### LATHROM IS BACK AGAIN

ALLEGED FORGER IN JAIL AWAITING TRIAL.

### HE TAKES IT VERY COOLY

Apparently Unconcerned and Indifferent as to Outcome—Identified by State's Witness.

One of the defendants to be arraigned in the district court when it convenes next week is Joseph F. Lathrom, who will have to answer to the charge of forgery. He is at present in jail, where he was placed last Wednesday morning, after having been brought back from Missouri, to which state he went after the commission of his alleged offense.

Lathrom was returned on a requisition issued by Governor Toole on Governor Dockery of Missouri, a little over a week ago. The local sheriff's office had ascertained the whereabouts of Lathrom and after assuring himself that the man could be had, Mr. Hubbard wired to the sheriff of the county in which the alleged fugitive was to keep a watch on his movements and then took the necessary steps for his extradition. A week ago last Saturday, October 17, Mr. Hubbard started for Missouri, going to Hartville, where Lathrom was known to be. Before proceeding to that place, however, he went to Jefferson City, the capital, and secured a warrant from the Missouri governor for the man's arrest. Lathrom had no suspicion of what was going on and was not arrested until after the arrival of Mr. Hubbard, who immediately left with him for Illinois, where the sheriff spent a few days visiting at his former home.

**The Offense Charged.**

The complainant in the case is Edward Lightfoot, a Laurel saloon man, and the original warrant for the arrest of Lathrom was issued by Judge Mann. In the complaint, dated Au-

gust 23, Lightfoot alleges that he cashed a check for the defendant, at the latter's instance and request, and advanced him the sum of \$45 on the defendant's representations that the check was good and valid and had been issued by A. L. Thomas, whose signature it purported to bear, the defendant knowing at the time that it was a forgery and that the check had no value.

Lathrom had been in the employ of Thomas for a short time, a fact that was known to Lightfoot, and consequently the latter had no hesitancy in honoring the paper. Soon after he had paid the money, however, he became suspicious and took the first train to this city and went at once to the First National bank, on which the check pretended to have been drawn, and presented the paper. Here he was told that it was a forgery and then search for the alleged forger was instituted. This was unsuccessful, as no trace of him could be found. A couple of weeks afterward the sheriff's office learned that Lathrom had been in the city two days after the check had been presented and that he had gone to Huntley. There, it was learned, he had joined his wife and sent her to their former home, he following by the slower method of beating his way on freight trains. He was traced to Hartville and then steps were taken for his arrest.

**Is Fully Identified.**

Shortly after his arrival here last Wednesday Lathrom was picked out from a number of other prisoners in jail by a man named Foley, a bartender in Lightfoot's employ, as the one who had presented the check and secured the money. He did this without a moment's hesitation.

Lathrom is inclined not to worry about the predicament in which he finds himself and seemingly is not concerned in the least. Sheriff Hubbard says he gave him no trouble and had no word of protest to offer at any time, apparently caring nothing as to what would become of him.

**Shotgun "Cranks" Are Shown Something Entirely New.**

Of the many different new shotguns on the market the Browning Automatic, a sample of which is now exhibited at the store of the Billings Hardware company, has many points of superiority that cannot be claimed by any of the other magazine guns. It is, as is indicated by its name, automatic, not only in name, but in reality. By simply pulling on the trigger it can be discharged five times, the limit of its charges, in a little over a second, the speed possible to be developed being limited only by the capacity of the shooter to quickly move his finger.

The new weapon is the invention of an Ogden, Utah, man, whose name it bears, and can be used either as a machine or single shot gun. The magazine holds four cartridges, while a fifth can be loaded direct into the barrel, thus making it really a five shooter. After the first shot has been fired nothing remains but to pull the trigger for the remaining ones, as the recoil ejects the empty cartridge, throws a loaded one into place and cocks the piece for the next discharge.

So far only two of the new guns are known to be in the state, the other being at Helena. Quite a number of shotgun men examined the one on exhibition here yesterday and all were enthusiastic in their admiration of it. For the benefit of those desiring to see it put to actual test, Captain Bartlett will use it in his exhibition shoot at the grounds of the gun club Sunday afternoon.
