

FIERCE BATTLES ON EASTERN GRIDIRONS

QUAKERS WIN FROM THE CRIMSON AFTER MAGNIFICENT FIGHT

Pennsy's Superb Work Rolls By Hard Work Soldiers Up Score of 12 to 6.

25,000 SEE BEST GAME EVER ON FRANKLIN FIELD

Philadelphia, Pa., Nov. 11.—Pennsylvania today defeated Harvard in one of the fiercest gridiron battles ever witnessed on Franklin field. The final score was 12 to 6. Both eleven scored a touchdown and kicked the goal in the first half and the Quakers eleven added a second touchdown in the second half.

It is a peculiar coincidence that Lawson, the ball player over whom there has been so much contention, should have scored both touchdowns for the Pennsylvania eleven. The players of the two eleven were made apparent early in the first half, when Parker, the crimson center, was disqualified for slugging and again in the second half, when he was sent to the club house for a like offense.

Both touchdowns in the first half were due to luck. The numerous changes in the Harvard line-up after the first quarter, which the Pennsylvania players went into the play. Five men were so badly weakened that they were sent to the side line. The Pennsylvania line-up remained intact, however.

There was probably never a football game played in which there was such a difference in the two halves. In the first half Harvard completely outplayed Pennsylvania and gained ground almost at will, while in the second half the crimson players made only one touchdown. Both their offense and defense weakened perceptibly as the game progressed. This was probably due to the overexertion of the Quaker eleven.

The particular star of Franklin field today was little Levin, Pennsylvania's left end. It is no exaggeration to state that he played the most remarkable game of football ever witnessed in this city. The day was perfect for football, the crowd was the largest that ever witnessed a game of football in Philadelphia. Not one of the 25,000 odd seats was vacant when the play began and there were probably two thousand persons standing around the gridiron.

DAN PATCH LOWERS WORLD'S PACING RECORD

CHAMPION CUTS OWN TIME FOR MILE TO 1:58 FLAT AT MEMPHIS.

Memphis, Nov. 11.—Dan Patch, the pacing champion, in an exhibition mile today on the track of the Memphis Trotting association, lowered the world's pacing record without a wind shield by 1/4 seconds, covering the mile in 1:58 flat. The former record of 1:59 1/2 was held by Star Pointer, made several years ago at the Readville track.

Weather and track conditions were ideal for the attempt. Hersey, the driver, sent the black pacer away at the first attempt. The first quarter was started in 39 seconds. Straightening out down the backstretch Dan Patch never faltered and passed the half-mile post in 59 seconds. At the three-quarters the timers showed 1:28 and after a drive down the stretch the wire was reached in 1:55. Two runners accompanied the pacer, and he was apparently very tired at the finish.

Ridgeway Not Worried. Washington, Nov. 11.—Mr. Ridgeway, comptroller of the currency, attached no particular importance to the bank statement in New York yesterday, stating that it is not unusual for the reserve of a national bank to fall temporarily below the legal requirements. "A bank he said, is not required to suspend payment for the purpose of maintaining a legal reserve. When, however, a legal reserve falls below a certain amount, the law provides that the bank shall not make any further loans until the reserve is made good."

Prince Louis of Battenberg was a spectator of the game. He watched it intently throughout, seldom taking his gaze off the players. Two entirely different types of football players were pitted against each other in the Indians using trick plays throughout the game and the army eleven relying on its superior physical strength to crush its way to the goal line.

New Haven, Nov. 11.—In a game full of sensational plays, Yale defeated Brown university today by a score of 11 to 0.

Three weeks from yesterday the locals will meet the team from the Agricultural college.
