COMPANION OF ARMOUR FOUND, POLICE BELIEVE

Sheriff Wires From Friday Harbor, Wash., That E. W. Blancett is Held on Fugitive Warrant.

The search for E. W. Blancett, traveling companion of Clyde D. Armour, missing tourist, ended yesterday afternoon. Blancett was taken into custody at that time at Friday Harbor, Wash., according to a telegram sent by Sheriff George H. Mead to Chief J. R. Galusha. He was held on a fugitive warrant the sheriff wired. Chief Galusha had asked Sheriff Mead to watch for Blancett at the request of Melvin T. Donahay, attorney, of Santa Fe, and Dan-iel & Cornell, attorneys. Mr. Donahay learned that Blancett's mother lived at Friday Harbor and thought the young man might go there. Upon learning that Blancett was in custody, Chief Galusha wired to Sheriff Mead asking him whether the young man would come to New Mexico without requisition. Sheriff Mead's answer was, "Blancett wants to be advised you Monday." Chief Galusha said Governor McDonald would be asked to make requisition upon the governor of Washington at once in order to avoid possible complications in the change of governors in the event of Blancett's refusal to waive this procedure.

Story of Disappearance. Armour, his mother and sister started from Sioux City, Ia., September 19, for Fresno, Cal., in an automobile. The sister was taken ill at Charles, Neb., and could not continue the trip by automobile. She and her mother went from there to Fresno by train. Armour was to drive the car to Fresno. Mrs. Armour received a letter, written at Denver by her son, saying that he had met a young man who was going to make the trip with him. Mrs. Armour received another letter, mailed at Trinidad, Colo., and Armour's sister received a postcard, postmarked San Jose, San Miguel county, and dated October 24. Relatives doubt if Armour reached Santa Fe although a man related as C. D. Armour at a hotel there. The same C. D. Armour came to Albuquerque, sold the automobile and left on a Santa Fe train. The man, say persons who saw him here, did not answer the description of Armour, given by relatives. They also say that photographs of Armour do not resemble him. He spent money freely here.

Dead Man Not Armour. Mrs. Armour at Fresno, received a telegram, sent from Santa Fe train No. 2, at Needles, Cal., November 1, saying "Have sold car. Coming on train." No further word was received and relatives became alarmed and began an effort to trace Armour. M. L. Sawyer, a brother-in-law, and two brothers, came to New Mexico. They have not been able to find Armour. Mr. Sawyer, who went to Santa Fe to learn whether a body found near the Santa Fe track, twenty miles from Santa Fe, was that of Armour, returned to Albuquerque yesterday. He obtained a description of the man from the coroner which convinced him that the man was not Armour. The man evidently had been killed by a train, Mr. Sawyer learned.
