Cavalry Troops Are Reported to Have Crossed Rio Grande to Rescue Citizen of United States.

PARLEY FOR EXCHANGE OF PRISONERS FUTILE

ASQUITH POURS OIL ON TROUBLED WATERS OF ERIN

Visit of Premier to Dublin Is Believed to Open Way to the Unraveling of Irish Tangle.
