A man giving his name as Walter Carr, was brought into Albuquerque last night by Charles Mainz, Santa Fe officer, at Isleta, and lodged in the county jail, charged with breaking into a sealed car. Carr is one of two hobos who pried open the door into a sealed car near Lakuna yesterday morning. Carr proceeded to investigate the contents of the car, when a brakeman happened along, and after a struggle succeeded in locking both men in the car. The train kept on its way to Albuquerque, but the hobos were restless and finally smashed out the rear end of the car, making their escape when the train was nearing Isleta. One of the men got away, but Carr was caught by the officer at Isleta and landed in jail.

McKINLEY COUNTY IS SOLD FOR JOINT STATEHOOD

Gallup Will Tell Tawney a Thing or Two.

Correspondence Morning Journal. Gallup, N. M., Oct. 14.—According to an announcement made by the republicans of McKinley county to be held tonight at the I. O. O. F. hall to elect a committeeman from this county to the joint statehood league, it is intended to make this meeting a rousing one and to take action toward giving the congressional party a few pointers when they return to Gallup on their return trip east. McKinley county is practically solid for joint statehood and it is the desire of the people of Gallup to impress this fact forcibly upon Congressman Tawney and his friends.

The McKinley County Republican published at Gallup, is one of the best and most wide-awake weeklies of the territory. It has developed into one of the most vigorous and effective champions of joint statehood among the New Mexico press and is helping the movement along right royally.

McKinley county is for joint statehood; the county has declared itself for the measure. At the next meeting of congress the senate of the United States will surely put the bill through and out of Arizona and New Mexico will come the great state of Arizona.

In Arizona there is a pronounced opposition to the jointure, but within the last few months there has come a change and many who heretofore have been against the jointure are now for it. Two of the leading papers of Arizona are open in advocating the measure and within a short time one of the leading republican dailies of the territory will come out in favor of the bill. This paper is located in a part of Arizona where the very mention of joint statehood throws the people into three kinds of fits.

Buying orders caused December to advance a shade from the bottom, the closing being at 28 1/2. December corn started at 44 1/2, but declined later and closed at bottom price for day, 44 1/2. December oats closed at 28 1/2, after ranging between 28 1/2 and 28 1/2.

This mine has been a great producer and has borne the distinction of being the only hard coal mine in New Mexico that has been any kind of a paying proposition. This mine is now the only producer here, getting out about 200 tons per day.
