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
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The Republicans Sweep the Country!

Eight States Out of the Twelve that Voted Stand
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Good Government.

OHIO GIVES 60,000 PLURALITY

Kentucky and New Jersey Also in Line—Iowa and Massachusetts
Follow Suit, While Pennsylvania Is Always Right.
South Dakota Is Redeemed.

Ohio Gives 60,000.

Columbus, Ohio, Nov. 8.—Chairman Dick today revised his figures as to the claim of from 55,000 to 60,000 plurality for Judge Nash for governor and the rest of the republican state ticket and an unusually large majority in both branches of the legislature. No senator, however, is to be selected by this legislature. Outside of fusion troubles in Hamilton and confusion in Cayahoga county, and the Jones movement in other places, the republicans seem to have made gains throughout the state especially in rural districts. The senate stands nineteen republicans, eight democrats and four doubtful. The house stands fifty-eight republicans, thirty-four democrats and seven doubtful.

Republicans Carry Kentucky.

Louisville, Ky., Nov. 8, 11 a. m.—With returns from all but thirteen counties, some of which are unofficial, and with the vote of 1897 as a basis of calculation, at the same ratio of republican gains Taylor's plurality in the state figures 8,700. At republican headquarters it is still maintained Taylor's plurality will reach 15,000. Frankfort, Ky., Nov. 8.—Chairman Blackburn of the democratic state campaign committee gave out the following statement at noon: "Goebel is elected by 8,000 or 4,000 majority on the face of returns. If a contest is made his majority will be increased. The legislature is safely democratic in both branches."

Republican Gains in New York.

New York, Nov. 8.—Returns from state and county so far received indicate that the republicans will average about the same majority in the next assembly as in the last, the democratic gains in this city being off-set by losses in the smaller counties. In 118 assembly districts which have reported, including twenty-nine in this city, seventy-five republicans and thirty-eight democrats were elected. The democrats suffered grave reverses in Erie county (Buffalo) and Chemung county, the home of ex-senator David B. Hill. In the city elections up the state the democratic vote showed a great falling off. Buffalo, Troy and Albany gave large republican majorities, a complete overturn. Mayor McGuire is re-elected mayor of Syracuse.

New Jersey 20,000 Republican.

Newark, N. J., Nov. 8.—A revision of the election returns shows no change from the figures of last night. The state senate stands as last year, while in the assembly the republicans have gained seven seats. The republicans have carried the state by about 20,000 plurality, although there was no direct vote on a state ticket. The republicans will control both houses of the legislature by good working majorities and will have an increased representation in the house of assembly.

Massachusetts 65,000 Republican.

Boston, Mass., Nov. 8.—The vote of Massachusetts for governor complete is as follows: Crane, republican, 168,876; Paine, democrat, 103,814. The republicans regard the result as an endorsement of the policy of the national administration in the Philippines.

Pennsylvania 70,000 Republican.

Philadelphia, Nov. 8.—In this city the total vote cast was 153,338. The registration was 218,354. The contest

on the state ticket was over the office of state treasurer and Colonel James E. Barnett, republican, had 69,593 plurality over his democratic opponent, William L. Creasy. Brown (republican), for supreme judge had 90,874 plurality over Mestreat (democrat), but both were elected as there are two vacancies in that body. The proposition to authorize the loan of \$12,000,000 for improvement of the city's water supply, was overwhelmingly carried.

Virginia Still Democratic.

Richmond, Va., Nov. 7.—Returns received up to 11:30 tonight show that both branches of the legislature will be overwhelmingly democratic.

Mississippi Also Goes Wrong.

No dispatches have been received from Mississippi, but it is safe to say that the "shotgun" democrats have carried the state.

Bryanism Wins in Nebraska.

Lincoln, Neb., Nov. 8.—Additional returns received this morning serve to emphasize the fusion victory in Nebraska at yesterday's election. The fusion majority will not be less than 12,000, and may reach 18,000.

Maryland Is Democratic.

Baltimore, Nov. 8.—Returns from close counties in Maryland continue to come in slowly, but enough is now known to assure the democrats control of both branches of the general assembly. They have carried the lower house by such a decisive majority as to make it almost unanimous and have the senate by a majority of three. Full unofficial returns from Baltimore city give Smith (dem.) for governor a majority of 8,192 and returns and estimates from the rest of the state make the total majority about 12,000.

Iowa 61,000 Republican.

Des Moines, Nov. 8.—Shaw's, republican, plurality which last night was figured at 52,000, is now declared to be 61,000 by the republican committee, the democrats conceding 50,000. A comparison with the vote of two years ago shows republican gains, although the vote is much lighter than then. Seven counties heretofore democratic have given good republican pluralities.

South Dakota 8,000 Republican.

Aberdeen, S. D., Nov. 8.—Chairman Herrer, of the republican state central committee, says: "We will carry the state by at least 8,000 majority. This victory is especially gratifying because of the desperate efforts of the fusionists and because Senator Pettigrew threw his personality into the fight for all it was worth."

Sioux Falls, S. D., Nov. 8.—Returns up to noon indicate the republican majority in this state is not less than 10,000.

Salt Lake City Republican.

Salt Lake, Utah, Nov. 8.—Returns up to midnight indicate that Thompson, republican for mayor has been elected by 500 or 600 majority and that the republicans have elected a majority of the city council.

California's Capitol in Line.

Sacramento, Nov. 8.—George Clark, republican, has been chosen mayor of Sacramento by 1,822 majority.

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SELF-DENIAL WEEK
Will Be Observed Commencing Nov. 19,
By the Salvation Army.
