NEW PRECINCT TO BE NAMED SAN JOSE

LOPPED OFF OF BARELAS PRECINCT—COMMISSIONERS TO REPAIR CORRALES BRIDGE.

At the regular monthly meeting of the board of county commissioners a decision was made yesterday it was decided to divide voting precinct No. 5, or Barelas, in two. The new precinct will be known as the San Jose precinct No. 1.

A special election has been called for November 22 when a justice of the peace and a constable will be elected for the new precinct. The clerk of the board was instructed to notify County Surveyor Don J. Rankin to prepare plans and specifications for the reconstruction of the dilapidated and impassable bridge across the Rio Grande at Corrales, ten miles north of this city. It will be remembered that this bridge was in Bernalillo county the claim being previously made that it was in Sandoval county.

Daniel Josiah Scuzges, Dr. Fayette A. Jones and E. H. Kent were appointed delegates to the American Mining congress which meets at El Paso on the 15th of this month.

Considerable other routine county business was attended to by the board.


