

# STABBING AFFRAY IN LUMBER CAMP MAY MEAN MURDER

## Martin Liese Fatally Wounded by Tom Maxwell.

### ASSAILANT NOW HIDING IN MOUNTAINS NEAR ROWE

#### Sheriff Baca of Valencia County Leaves With Posse to Capture Fugitive.

Martin Liese, a lumber jack in the employ of the Horabin-McGaffey company in the Zuni mountains was stabbed twice through the lung in an affray at the Kettner lumber camp yesterday by Tom Maxwell, and is not expected to live. Maxwell is in hiding in the mountains near Rowe camp. Liese will be brought in to this city this morning and placed in the hospital if he is alive upon his arrival here.

He is dangerously wounded and when he left Thoreau last night it was not expected that he would survive more than half the journey to the hospital.

Mr. McGaffey received a telegram yesterday morning asking that the sheriff of Valencia county be sent at once with a posse to capture Maxwell who had escaped, heavily armed, and defied arrest. Accordingly a message was sent to Sheriff Carlos Baca at Los Lunas who with a posse immediately drove overland to this city, reaching here in time to take the train for the west last night.

Maxwell is well known in this city. He was the big cow-puncher who wanted to ride "Star," the outlaw terror at the last Territorial fair, but who was refused the privilege. He has heretofore borne a peaceable reputation, but from last night's news from Thoreau it is probable that he will have a first class murder to answer for. Maxwell is known to be a desperate man, however, when cornered, and Mr. Baca and his deputies expect serious trouble before he is captured.

Both Maxwell and Liese were drunk when the stabbing occurred.

# BIG SOFT COAL MINE AT MADRID IS A FURNACE

## Stubborn Fire Rages in Depths of the Colliery.

### MAIN TUNNEL BULKHEADED TO SMOTHER CONFLAGRATION

The big bituminous coal mine of the Colorado Fuel and Iron company, at Madrid, is on fire and the main tunnel has been bulkheaded in the hope of smothering out the flames, which are raging in the subterranean depths.

The fire started in the mine on last Saturday and every effort has been made since that time to extinguish the flames without avail.

Yesterday the fire fighters were driven back by the smoke and gas. As a last resort a bulkhead was erected in the mine and it is hoped that the fire will smolder itself out.

It was impossible to determine the exact extent of the fire. The flames gained headway with great rapidity after the start and the whole interior is said to be a seething mass of flames. The fire is so far back in the mine that it is very difficult to combat and many of the men were nearly overcome while aiding in the work of smothering the blaze.

The mine is one of the biggest producers of soft coal in the territory and the C. F. & I. company has been furnishing a large tonnage to the Santa Fe and other railroad companies from this mine.

The conflagration has thrown about two hundred men out of employment temporarily and the loss will amount to several thousands of dollars. The exact amount of the damage will not be known until the bulkhead is removed, and it may result in the permanent closing of the mine.

# COAST LINES STOREKEEPER TO BE MOVED TO SAN BERNARDINO

After the first of January it is announced that the office of storekeeper of the coast lines will be removed from Albuquerque to San Bernardino, as the California city is much more central for the coast lines, of which Albuquerque is the extreme eastern terminus.

Storekeeper T. J. Custer when interrogated concerning the rumor yesterday corroborated the story. Mr. Custer and General Storekeeper N. M. Rice, of the Santa Fe, were in San Bernardino recently arranging for the transfer.

It will entail the removal of an office force of about ten men from this city to San Bernardino.

The many friends of Mr. Custer will regret to see him leave this city, and the same applies to the capable force of clerks working under him. The office of coast lines storekeeper has been located in Albuquerque for many years.

**Police Court.**  
John Murphy, an old offender, was sentenced to do thirty days in police court yesterday morning. Murphy is a bad hombre with the Jim-Jams and has been in court on several different occasions for being drunk and creating trouble.

John Rhodes and George Harrison, two saddle-colored descendants of Ham, were before his honor for being drunk and fighting. It developed in the trial that Rhodes started the trouble. He was given five days and Harrison was discharged.

Brady claimed to have been robbed of \$200, but his money was located at Belen, where he had left in charge of a friend. He will tie himself to the cut-off town this evening.

# DESPERATE NEGRO THOUGHT TO BE HIDING HERE

## Officers on Lookout for Escaped Convict.

### TOOK TWO SHOTS AT OFFICER MAINZ AT ISLETA

O. P. Hovey, of Bernalillo, Sandoval county, arrived in the city last night and is registered at the Sturges European. Mr. Hovey is a deputy sheriff of Sandoval county and is in the city looking for James Sanders alias James Gibson, who escaped from the territorial penitentiary at Santa Fe on the 19th of December.

Sanders was seen at Bernalillo on Christmas night and was on Santa Fe train No. 7, coming toward Albuquerque. He is heavily armed. A strict watch is being kept for him by the officers of the different counties and cities of New Mexico and a squad of the territorial mounted police are also out looking for him. He is now believed to be in hiding in this city.

Sanders, who is a negro was doing time in the penitentiary for burglary and larceny and is described as follows: Age, 24; height, 5 feet 4 inches; weight, 160; wearing dark gray shirt of clothes and black hat with high crown; body marks, scar on left side of head, scar on left shoulder, scar on right foot, scar on right knee.

It is understood that the escaped convict is heading for Texas, which is his native state. There is a reward of \$50 for him.

The officers at all points on the road have been notified and he will undoubtedly be captured before he gets very far from this city.

**PROBABLY MAN WHO TOOK A SHOT AT MR. MAINZ**

Early yesterday morning at No. 7 reached Isleta a negro of the description of Sanders was chased off the blind baggage by Special Officer Charles Mainz. A pistol duel took place between the two, which frightened the passengers on No. 7, who believed that the train was being held up. The negro took two shots at Mainz, both of which went wild, and Mainz took a shot at the negro, who made his escape. Mainz stated that he could have easily have dropped the negro and believes that he had sufficient cause, but to avoid trouble he let him go. Mainz telegraphed to Belen to intercept him, but he has not been seen there and there is some doubt in the minds of the officers as to whether Sanders made his way back to this city or went west. The local officers are of the opinion that he came to this city, as he is known to have friends here.


