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HERNANDEZ GETS WARM RECEPTION FROM TAOS CROWD

Son of O. A. Larrazolo Challenges Congressman to Debate on Mexican Question; Charge of Deception Made.

Santa Fe, Oct. 2.—At a remarkable political gathering in the plaza at the town of Taos Saturday afternoon John B. Larrazolo, son of Octaviano A. Larrazolo, of Las Vegas, defeated candidates for the republican nomination for supreme court justice, hosted Congressman B. C. Hernandez in a discussion of the Mexican situation.

Young Larrazolo sent to Taos in company with former Governor M. A. Otero and H. L. Hall, democratic candidate for state treasurer, to make the first of a series of speeches for the democratic ticket. After the party reached Taos Hernandez appeared on the scene and as soon as the crowd gathered in the plaza for the political speaking Saturday afternoon Larrazolo took the platform and invited New Mexico's congressman to explain the attitude of Hughes and the republican party toward Mexico.

Hernandez made the attempt, but he had no sooner finished than Larrazolo, who was familiar with every phase of the Mexican question, convinced the audience that Hernandez was not well posted on dates and events of the recent Mexican history; that his statement showed an ignorance of both and that consequently he was not in a position to talk about the Mexican situation.

He then launched on an extended defense of Wilson's Mexican policy, speaking for nearly two hours. The crowd gave him the closest attention and wildly cheered him at frequent intervals. As soon as he stopped talking the crowd broke up, despite the efforts of Congressman Hernandez to hold it.

Candidates in Santa Rosa. A. A. Jones, secretary of State Antonio Lucero and W. B. Walton, democratic candidates who left Las Vegas this morning by automobile, addressed a big meeting in Santa Rosa tonight. At noon today they spoke at Antonchito. Their itinerary calls for speeches at Cuervo Montoya and Tucuman tomorrow, Logan and Nara Vista Wednesday, Amistad and Clayton Thursday, Des Moines and Polson Friday, Springer Saturday, Ocate Sunday and Toy and Wagon Mound next Monday.

On October 14 Mr. Jones will be at Elephant Butte for the purpose of representing President Wilson at the dedication of the Elephant Butte dam.

In Clayton Saturday night 500 people filled the opera house there to hear Harry L. Patton, Bonifacio Montoya and George A. Davidson. The democratic candidates made an excellent impression and there was unbounded enthusiasm.

They visited Amistad, Nara Vista and Logan today, and are in Tucuman tonight. Chairman Arthur Seligman of the democratic state committee today received definite word that Secretary of Labor W. B. Wilson, would be in Albuquerque for an address October 12. He will be on his way to the Pacific coast and the Albuquerque stop will be the only one he will make in New Mexico.

DEMOCRATS OPEN NEW YORK FIGHT WITH CONFIDENCE

Meeting of City and Upstate Chiefs Reflects Enthusiasm for Ticket; Tammany in Line for Vigorous Campaign

New York, Oct. 2.—The democratic campaign in New York really began today at the meeting of the democratic state committee by which President Wilson and his administration received unstinted praise from the assembled upstate and New York city chiefs.

Any question as to the support of the regular democratic organization was answered by the petition of a ringing resolution by Thomas P. Smith, secretary of Tammany hall, pledging the loyal support of that organization to the whole ticket.

This resolution affirmed the confidence of Tammany in President Wilson for his masterful diplomacy which has kept the country out of war and for the constructive legislation which has characterized his administration.

Republicans A War Party Says Senator Reed Missouri Senator Declares Roosevelt Is in Control and That His Battle Creek Speech Smacks of Hostilities

Portsmouth, Mo., Oct. 2.—United States Senator Reed of Missouri, in a speech here tonight, said that the republican party is becoming the war party of the country.

"Roosevelt is in supreme control of the republican party," he said. "Roosevelt's speech, delivered last Saturday at Battle Creek, Mich., is a battle cry. It is a demand for war against Germany which no rational human being can mistake. His words either are the demand of a sincere man who believes our national honor was sacrificed when we failed to go to war, and who proposes to wipe out the stain upon our national honor by the stain of blood, or his words are the mere vapors of a demagogue who hopes to gain political advantage by arousing a war spirit with no purpose of actually bringing on a conflict with Germany."

FORD TELLS WHY HE WILL SUPPORT THE PRESIDENT

Detroit Manufacturer Gives Out Statement Giving His Views on the Candidacy of Wilson for Re-election.

New York, Oct. 2.—Henry Ford, who took luncheon with President Wilson at shadow lunch today, gave out the following signed statement upon his return tonight.

"I believe that President Wilson has solidified the independent vote of the country in his support, as a result of the remarkable speech which he delivered on Saturday. It was a trenchant rallying cry to the men of conscience who are going to put aside party ties and vote their own convictions on election day.

The Vital Issues. "The president's speech on Saturday accomplished one important thing. It restored the campaign to its normal phase. By that I mean that since which are up before the nation to be passed upon, the record of the Wilson administration in domestic legislation and in conducting the foreign relations of the government. For several weeks the republican candidate has been permitted to place a distorted emphasis on the eight-hour day issue.

"I believe unreservedly that President Wilson and his administration are on the right side of this issue, both in the sense of justice and of popularity, but I do not regard the issue as vital in this campaign, in which government policies which have shaped the whole future history of the nation is to follow. Are up for decision. The paramount issue is the issue of peace or war. It is for the nation to decide whether it prefers peace and the maintenance of the high and noble policy of the president, or a truculent policy which is certain to drag us sooner or later into the embroilment of a war, wherein it is our duty to remain neutral so that our influence may be asserted in behalf of peace and the permanent welfare of humanity.

Unseen Hands. "Unseen hands are reaching out to control the foreign policy of our government; grant that their reach may have exceeded their grasp, when the ballots are counted in November.

"It remains for the republican candidate to affirm his purposes with regard to our European policy and our policy toward Mexico. Whether he intends to or not, the implication of his criticism of these existing policies points directly to our embroilment in Europe and an armed intervention in Mexico, designed to serve no higher purpose than to insure American investments at the cost of Mexico's aspirations toward freedom. Between now and election day I want to see the truth driven home, time and time again, that the basic issue to be solved on November 7 relates vitally to the future peace of this nation.

"The stamp of Wall street, of the interests which see through dollar-motivated spectacles and can think only in terms of selfishness, is upon the opposition to Mr. Wilson. Behind that opposition have gathered elements of widely divergent beliefs, but united in the single thought of getting hold of the government for their own profit and for the promotion of interests which are not the public interests. These men of Wall street don't put up their money for a pig in a poke. Usually they know what they are buying and the people may rest assured if they defeat Mr. Wilson these men of Wall street will make the people pay back the money with interest and maybe with their lives.

Good Team Work. "For republican leaders' only hope for getting good team work out of the politically antagonistic groups which make up their following the ironies of 1912, and the tariff reactionaries, was to confine themselves to a discreet and general discussion of the vital issues of the campaign. I don't believe that the American people will tolerate such a negative sort of campaign, and I know how the American people will vote if the republican commit themselves to the promises which are the logical implications of the attacks they have launched against the president.

American politics when there will be something like intellectual honesty on both sides of national campaigns. However widely some men may disagree with some of the things that Mr. Wilson and his administration have done, no man who is both just and intelligent can fail to find in the long list of Wilson's achievements something of which the conscience approves. It is revolting to observe the leadership of a once great party condoning everything the president has done was poorly done and wrongly done. This is not only a great strengthening of the opposition to Mr. Wilson were its leader to concede that the president has done many things of a high type of statesmanship and to base their indictments of him upon the few issues on which they might hope to arouse the public opinion.

"The country is too prosperous and too confident of future prosperity to listen seriously when you say we are living in a fool's paradise of temporary prosperity. That is democracy again. The country is too well pleased with, too well satisfied with the merits of the federal reserve trade commission act, the tariff commission act and the other measures by which the Wilson administration established business peace, to devote much time to the discussions of agitators who contend that nothing good has been done.

"One other thing I wish to emphasize, it is the quality of workmanship that may be expected from Mr. Wilson and his party colleagues in congress in the next four years, when quick decisions must be made and sure hands will be needed. Their hands have been trained in the efficient school of experience, and even if the opposition offered men of as high a character as Mr. Wilson's own, the American people would not act unwisely in swapping experienced public servants for less experienced ones. It has been a real inspiration for me to talk with Mr. Wilson for several hours at his summer home today. I am more than ever convinced that the remarkable record of achievements which lies behind him is not accidental, but the normal expression of a character truly great.
