SCHOOL CENSUS SHOWS NEW MEXICO'S POPULATION

OVER 80,000 PERSONS BETWEEN AGES OF 5 AND 20 YEARS IN THE TERRITORY.

Superintendent of Public Instruction Hiram Hadley has received final reports from all counties in New Mexico save Roosevelt in the matter of the school census. The census this year has been made more carefully than ever before and shows, aside from Roosevelt county, and several small districts not yet reported, that there are 80,000 persons of school age in New Mexico between the ages of 5 and 20 years. This census would indicate that New Mexico at the present time has a population of considerable over 300,000.
