A conference to regulate athletic relations between high schools, known as the New Mexico High School Athletic Association, was organized here yesterday.

President—J. J. Gilling, principal of the Albuquerque high school. Vice President—E. D. Bremer, head teacher.

The association will look after inter-school contests in football, basketball, soccer, tennis, hockey and all other sports.

A provision is made for determining with fairness to all schools the state basketball championship was considered. The plan is to divide the state into several sections.

The University of New Mexico, which heretofore has managed the annual interscholastic track and field meet, will co-operate with the association to the extent of continuing to stage this event.

SUBMARINES OF PRESENT TYPES ARE TOO SMALL

Difficulties Encountered by 800 Ton Boats in Recent Maneuvers May Force Change.

Washington, Nov. 23.—Abandonment of the present coast defense type submarines in favor of larger sea going submarines may be recommended by the navy department as a result of lessons learned during the recent maneuvers of the Atlantic fleet and unofficial information concerning the size of underwater craft in service in Europe.

These indications, it was said today, that the United States is lagging behind in submarine development went even with one 1,000-ton submarine having completed and two of 1,500 tons soon to be ordered.

Had Many Difficulties. Reports on the fleet maneuvers, it is just becoming known, tell graphic stories of the difficulties encountered by the twelve little submarines attached to the "blue" force commanded by Admiral Fletcher and defending the coast against a theoretical enemy.

Six Hours to Get Orders. For the purposes of the maneuvers Admiral Fletcher placed his submarines in reserve, ready to strike north or south as the movements of the "red" boats dictated.

Finally, the flotilla started southward, but was able to make less than half the speed required to bring it to its appointed station on time.

American Boats Too Small. While no definite recommendations have been made as to the size of a submarine so small as the present type for coast defense work, it is being seriously considered.
