What the Three Railways Converging Here are Doing.

Anaconda is practically the junction of three railway companies, the Union Pacific, the Northern Pacific and the Montana Union. Its local business is, of course, confined to the latter, while the other companies divide the through business almost equally.

During the month of August the business of the station aggregated \$185,000, the figures which touches, but which has been up to date, the figures just given will be exceeded considerably.

A Young Man Who Was Taken in by Bogus Patent Brokers.

He Dropped Fifty Dollars in the Mist and That Was the Last He Saw of It—Other Notes and Gossip.

BUTTE, Sept. 11.—A young man who is clerk in a large retail store in Butte claims to have been swindled out of \$50 by the Bogus Patent Agency of San Francisco.
