

JARAMILLO WILL GET REHEARING IN MURDER CASE

Warden Claims That a Fair Probe Has Not Been Made and Governor Acts to Re-open the Case.

BY GUTHRIE SMITH. Santa Fe, Aug. 9.—Machinery has been set in motion by Governor M. C. Mechem to bring about a further hearing upon the penitentiary food strike and mutiny, occurring on July 19, when guards fired upon the prisoners, killing Martin Baldonado, of Dona Ana county, and wounding five others.

Superintendent Jaramillo wrote the governor, asking a further investigation, stating: "I do not feel that a full and fair investigation has been made, nor have the facts been fully and fairly presented in the report."

The plea for a further hearing was supported by a petition carrying the signatures of 148 people. Acting upon the request and penitentiary, Governor Mechem has written L. A. Hughes, president of the board, requesting that a further hearing be held.

NEW WATER MAIN WILL NOT SERVE HIGHLAND HOMES

City Manager Says Route Followed Will Not Affect Supply in That Section; Cost is Less.

Besides avoiding engineering difficulties, laying the new 14-inch water main from the reservoir on East Central to the Presbyterian sanatorium, thence north to East Copper, and down that street to the main part of the city, will save the city from \$2,500 to \$5,000, according to City Manager H. Calkins. The main will be a low pressure line, he explained, and will not serve properly in that part of the district, which will continue to draw its supply from a smaller line now in use.

Forty children who were brought by their mothers by appointment were examined yesterday by a corps of physicians, trained nurses and clerks. They were weighed, measured and examined for physical defects or disease. Dr. Evelyn Frisbie, Dr. E. P. Lasseter and Dr. Just assisted in the clinic yesterday and others will give their services today.

No attempt was made to give group talks above the surging and wailing of the small children present. Each mother was informed as to the condition of her child and advised as to special care and feeding to suit his case. All questions were answered by the physicians and nurses in charge.
