

### COMBATANTS HAD TO BE ARRESTED TWICE TO STOP THE FIGHT

#### Prolonged Hostilities Cause Excitement Downtown.

#### JACK DIXON BADLY CUT IN AFFRAY WITH FRANK WEST

Jack Dixon and Frank West were arrested last night and taken to the city jail to appear before Judge Crawford for a hearing this morning. The arrest of West and Dixon was made after the two had engaged in more or less intermittent hostilities from five o'clock until half past six.

The trouble started in the St Elmo saloon at five o'clock when some angry words passed between the two men and they were separated by friends. Dixon went out the front door at the same time that West made his exit by the back door. A few minutes later they met again in the alley back of the saloon and there was a violent encounter in which rocks flew fast for a few minutes. The few witnesses of the affray say Dixon received a stunning blow in the head with a rock thrown by West.

Both men were then arrested and each gave a \$20 bond for his appearance in police court. Dixon's head was found to be badly cut.

It was thought this ended the trouble, but about 6:30 West came into Graham's saloon, where Dixon was standing, and made an attack on the latter, striking him a blow on the head. The men were again separated and West walked up to the room occupied by himself and Dixon at the corner of Fourth and Copper. Dixon followed him to the room and when West entered he followed to follow him in. West then produced a gun and stood off the invader until the police arrived and took both of the belligerents to jail.

Quite a little excitement was occasioned in the lower part of town while the hostilities were in progress because it was evident both men wanted trouble and each was willing to start the festivities without much urging. The bad feeling between the two was of recent origin, because they have been rooming together amicably for some time.

Police Court Grist. Judge Crawford had a large and intelligent audience when police court opened yesterday morning. The attendance upon this function being larger than usual. There were ten offenders lined up on the mournful bench, mostly plain drunks and vagrants, and about as unpromising a looking bunch as often gathers in the city temple of justice.

Jacob Dallas, pater, and William Dallas, filius, who were arrested while engaged in a violent encounter in the alley near the New York saloon, each received ten days in jail. It is suspected that both are slightly unbalanced. The men have been working in the Santa Fe shops.

Teodoro and Adolfo Padilla and Frank Moore and Daniel Cragin, four boys found sleeping in Santa Fe box cars, were released upon their promise to be more careful in their choice of lodging in the future.

Jacob Garcia and E. J. Cheteloup, the latter being known as "Muckmelon," were each given the conventional five. An Indian named Francisco Chaves will have another hearing this morning on the charge of running amuck.

Harry Storm was given five days in jail for peddling without a license.

Custer Hearing Continued. The hearing of William Custer, which was to have been held yesterday before United States Commissioner Whiting, was postponed until Monday upon request of Attorney Hancock with breaking into a Santa Fe box car at Laguna several weeks ago.

### MATERIAL ARRIVES FOR CAR LINE EXTENSION

#### LAS VEGAS COMPANY UNLOADING CARLOAD OF WIRE WORTH NINE THOUSAND DOLLARS.

The Las Vegas Railway and Power Co. has just received a carload of wire for the extension of their railway lines. The shipment consisted of ten coils of No. 8 copper wire for carrying the current, four miles of 200,000 wire, one inch in diameter, to be used for feeders, and eight miles of trolley wire. The contents of the car are valued at \$9,000.

There are now three car loads of steel rails in the railroad yards for the additional track and four or five cars yet to follow, or 250 tons of rails in all. The rails are worth \$45 a ton or \$14,500.

The lower end of the railway line has now been wired as far as the Santa Fe yards and ice cars can be taken to the yards by the engine. The work and material used in completing the wiring of the line to the yards cost the company about \$1,500.

The company is now awaiting the engines for their new power house, two of which are to be immense affairs. The fly wheel of one of the engines is to be sixteen feet in diameter and will weigh over 30,000 pounds. The engine complete will weigh at the minimum, according to specifications, 49,000 pounds, and the complete engine will weigh 150,000 pounds.

There will be six engines altogether furnishing a great deal more power than is needed, but the company is confident that Las Vegas will soon almost double in size.

No More Starvation in Rome. Rome, Oct. 25.—Rome is soon to have the "bread house" which was promised the Eternal City last year. The idea on which the unique charitable rests is that man comes into the world with the right to eat, so this is to be a baker, giving bread to those who cannot buy, and furnishing it to the poor who can at a price which will leave the smallest margin of profit. It is also intended to provide charitable institutions with the bread at the same low price; and it is calculated that the small profit realized on the sales will pay the cost of what is given gratuitously.

When the "bread house" is in good working order similar institutions will be established in other towns until even the smallest village in Italy will have its "bread house," and death from starvation will be an impossibility.

### IMPROVEMENTS IN CONGREGATIONAL CHURCH TO PROCEED

#### Executive Committee Ratifies Plans.

#### EXTERIOR AND INTERIOR CHANGES WILL COST \$3,000

Last night at the Congregational church on South Broadway the executive committee appointed by the church to take action on the contemplated improvements in the church building held a meeting and voted unanimously to proceed at once with the betterments as planned. The trustees and various committees of the church were well represented at the meeting and all those present were enthusiastic in their approval of the plan to make the Congregational church one of the handsomest and most conveniently arranged houses of worship in the city. The bids will at once be let for the improvements, both inside and outside, and the work will be finished as soon as possible.

As stated before in the Morning Journal the principal improvements planned are the installation of a pipe organ and comfortable pews in place of the seating accommodations now used, a complete steam heating plant, interior decorating and exterior painting, the whole to cost at least three thousand dollars, and perhaps more. The Congregational church will be one of the finest in this part of the territory when the changes are completed.



That the household's guest is a Union sympathizer contrasts Polly with a lot of embarrassments that tax her woman's ingenuity to the last degree. But she makes her way through all the entanglements with a laughing good humor that keeps the spectators on the pleasantest of terms with her, and employs, too, now and then, a pretty little stratagem to take the twist out of the skein. After a time a second guest of the family yields to Polly's charming vivacity and cleverness and becomes the Union admiral's rival. He finally accuses him of being a federal spy; and in a moment of southern patriotism Polly even orders him from the house. He returns soon, however, to prove that his accusation is himself a spy and the story winds up with an engagement between the estranged lovers while the other flies by night on Colonel Primrose's stolen horse from the wrath he knows his duplicity has aroused. Miss Carol Arden, who is to play the part of winning new laurels as "Polly." A more charming and artfully artless little tease was never seen on the stage.

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### SIX MINERS STUNNED BY DEADLY DYNAMITE

GUNNYSACK FULL EXPLODES IN MINE CAR WITH TERRIFIC RESULTS.

Trinidad, Oct. 25.—The Advertiser says: Six miners were stunned by the explosion of several sticks of dynamite just at the entrance to the Starkville mine yesterday morning at about 7 o'clock. That all of the men were not killed is a miracle. The men had boarded a coal car and were on their way into the mine to go to work. Mr. Teel, one of the miners, had a gunnysack containing several sticks of dynamite, which he intended using for blasting purposes. Mr. Teel placed the sack in the bottom of the car, which was damp. The car is metallic in its construction and when the mouth of the mine was reached Adolph Hiabic, a miner who stood next to Teel, told him that he had better lift his sack from the car as its metallic bottom together with a damp sack of dynamite were extremely dangerous with an electric cable overhead. Mr. Teel immediately picked up the dangerous sack, but scarcely had he lifted it from the floor when a deafening explosion occurred, and the six occupants of the car were hurled to the floor, stunned and badly burned. The car was immediately stopped and help was obtained. The unfortunate men who occupied the car at the time of the accident were David H. Davis, Thomas Teel, Adolph Hiabic, Germans Zanzlina, and an Italian and Englishman whose names are not known. Hiabic, the man who warned Teel, was the most severely injured, but, although the men are all confined to their homes, they will all probably recover.
