on which the proposal could be founded. The United States now is waiting for General Carranza's final word in reply to the note, and it is demanding release of the prisoners taken at Carrizal and a formal diplomatic announcement of intentions.

**Note Reached Mexico.**  
The note reached Mexico City late last night. Special Agent Rodgers reported its receipt, adding that he had failed in his first efforts to place it in the hands of the Carranza minister of foreign relations. Unfoundedly it was delivered today. Officials looked for an answer within a day or two at most.

**Plans for Military Conscription.**  
Plans for military conscription over newspapers, magazines and other publications as well as over lines of communication, were talked over. A resolution conferring broad powers in this regard upon the president was framed for submission to congress.

**Draft Measures.**  
In the senate the national guard draft resolution was passed with amendments which will necessitate its return to the house and possibly a conference before its final approval. Army officials await with impatience the authority to consolidate incomplete units of the national guard.

**They estimate that when the regiments reach the border under the new orders some companies will be promptly depleted by the men discovered to be physically unfit on final examination. If they can combine these incomplete units for immediate service and add new companies as recruits are sent south there will be little delay in getting all available men into active service.**

**10,000 Men for Border.**  
Indications tonight were that 10,000 additional might reach the border this week. In two weeks probably 50,000 could be transported south and within three weeks the whole force summoned under President Wilson's call might be moved. Reports as to



## Never Mind the Hot Weather

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## NEGRO TROOPERS FACED FIRE OF DEATH SMILING

Tale of Remarkable Valor Brought Back to Pershing by Captain Morey; Officers Showed Heroism.

**BY MORNING JOURNAL SPECIAL LEASED WIRE.**  
Field Headquarters, Mexico, June 26 (By Wireless to Columbus, N. M.)—American negro troopers faced almost certain death at Carrizal with smiles in their eyes and sang on their lips and they burst into song once or twice as they fought their grim fight against odds. This was the story told by Capt. Lewis S. Morey when he arrived at field headquarters.

For forty-five minutes the men fought, joking among themselves all the while, even though they realized they had been trapped and had little chance of getting out alive.

**Captain Morey's Valor.**  
Captain Morey, the youngest and most valorous of the negro troopers, was captured by Capt. Charles P. Boyd in leading a handful of dismounted skirmishers through the machine gun fire and into the ambush of death. He added that it was not until their ammunition was exhausted that the troop was finally cut to pieces, and he told of the heroic effort of Lieut. Henry H. Adair, of Portland, Ore., in an attempt to replenish it.

Lieutenant Adair fell fighting, his last words being "Go on, sergeant," to a non-commissioned officer at his side, Captain Morey said.

**Falls Into Ditch.**  
The two were on their way to the pack animal carrying the ammunition when they were intercepted near a small irrigation ditch by a detail of the Mexican. Lieutenant Adair had already been wounded and had lost his pistol in the previous fighting, but he had borrowed another and was fighting a gallant battle. He fell backward unconscious and was caught by the negro sergeant as he slid toward the ditch, which was deeply filled with water. The sergeant held Adair in his arms, his face above the water, until the wounded officer revived only long enough to whisper orders to leave him and finish the mission, Captain Morey said.

**Troops Had to Separate.**  
The size of the battlefield and the cover from which the Mexicans fought made it impossible for the American troops to fight with the Mexicans. Captain Morey said.

**Oil Wells May Be Safe.**  
In connection with the oil fields of the Tampico region it is known that the attitude of the Carranza commander in charge at the fields themselves has been more conservative than that of General Nafarrete, at Tampico. State department officials feel that this condition may serve to protect the wells somewhat in the event of war.

**Guard Mobilization Completed on Coast.**  
San Francisco, Calif., June 26.—Mobilization of the national guard of the three western seaboard states was practically completed today. All of Oregon's militiamen were awaiting orders at Camp Withycombe and the remaining four companies of the California and Washington regiments were expected to arrive today at the camps at Sacramento and American Lake, respectively.

**American Refugees Arrive.**  
Vera Cruz, June 26.—Every train arriving in Vera Cruz brings addition of Americans from the interior, hundreds arriving from Mexico tonight. According to consular reports, 250 civilians now are being cared for aboard the Nebraska. Consul W. W. Canada reports quiet all along the entire east coast.

**'CALUMNY FLOOD' IS STARTED IN FRANCE.**  
Paris, June 26.—The chamber of deputies last night appropriated 25,000,000 francs as a secret fund for the ministry of foreign affairs. It was explained by Alexander Ribot, minister of finance, that this amount was necessary to defend France against a campaign of calumny.

**Accused U. S. Attorney Gets Habeas Corpus.**  
New York, June 26.—H. Snowden Marshall, federal district attorney, was today served with a warrant in connection with his alleged contempt of congress for refusing to testify before a sub-committee involving impeachment charges made against him by Representative Buchanan. Mr. Marshall immediately obtained a writ of habeas corpus.

**Troops Ordered South.**  
New York, June 26.—Besides those from New York, New Jersey and Massachusetts, about 15,000 additional troops under the command of the department of the coast, have been ordered to start for the border tomorrow. It was announced at headquarters. Fourteen regiments were under orders to start before tonight.

**Railroads Asked to Co-operate.**  
Washington, June 26.—Railroads throughout the United States have been notified to expedite the movement of all government supplies consigned to the Mexican border. It was announced today by the American Railway association.

## MOBILIZATION OF GUARDSMEN IS SHOWING SPEED

Transportation Facilities Being Improved; Many Contingents Are Ready to Start for Mexican Border.

Washington, June 26.—Speeding up of the mobilization of national guardsmen was reported to the war department today from nearly all states, and word was expected momentarily by the national guard division that the first contingents had started for the border.

**Everything Working Smoothly.**  
General Scott, chief of staff, said elaborate and smoothly working state machinery was in operation to expedite transportation of the guardsmen south. Their troops and supply trains have the right of way, even to sidetracking limited passenger trains.

**Physical Examination Delays.**  
Physical examination and lack of equipment is delaying militia in some states. It is pointed out that state authorities and not the federal government are responsible for any shortage of uniforms, rifles and other materials, the regulations requiring that sufficient quantities be on hand at all times to equip militia units up to their peace strength.

**Despite Embargo, Food Shipments Pass.**  
Nogales, Ariz., June 26.—Details of the Arizona national guard went on border guard duty here tonight, it being the first time, it is said here, since the Spanish-American war that any United States troops, other than regulars, have been this close to a foreign coast.

**Immense Interest on Dividend Payments.**  
New York, June 26.—Mid-year interest on dividend payments as completed by the Commercial and Finance will aggregate \$23,272,540, exceeding last year's disbursements for that, which constituted the previous record, by \$12,551,678.

**DERANGED SERGEANT ATTEMPTS TO KILL.**  
Savannah, Ga., June 26.—A deranged mentally deranged by the military movements, and worry over his business affairs, Thomas K. Henderson, first sergeant of Company C, Fifth infantry, of Berkeley, tried to kill Second Lieut. Fred L. Hopkins of Company C, Second infantry, of Fresno, because Hopkins would not obey his orders. His shot missed its mark.

**NEWLY MARRIED AIRMAN DIES OF WOUNDS.**  
Oshkosh, Wis., June 26.—Charles Niles, the aviator who fell here yesterday while looping the loop in a war monoplane, died this morning at a nearby hospital. His wife, Mrs. Mary Niles, hemorrhaged of the brain due to his injuries caused his death. He was 26 years of age, and was born at Rochester, N. Y. Niles was married last Friday at Chicago to Mrs. Lucille Goddard of La Grange, Philippine islands.

**Deficiency Bill Prepared.**  
Washington, June 26.—An urgent deficiency bill, appropriating \$25,000,000 to cover the expense of mobilizing, equipping and transporting national guardsmen, was prepared today by the house appropriation committee for submission tomorrow.

**British Steamer Sunk.**  
London, June 26.—Sinking of the British steamer Canford (China) of Cardiff by a submarine off Calcutta, Spain, last night, is reported in a letter telegram from Barcelona. The captain and twelve of the crew were landed at Barcelona.

## TROOPERS WERE ON LEGITIMATE MISSION, BELIEF

American Soldiers' Patrolling Around Carrizal Was Done in Expectation of Carrancistas' Co-operation.

Field Headquarters, June 26 (via Wireless to Columbus, N. M.)—It was both a peaceful and permissible mission in which the two troops of the Tenth cavalry, commanded by Capt. C. T. Boyd, were engaged upon when they fought Carranza troops at Carrizal last Wednesday, according to a view expressed by officers today with General Pershing's column.

**AMERICAN-MEXICAN CLASH IS RUMORED.**  
Columbus, N. M., June 26.—A report was in circulation here today that another clash of American and Carrancista troops had occurred in the vicinity of Villa Ahumada, but army officers here have not confirmed it.

**SENATE CANNOT SEE EMERGENCY EXISTS.**  
Washington, June 26.—The Hay resolution providing for draft of national guardsmen into the federal service was amended by the senate today to eliminate the \$1,000,000 appropriation for relief of guardsmen's families. A provision was substituted, however, which would exempt dependent families would be leaving from the draft.

**GERMANS NEAR FIRST LINES AT VERDUN.**  
Paris, June 26.—The Germans are now three-quarters of a mile from the French lines immediately in front of the fortress of Verdun, but no operation has as yet been undertaken elsewhere to relieve the pressure on the citadel.

**SEVEN VESSELS ARE REPORTED SUNK.**  
London, June 26 (2:15 p. m.)—The sinking of seven vessels was reported today. All were sailing except the British steamship Astrolazer, 918 tons gross, owned in Leth. Eight members of the Astrolazer's crew were landed and the remainder are missing. The sailing vessels were four Italian, one French and one of unknown nationality.
