CHEYENNE INDIAN AFFAIRS.

Major McLaughlin Adjusting Matters Between Redskins and Whites.

Major McLaughlin, special agent of the Indian department, who has had sole charge of the adjustment of the claims of the white settlers on the Northern Cheyenne reservation on the upper Rosebud, arrived from Washington, D. C., this morning, clothed with authority to negotiate an adjustment of the claims of a few settlers on Greenleaf creek, who were always supposed to be outside of the reservation...

admirable in that it not only stood for an equitable adjustment from a government standpoint, but in that it recognized that there was a money value to the settlers in the score of years—the best of their lives—that had been spent on the claims that had been their homes and which the government now asked them to give up.

With the last few settlers settled with and out of the way, the Cheyennes will be in undisputed possession of a magnificent reservation which will speedily be fenced on every boundary so as to remove all excuse for trespass on the reservation by whites, or on the public domain by Indians, and the lands on the east side of the Tongue river, heretofore held sacred to Indian occupancy, will be thrown open for white settlement.
