RAILROAD MEN IN SOUTH WALES ARE AFTER MORE PAY

3,000 Workers Threaten to Strike Unless They Receive an Increase in Wages; Want Food Prices Regulated.

London, Sept. 10 (12 p. m.)—The situation resulting from the railway men's demand for an increase in wages of ten shillings a week has become increasingly serious. At a meeting of 3,000 railway workers at Cardiff today, a resolution was adopted providing that unless the demands are conceded by September 16, all railway work will be stopped in South Wales at midnight the 17th.

The resolution also stated that the advance in wages should date from July 1 and that the government should give a definite guarantee that in the future it will control the supply of food and regulate prices. General Strike. Judging from the government's attitude hitherto regarding the question of the control of food, its distribution and prices, there is little likelihood that it will yield to such a demand and should the railway workers in the other parts of the country enforce the action of the South Wales men, there is danger of a general railway strike.

Mr. Bellamy, president of the National Railway Men's Union, speaking at Doncaster tonight, expressed the willingness of the men to withdraw their demand for an increase of wages if the government would do something like their prices before the war.

PRISONERS BLIND HEAD KEEPER AND OBTAIN LIBERTY

New York, Sept. 10.—Four prisoners charged with minor offenses escaped from the detention penitentiary of the west side prison here tonight, after throwing red pepper in the eyes of William J. Jackson, the head keeper, rendering him unconscious by striking him on the head with a pitcher, and taking his keys. Two of the fugitives were recaptured.

According to physicians, Jackson may be permanently blind. The other sixteen inmates made an attempt to follow the headkeepers. One of them went to the assistance of Jackson, and another rang the prison alarm bell.

MANY BATTLESHIPS TO HOLD TARGET PRACTICE. Old Point Comfort, Va., Sept. 10.—Fifty odd battleships, destroyers and supply ships of the Atlantic fleet, stripped down to battle trim will steam from Hampton Roads tomorrow for the southern drill grounds off the Virginia capes, to engage in what naval officers say will be the most important tactical maneuver and target practice ever held in the fleet.

With the fleet now en route, the ships that ever before were assembled under the American flag, including the Pennsylvania, Oklahoma and Nevada, the newest super-dreadnoughts, which carry 14-inch rifles in the main batteries. Officers say there will be firing at longer ranges than ever before attempted.
