed from a most reliable source that this road offered the Naco smelting and Refining company sixty acres of land at Osborn, the point where the road has surveyed across the international line into Mexico. The Naco Smelting and Refining company is building a big smelter at Naco and has material on the road for the plant. Osborn is a point on the Southwestern as is Naco. The Mitchell's who are building the smelter it is said have refused the offer; but that has nothing to do with the road. As this smelter will be in operation before very long it must be that the road will build very soon or what would be the sense of giving ground to the Mitchell's if the road did not expect to get returns for it in transportation of the smelter output. The road has now surveyed the line work out of Durango and it seems to be starting a general activity all along its survey. The people of Gallup who are waiting anxiously for the road to build into this city will not have long to wait before they hear something that means business.

MIKE O'SHEA KILLED.

Freight Conductor. Known for His Wit, Roll Under Train.

Mike O'Shea, a freight conductor on the eastern division of the El Paso-Southwestern railway, was killed in the El Paso yards Sunday afternoon by falling from a car and rolling under the wheels. O'Shea was known widely by railroad men on the Rock Island system. His wit was of the genuine kind that is always acceptable.

When General Manager W. R. Martin presided over the El Paso-Northwestern, O'Shea had the misfortune one day to fall to make time with his train. He committed the most hilarious of all crimes in the railroad calendar—held up the Golden State limited.

General Manager Martin sent a telegram to O'Shea, calling to account. Here is O'Shea's reply, sent in by wire:

"The wind was high and the steam was low. The train was heavy and hard to tow. The coal was bad and full of slate. That is why I detained the Golden State."

Another specimen of O'Shea's wit which is still being repeated was his reply when he was invited to take a drink. O'Shea was a brother of John O'Shea, senior passenger conductor on the eastern division of the Southwestern.

"Can't go now," said O'Shea. "I've got to go to help John pronounce the names of the Pullman cars. John can spell the names all right, but he has to have me to pronounce them."

PREPARING TO HANDLE CONGRESSIONAL PARTY

Walter Douglas, managing director of the El Paso and Southwestern railroad, has arranged to meet the congressional party at El Paso on October 12th with a special train and will escort them to Chilton and Morenci. Douglas and Bisbee, says the El Paso News. The congressmen are coming to Arizona to see for themselves the resources and class of citizenship of the territory. The trip was arranged by F. M. Murphy, president of the Santa Fe,

Prescott and Phoenix railroad while on a visit to Chilton recently. Besides Mr. Douglas and Mr. Murphy, nine other representative citizens of the territory will meet the congressional party at El Paso and will make a tour of the territory in their company.

"Uncle Joe" Cannon, who heads the distinguished party of congressmen and senators, has sent word that the members will accept no invitations, that they are coming on business strictly and do not desire to be entertained.

The first stop of the special congressional train will be at Chilton and the first night out from El Paso will be passed at Morenci. The next day the party will arrive at Douglas, and after a few hours in that city will proceed to Bisbee, where quarters have already been arranged for them at the Copper Queen hotel.

NEW WINKLE ON SCALPERS.

Santa Fe Thinks of Sealing Return Tickets in Trick Envelopes.

Officials of the Atchison, Topeka & Santa Fe, in the relentless war that they are waging on the ticket scalpers, are considering the advisability of using a new kind of envelope in which to place tickets and which will prevent their sale to scalpers.

The proposed envelope is of peculiar construction. It is so arranged as to be sealed from within, leaving the outer surface perfectly square and smooth. It is practically impossible to the conductor taking up the last go open it without defacing it in some way.

It is the idea of the officials to have given coupon on a ticket, seal up the return portion in an envelope, which must not be opened except by the conductor on the return trip. If opened by anyone except the conductor the ticket will not be honored.

HARRISMAN HOLDS RECORD.

Union and Southern Pacific Do Largest Business in July.

From the figures at hand Harrisman roads beat all others in the country in the figures of July earnings. The increase in net of the Union and Southern Pacific for the month is 21 per cent for the Union and 24 per cent for the Southern. Part of the good showing is due to the unusually large Trans-Pacific traffic caused by the war between Russia and Japan. Local traffic, however, was also unusually heavy and even without the increase in the Trans-Pacific traffic alluded to the roads would have made an excellent record.

Much of the improvement is doubtless due to the enormous sums which have been spent on both systems in bettering the physical conditions of the property and in increasing the equipment and other facilities for handling traffic. Large as have been the additions to equipment, it has all been in constant use during the last two months, and the probabilities are that orders for more will have to be given in the future. It is quite certain that there is now as much traffic in sight in the territory tributary to the two roads as will keep them working to their full capacity for fifteen or eighteen months to come.
