
The Sacred concert given by the Presbyterian choir Easter night, in the Presbyterian church, under the able direction of Mrs. William J. Fauth, assisted by Mrs. Ralph M. Henderson, Mr. A. W. The church was crowded and there was scarcely a sound during the impressive solo of Mrs. Fauth "Angels Roll the Rock Away" (Hawley) which seemed to be written especially for her wonderful contralto voice, and which brought out so effectively the rich notes which are so full of sympathy and feeling. The tenor solo, "Alleluia" (Neidinger) by Mr. Beckner was a beautiful song, and sung with such a perfect control of voice and manner that it was indeed a pleasure to listen to. The violin solo "To a Wild Rose" (MacDowell) by Mrs. Henderson brought forth much pleasure. Mr. Teare's tenor solo work in the anthem "Christ is Risen" (Dressler) with the violin obbligato was very effective. Each number of the choir was splendid and showed the faithful work they have been putting into this music for several weeks, under the kind and efficient leadership of Mrs. Fauth.
