UNCLE SAM'S BIG FARM

Business of the General Land Office During the Past Fiscal Year.

Agricultural and Mineral Patents Granted in the Last Twelve Months—Changes in the Present Laws Recommended to Congress.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 19.—The annual report of the acting commissioner of the land office, William M. Stone, has been submitted to the secretary of the interior. In opening his report Commissioner Stone refers to the accumulation of business in the office which had been left over from former administrations.

The total cash receipts of the office from sales of land and fees, were \$9,270,225, a decrease of more than three million dollars as compared with the year 1888.

There can be no doubt, says the report, that large quantities of land amounting to millions of acres have been patented to the state erroneously as swamp lands.

Mr. Goodlett left Washington a short time ago for Asbury park, and on being telegraphed by a friend that his presence was necessary in this city, replied that he had been secretly married to a friend and was unavoidably detained by an addition to his family.

WASHINGTON, Sept. 19.—A cable has been received at the department of state from the consul at Kingston, Jamaica, saying that a riot occurred at Navassa Island in the Caribbean sea in which a number of Americans were killed.
