CONGRESS ASKED TO INVESTIGATE RELY'S RECORD

Delegate Davila Makes Charges Against Governor of Porto Rico and Asks That He Be Removed

(By The Associated Press.) Washington, March 2.—Demand for a congressional investigation of the acts and conduct of Governor E. Mont Relly of Porto Rico, looking to his removal from office, was made in the house today by Delegate Felix Cordova Davila, resident commissioner of Porto Rico.

Declaring the people he represented asked that this step be taken "only after the Harding administration was given free opportunity to act," Mr. Davila, who is a member of the unionist party of the island, expressed the belief that if Governor Relly should be called a witness before an investigating committee, "he himself will be the best evidence of the justice of our demand for his removal."

Long Series of Charges. Preceding a long series of charges against the governor, Mr. Davila told the house that while he believed President Harding should be "upon" therefore the appointment was not made "knowingly or with the least malice toward the people of Porto Rico."

Mr. Davila charged among other things: That Governor Relly "announced publicly that he intends to make \$200,000 during the term of his office, whereas the salary as governor is \$10,000."

That he has endeavored "to stir up strife and discord among the citizens."

That he "unlawfully interfered with the courts of justice and attempted to intimidate judges."

That in public speeches "he uttered threats against the lives and sentiments of the citizens and denounced the flag of peace as a 'dirty rag.'"

That he declared to members of the senate he would have the government at Washington "annul the organic act," which provides that the senate shall ratify appointments, "unless the nominations were confirmed, which amounts to intimidation."

That he has attempted to "poison the mind and prejudice" public opinion in the United States, "by stating in public speeches that prominent Porto Ricans were disloyal and traitors."

"I am a strong supporter of the opinion," said Mr. Davila, "that an investigation of Relly's record should show he was not the kind of a man who should have been appointed governor of 1,300,000 people. His past is shady to say the least."

Charging that Relly had been removed as assistant postmaster at Kansas City and that the post office department had refused to give him the record in the case, Mr. Davila added:

"If he was not good enough to be assistant postmaster, how can he be qualified to be governor of a distant possession?"

Governor Relly, Mr. Davila said, "boasts of his strong influence with the president of the United States."

"I am a very influential man," he quoted Relly as having said, "I have been appointed, named by the president who he did not make appointments. Relly told me, he replied, 'Mr. President, you are the boss' and the president said, 'Mont, bring the names and I will sign.'"

Insults to the People. "The administration of Governor Relly has been a succession of insults to the people. When he went to the island he found a land of peace and happiness and almost overnight he transformed it into a hotbed of dissension and despair. He could have had the everlasting friendship and affection of Porto Ricans of all classes had he possessed the least qualification to be their governor. And I say to you, in full truth, we can stand no more. The name of Relly when our self-respect rebels. We appeal to you for relief from this administrator."

SOLDIER BONUS PLAN VIRTUALLY AGREED ON BY SUB-COMMITTEE

(Continued from Page One) "Two—No large drafts to be made on the treasury until the expiration of three years. "Three—No new taxes required. "Plan is acceptable. Word went around among house members that the compromise plan was acceptable both to President Harding and to the officers of the American legion, and late in the afternoon the legislative exchanges of views among members in cloak rooms and corridors was said to be apparently a strong sentiment in favor of the new proposal.

Representative Garner of Texas, the ranking democrat on the ways and means committee, said that while there probably would be some opposition from the democratic side, it was his opinion that a majority of the democrats would support the amended bill. He thought the loan feature would tend to expand credit to the extent of half a billion dollars and thus result in some increase in the cost of living during the expansion period.

"Loser of Two Evils." At the treasury department, the compromise was described by officials as "the lesser of two evils." It was indicated that Secretary Mellon will oppose the bill, but the retention of any bonus legislation at this time would cause a serious drain on the treasury, but officials said this plan would make some provision for the reserve fund, which would be used in the original cash plan.

Members of the subcommittee estimated that the cash payments proposed in the case of service men entitled to not more than \$50 would total \$140,000,000. To this would be added several millions in administration costs and in putting money over the other three options in the bill, the retention of which would be a heavy burden on the home and farm aid and land settlement. It was stated, however, that the total would be only \$140,000,000 compared to the \$200,000,000 proposed for cash payments as at first proposed.

Governor Harding of the federal reserve board was invited before the subcommittee today to discuss the proposed loan provision, and he agreed to draft a form of this plan which is expected to be ready for the subcommittee tomorrow.

Chairman Forney, in an informal statement, said it was the purpose so to safeguard the certificates that they could not fall into the hands of pawnbrokers or "shylocks" and to restrict the banks in the amount of interest that could be charged.

Interest Rate. There was a suggestion that the interest rate be fixed at a sum equal to the redemptive rate charged by the national reserve banks, plus 2 per cent. This is one of the details on which Governor Harding is working. Another is the fixing of a penalty against banks charging more than the interest rate fixed in the bill.

Where banks had loaned money to the service man and the loan with interest had not been paid by September 30, 1925, the banks could make a demand on the treasury for the amount due them. The government then would take over the loan under conditions similar to those fixed in the original bill for federal loans to the soldiers.

A plea for prompt action in congress on a bonus bill was made in the house today by Representative Gallivan, democrat, Massachusetts, who declared that certain financial interests in New York and Boston "had blocked passage of the bill for months." He contended that the house should be given an opportunity to vote on the proposition without delay and predicted that a bill would "sweep" through both the house and the senate.

EVANGELISTIC CAREER PLANNED BY JEFFRIES Los Angeles, Calif., March 2.—James J. Jeffries, former heavyweight champion of the world, may become an evangelist—nothing happens to prevent it, according to a story the Los Angeles Examiner printed today.

Jeffries, now a farmer at Burbank, near here, has become interested in religious affairs through a visit from A. F. Suttner, a friend of the former pugilist's father, who was a minister of the gospel, according to the newspaper.

Mr. Suttner is said to be writing a book, and if it meets with the desired reception from a publisher and if other contingent matters such as religious criticism begin a career as an evangelist, according to the story.

"My desire is to bring religion closer to the hearts of the men of today," Jeffries is quoted.

COAL MINE NEAR LAS VEGAS BEING REPAIRED

Las Vegas, N. M., March 2.—Eight men are at work in the Canon del Agua mine of the Las Vegas coal company, putting in new timbers and making the workings safe. The mine is located six miles from Las Vegas, and is owned by the Santa Fe railway. The coal vein is ten and one-half feet thick. It is planned to market the coal in the city of Las Vegas, and if the demand is large, to build a spur to the railway tracks. The company has been incorporated for \$100,000. Among the incorporators are F. G. Montgomery, Secretary, State Manuel Martinez, Charles O'Malley, Francisco Lopez and Manuel Menton, of Peoos.
