Billings Democratic Delegates.

MISCELLANEOUS.

According to the Pioneer Press the Northern Pacific is to have an independent line into St. Paul.

Des Moines, Iowa is excited over an outrage committed upon the proprietor of a grocery store, who was struck with a fish plate bar by a would be robber named Harris. Threats of lynching are freely expressed.

There are now afloat from all parts of the world no less than fifty-five ships bound for ports in Oregon and Washington Territory, and which, to a great extent will be utilized to take away the wheat of the present harvest. Of these ships over twenty-four are over 1000 tons register, ranging from 1100 to 1978, which is the register of the new ship "Harry Failing," of Philadelphia; the two next largest are the American ship "Glendon," 1897 tons, and the "Henry Villard," (new) 1553 tons, chartered by the O. R. & N. Co., as is also the ship "Robert Dixon," 1368 tons, and the "Winn," 1483 tons.—(Walla Walla Union.)

Through Mails to the Pacific.
The postoffice department has established a mail route from Missoula to the eastern end of the Pacific division of the Northern Pacific railroad, and commencing with 6th of September a daily service will ply to and from the points named. This link completes the new trans-continental service by the northern route. Four and six horse coaches will run between Billings on the Yellowstone, and the terminus on Clark's fork of the Columbia, and all Montana mails for Northern Idaho, Washington Territory and Oregon, will hereafter pass over this direct route.—(Pioneer Press.)

The Northern Pacific.
The New York Herald of the 14th says: The manipulators of the Northern Pacific continue to push up their favorites, though prudent people are beginning to doubt whether the present prices do not express the full value of the properties if not something more. The Northern Pacific directors met this morning and decided to declare a scrip dividend payable Jan. 1, 1883, representing the amount due to the preferred stockholders. This dividend amounts to \$1,697,490.63 and represents the net earnings of the road (applicable to the purpose) from October, 1875 to July, 1882, and is equivalent to a fraction over 11 per cent. upon the preferred stock. Regarding the much talked of cash dividend, no action was taken.

Addressing Mail Matter.
To the Editor of the Billings Herald.
BILLINGS, Sept. 21, 1882.

Parties getting mail along the line of the railroad, will find it very much to their advantage to have the address, "End of Track, N. P. R. R., Montana," discontinued. Track, N. P. R. R., Montana, as there is no post-office by that name, it causes much confusion and delay in the delivery of mail. The best way is simply address some postoffice, and if it is to be in the care of some one write it thus: "In care of Winston Bros. & Clark," or "care of the Engineers' Dept., N. P. R. R.," or "care of H. Clark & Co.," or what-

ever the case may be. If this is done then there should be no excuse for delay. Be sure to direct your mail to some postoffice as the postmaster at that office will be called upon to take proper care of it and see that it is forwarded if need be, and besides, according to the rules of the postal department, letters posted without the name of some postoffice on them, are not to be forwarded, but are to be sent direct to the Dead Letter office. Parties receiving letters in their care for persons who have left their employ, should see that such letters are promptly returned to the postoffice, notifying the postmaster of the reason for such return. There is no doubt that a great deal of trouble and delay in the delivery of mail is caused by the carelessness and negligence of postmasters, but there is no little trouble caused by faulty directions, and by the negligence of persons taking the mail from the office for others and not delivering it promptly.

MONTANA NEWS.

The Judith round up party intended to commence yesterday.

Perkins Russell, of Miles City, has bought 4,000 head of fine grade sheep from a party in Gallatin.

Miles City had a stabbing affray in a barber shop on Friday, in which a character known as "French Pete" received some rough treatment.

The Cochrane Ranch Company which operates in the Bow River district in the British possessions, have purchased 400 cattle from A. W. Kingsbury to be delivered October 1st.

Bell, the jail-breaker, was captured sailing down the river in a skiff below Glendive, by a man by the name of Mondy, who fired upon him and drove him into the bushes, where he was captured by the assistance of other parties. Bell's time had nearly expired before being. He was brought back to Miles City.

Finally an Indian came along, but refused to take him in. Drawing his Winchester, he compelled Mr. Indian to allow him to mount on behind him, and he was taken to a ranch.
