Alex. C. Botkin, U. S. marshal of Montana, was nominated for delegate to congress by the Republican convention at Butte on the 13th.

W. Sanders was placed in nomination, but declined. The name of T. C. Power was also placed in nomination, but was withdrawn.

The contest between the two candidates for the office of Territorial delegate to congress, promises to be exceedingly lively and probably very close.

The Avant Courier denies the assertion that the N. P. railway will run some miles from the town of Bozeman.

We have received the first copy of the Bismarck Weekly Herald. It is a six column quarto, and all printed at home.

The sale of lot 1 in block 111, for \$1,850 on Tuesday, is more than a sufficient answer to the Miles City and Bozeman papers, in which it has so frequently been asserted that the price of real estate in Billings was bearing rapidly downward.

A question of more than ordinary importance to Billings is the improvement of the road to Benton, and as it would seem to be impossible to stir the proper authorities in the matter, it would, in consideration of the advantages to be derived by our merchants from the establishment of a freight route by this road, be a good investment for our citizens to make the necessary improvement which would cost less than a \$1,000.

Judging by the number of votes polled at the Republican primary election for Billings and Coulson, the Republican element must be very strong in our midst.

Three hundred and twenty votes were polled at such an election indicates either strength or something "rotten in the state of Denmark." The election was a closely contested one, there being several tickets in the field; the ticket which was headed by H. Clark however won the day.

Messrs. Edward L. Bonner, Marcus Daly, Michael J. Connell, Washington Dunn, Andrew B. Harrington and Richard A. Eddy, have formed an incorporated company with the title of "The Montana Improvement Company (Limited)," the capital stock being \$2,000,000.

The operations and business of the company are to be carried on at Deer Lodge, and its powers do not seem so limited as its liability—its objects are as varied as the industries and commerce of Montana.

The Miles City Press of the 18th contains the following paragraph: "The Pullman cars are detached from the 'through train to Billings and remain in Miles City, the reason assigned for this being that they have not time to clean and prepare the cars for the 'return trip.' It may be an optical delusion or a misconception of the M. C. R., but we have seen the Pullman cars arrive and depart morning and evening for the last six days.

Messrs. Olmsted & Page left for the Bull mountains on Monday to complete surveys for some eastern gentlemen who are interested in coal claims on the other side of the mountains. The claims of the Bull mountains and Billings Coal Companies are on this side of the mountains, and are most valuable.

Last Sunday evening about 8 o'clock loud cries for help were heard from the city below the city corner. Several citizens with lights started for the scene of distress, and after wading for some time through gumbo a mile deep or less, found a man in a very deplorable condition. He had been thrown from his horse on his way to the lower town, and the demoralizing darkness and a slight injury from the fall rendered him almost lifeless. Had his cries not been heard he undoubtedly would have perished from exposure in the cold rain before morning.

The once popular Key City dining hall was reopened last Wednesday night by the regular passenger train Sunday evening, having on board Messrs. J. M. Haunaford, General Freight Agent; Geo. W. This party came over for the purpose of formally taking over the route at this point from the construction department.
