ELECTS A SCHOOL DIRECTOR ALL HIS OWN

Felipe Hubbell of Pajarito Proceeds to Hold a District Election Under the Law--Proceedings Slightly Irregular.

Felipe Hubbell, of Pajarito, is a gentleman of resources, who believes in taking the boys by the anthers and leading to business without further delay. Some time since there occurred an election of school directors in the precinct of Pajarito. Pajarito is Mr. Hubbell's home, and in the good old days that are no more he was accustomed to look upon it as his own. The votes and all that in it happened to be were voted as Mr. Hubbell desired, and all was serene on the horizon. But days changed and so did votes, and in the last election the director elected didn't please Mr. Hubbell at all.

During the session of the late legislature a new school law was passed. Among other things the law provided that there should be held an election of school directors on the first Monday in April. The law carried the additional provision that ten days' notice in a newspaper of general circulation, or by bulletins conspicuously posted, should be given. Mr. Hubbell's attention was called to the new law a few days before the first Monday in April. The necessity for ten days' notice was not. This latter circumstance was unfortunate. Mr. Hubbell went to the county superintendent and announced that there was going to be an election for a school director in Pajarito precinct. The superintendent was pleased to hear it, but he didn't believe it would be a fair fight. Mr. Hubbell thought it would if he went around and notified every voter in the precinct personally that an election was to be held. The superintendent was mildly doubtful, but as has been said, Mr. Hubbell is not the man to be harried by minor obstacles, and he notified them any way and proceeded to hold the election. There was but one candidate, and he, Romeo Barbas, was elected by unanimous vote of the persons voting. Barbas will, of course, be unable to take his seat as a director of the district since his election was plainly illegal. In addition, Manuel Pina, who served as clerk at the election, it has been pointed out, has not yet become a citizen of the United States.

CRIMINAL CASES ON IN DISTRICT COURT

JUDGE ABBOTT SETS LARGE NUMBER OF CASES

Saloon Keepers Arrested on Indictments Charging Violations of Sunday Law--Store Thief Sentenced.

Judge Abbott put in a busy morning in district court yesterday setting cases on the criminal docket for trial. Those cases in which pleadings have already been heard, and in which the defendant is in the county jail, were set for trial some days ago. There are a considerable number of cases on indictments recently returned by the grand jury still to be set.

The grand jury returned a total of fifty indictments, and while there are few cases of special importance the criminal docket is full and the term will be a busy one. Warrants were served yesterday on three saloon men indicted by the grand jury for violations of the Sunday law. These men are A. Parent, P. Haldrup and Tom Ginn, the latter a bartender employed by Barabara in his saloon. The defendants are on bail and have not yet pleaded to the indictments. Juan Sello is also placed under arrest yesterday on a warrant based on an indictment for impersonating an officer. Sello was arrested by the Albuquerque police after representing himself to be a policeman.

Judge Abbott yesterday passed sentence on the man Trimble, who pleaded guilty to stealing a revolver and other goods from the Whitney company store in the city. The court sentenced Trimble to one year in the penitentiary, but suspended sentence during good behavior. The costs of the case were, however, assessed against the owner, and as he is without funds he will be required to serve out twenty-two additional days in the county jail. ANDREWS CONTEST HEARING IS CLOSED

Effort to Show Intimidation of Voters in Bernalillo County Proves a Dismal Failure, Some Curious Testimony.

After sessions extending over a week, the taking of testimony in the Lavazola-Andrews deputation contest case was concluded yesterday afternoon. The hearings have occurred in the office of W. B. Childers, and have been of considerable interest. The effort of counsel for Andrews in the hearing seems to have been more in the line of an attempt to show intimidation by the people's party in the recent election than to make up any defense for the deputation against the contest instituted by Mr. Lavazola. The effort to show intimidation has proven a somewhat dismal failure, for the very good reason that there does not appear to have been any intimidation.

Starting with old Albuquerque, counsel for Andrews sought to show intimidation in several precincts. In old town the charge was made that bankers were brought in to get inside the voting booth. It has not been customary even in Bernalillo county under the old regime, to allow workers inside the booths, aside from the regular chairmen, who may stand at the window. It was shown at the hearing that the Hubbell ticket was allowed a challenger at the window in the person of Xavier Montoya. Other workers who asked to step inside were not allowed to do so.

In Turkeys the Hon. Esteban Vigil testified that a deputy sheriff followed him around all day. Vigil said it was embarrassing to have the deputy following him around, and that he couldn't operate his elevator machinery at all under the eyes of the minister of the law. In two other precincts in which counsel for Andrews sought to show intimidation, it was proved at the hearing that the position of challenger in the precincts in question had been lost for Andrews.

The hearing has served to bring out the fact that the election in this county last November was the cleanest election ever held in Bernalillo county.

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Dissolution of Partnership. 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The public schools of the town of Las Vegas were closed on Saturday afternoon as a diphtheria scare will be reopened Monday. There were very few cases in that town or city and there has been no spread of the disease.

Evidence is being taken in the county precincts of this county in behalf of Debra Andrews in the Lavazola-Andrews election contest.

The fifty people who were expected in Las Vegas tomorrow to examine grant lands, concluded not to come on account of the fear of a railway strike. Rev. Richard A. Morley got in this afternoon with a few prospective purchasers.

A report of a rich find of copper ore running about fifty per cent copper, has been brought to the city from the Tropic district. There are vast bodies of copper in this district but the grade has always been considered low.

Hon. Christobal Sanchez, for many years a member of the legislature from Mora county and the most prominent republican in the county died this morning at the insane asylum where he has been confined for some months. Mr. Sanchez was a prominent figure in the hall of the legislative assembly. He was a skillful organizer and an eloquent speaker. He held a number of positions of trust during his long career.

Thieves entered the store of Mrs. Frank Manzanara of Upper Las Vegas recently and got away with \$1,200 worth of jewels, several of them being Spanish heirlooms of much more value to the family than the intrinsic value. The police have several suspects under surveillance.

The community was relieved this morning to hear of the sudden death of Percy J. Farmer, of the Romero ranch of Miss Jennie Farmer, sister of Dr. Foster. The young lady complained of feeling faint while at breakfast this morning. In a few moments she became unconscious and died almost instantly.

Sudden heart failure is thought to have been the cause of death. Miss Farmer came here from St. Louis three years ago, accompanying her brother, who purchased the Montezuma ranch resort, and has conducted a large sanitarium since. She was of robust physique and had always been in the best of health. The young lady's father, J. B. Farmer, general manager of the Blauvelt-Venture company of St. Louis, and his daughter, are visiting at the ranch. The body will be shipped to St. Louis for burial.

J. B. Mosher, proprietor of the Grand Leader department store, has filed a petition in voluntary bankruptcy. Colonel J. B. Taylor, who has been again referred. The first hearing of creditors will be held April 15. Mr. Mosher established the Grand Leader last October, he overstocked, and after making several efforts to meet his obligations by means of special sales was forced to resort to bankruptcy.
