COMMITTEE WILL GO TO WASHINGTON

TO URGE PROMPT ACTION ON CARLSBAD RESERVOIR PROJECT.

Tuesday afternoon a meeting was held in the Commercial club rooms to discuss the advisability of sending a committee to Washington for the purpose of calling on Secretary Hitchcock and urging prompt action on the Carlsbad project, says the Carlsbad Argus.

Present were J. O. Cameron, J. Frank Joyce, J. E. Laverty, W. C. Brown, W. A. Finley, W. R. Hess, W. H. Hall, Dr. C. M. Wheeler, R. M. Thorpe, E. G. Tracy, J. B. Walker, C. H. McLaughlin, S. L. Roberts, L. O. Fulton, L. A. Segrist, W. H. Mullane, A. M. Howe and others.

After some discussion it was decided to send a committee to see the secretary of the interior in regard to the Carlsbad project. J. O. Cameron, F. G. Tracy, and A. M. Howe were appointed to select a committee.

J. Frank Joyce, W. H. Mullane, and A. C. Heard were selected to solicit funds for defraying the expenses of the committee. The meeting adjourned subject to call.

READY TO REPORT ON TAXATION KICKS

JARAMILLO AND SAFFORD COMPLETE WORK IN BERNALILLO AND SANDOVAL COUNTIES.

Vencelso Jaramillo, of Rio Arriba county, secretary of the New Mexico board of equalization, and Traveling Auditor Charles V. Safford have returned to Santa Fe after several days in Bernalillo county examining certain protests filed before the board at its recent meeting, on tax assessments in the two counties. The board will meet the first Monday in January to consider and make final decisions on these protests. The protests from the counties have not been of material importance, but there has been a lively time in Sandoval county over the assessments, one of the Sandoval factions making the open claim, demonstrated by records and property values that the other Sandoval faction which is in power has been "chinchin" the others in their assessments. The question is a delicate one and the decision of the board will be awaited with considerable interest.
