

WILSON REPLIES TO CRITICS OF 8-HOUR BILL IN OPENING SPEECH

President Formally Launches His Campaign for Re-election Before a Large Crowd Assembled at Shadow Lawn

ADAMSON MEASURE IS STRONGLY DEFENDED

Chief Cloud on Domestic Horizon Is Unsatisfactory Relations of Capital and Labor; Hughes' Not Mentioned.

BY MORNING JOURNAL SPECIAL LEADER WIRE.—Long Branch, N. J., Sept. 23.—Today President Wilson actively opened his campaign for re-election, with a speech replying to republican criticism of his withdrawal of the recently threatened railroad strike. With emphatic gestures, before a large crowd assembled at Shadow Lawn, he defended the eight-hour day, and declared also that the nation must be freed from the possibility of interference with its commerce. Guestions were from various parts of New Jersey interrupted the president with handclapping and cheering.

TO PREVENT REPETITION

Means of preventing a repetition of the threatened railroad strike were taken up in detail. The president said: "It will be intolerable if at any time, any group of men, by any process, should be suffered to cut supplies off from the necessary supplies which sustain life."

AUSTRIANS FAIL IN ATTACK ON ITALIANS

MACKENSEN SAVAGELY ATTACKED IN RUMANIA

Berlin, Sept. 23 (via London).—The retreat of the German army under Field Marshal von Mackensen in Dobruja has been attacked by Field Marshal von Mackensen's forces on both flanks of the battle line, according to the war office announcement today. The attacks, which on the one flank were near the Danube and on the other southwest of Tuzla, fourteen miles southwest of Constantza, were repulsed.

SLAVS AND RUMANIANS REVEAL SAVY BERLIN

Berlin, Sept. 23 (by wireless to Sayville).—Troops of the central powers have defeated an entente force comprising more than twenty battalions on the Dobruja front, the Bulgarian war office announced in its report of September 22. The hostile attack was beaten off and the forces engaged in it routed by a counter-attack and pursued by cavalry, says the statement, which reads:


