MESA VERDE OIL CO. MAKES RICH STRIKE

L. C. Mersfelder yesterday received a telegram from W. A. Palmer, secretary of the Mesa Verde Oil company at Aztec, N. M., advising that oil has been struck in one of the company's wells at a depth of 800 feet. The oil is light and very high in gasoline, the message stated. The well is expected to produce 200 barrels daily. There has been much oil talk in the San Juan basin for the last fifteen years and geologists after making exhaustive investigations reported good oil prospects. From time to time several small concerns put down wells without getting secured leases on thousands of acres of land. But the Mesa Verde Oil company was the first concern to go after oil in a businesslike manner with a standard outfit. Drilling was started about the last of May but owing to delays encountered the progress has not been very rapid. Yesterday's message to Mr. Mersfelder, however, indicates that the company has struck oil in paying quantities. This being the case the oil business will in all probability take on renewed impetus in the San Juan basin.

PROMINENT SHEEP MAN IS IN ALBUQUERQUE

H. B. Stephens, the sheepman who makes his headquarters in this city, arrived here Friday from a business trip to Hereford, Tex., and yesterday afternoon started on the Clay auto for the Jemez Springs, on his way to his shearing camp on the San Antonio. At Los Corrales he met the manager of his camp, J. A. Hawkins, coming to the city and returned with him.

Mr. Hawkins has just finished shearing 10,000 sheep, and with Mr. Stephens will return to the camp Tuesday, when the wool, now all sacked, will be loaded onto wagons and hauled to either Albuquerque or Bernalillo, ready for shipment to eastern wool markets.


