**Civil Service Examinations.**  
The United States civil service commission announces an examination of November 1, 1905, at Albuquerque and Las Vegas, New Mexico, to secure eligibles from which to make certification to fill a vacancy in the position of railway mail clerk in New Mexico, and similar vacancies as they may occur in that state. Age limit, 18 to 25 years on the date of examination. Applicants must be at least 5 feet 6 inches in height and weigh not less than 125 pounds in ordinary clothing. Applicants should at once apply to the local secretaries at either of the places mentioned above for application form No. 394, and for further information.


