BOTH SIDES WERE HEARD

Campaign Tales That Were Promptly Put Out of the Way.

Talk at a Club Meeting Which Aroused the Indignation of Smelter Foremen.—A Discussion in Which the Facts Came Out in a Hurry.

Much that was not down on the programme, and that the managers would now give a great deal to have kept out of the exercises, occurred at the meeting of the Republican Protection club last night.

Mr. Barker started in by expounding the tariff question from a republican standpoint. Afterwards he started in to discuss local politics, and finally made the startling assertion that at the former election the foreman of the Anaconda company drove their men before them to the polls and compelled them to vote as they (the foremen) dictated.

No honest, self-respecting workman, whatever his politics, could allow so monstrous a statement to pass unchallenged. H. Smith, an employe in the smelting works, himself a republican, rose to his feet and declared with honest indignation and warmth of feeling that he had been in the employ of the Anaconda company for the past five years, during which time he had never seen the slightest coercion, or the slightest attempt on the part of the foremen to exercise any undue influence over the men at the polls.

Another workman arose to contradict Mr. Barker, but the chairman, seeing into what a quarrel the meeting was being turned, begged those who took exceptions to Mr. Barker's statements to retire.

These proceedings so disconcerted the republican leaders and speakers that they didn't know which way to turn. The more they attempted to smooth matters over the worse they put their feet into it.

THE SOFTEST THING OUT

Fat Fees That Are Picked Up by the Deer Lodge Sheriff.

A Round Salary to Which Sheriff Moore Adds Fees That Have Been Declared Illegal—An Office That Threatens to Eat the County Up.

Tax-payers who have been looking into the subject are surprised to find that, under the present administration, the cost of maintaining the sheriff's outfit in Deer Lodge county is running up into figures that are simply magnificent in their proportions.

It is true that Deer Lodge county has gained rapidly in population within two years, but it cannot be shown that the criminal business has increased at a rate which ought to have added so largely to the sheriff's expenses.

Of course, the sheriff's office is entitled to all the law allows—and in this county the "full extent" of the law has been brought into service during the past two years. Not satisfied with this, Sheriff Moore has presented claims for bills not authorized by law; and the surprising feature of the case is that, in the board of commissioners, the republican members have allowed them, in the face of objections on the part of the democratic member, and this in spite of the ruling of the county attorney who, when asked to pass on the question, pronounced the claims manifestly illegal.

Some of these illegal claims relate to "attendance at court." They amount to hundreds of dollars a year. Twice within the last year these claims have been declared illegal by the county attorney, in the hearing of the commissioners and the sheriff, but in both instances they have been allowed by the two republican members of the board, Mr. Walker, the democratic member from this city, voting in the negative.

The most sensational feature in Sheriff Moore's career is developed in his own declaration lately made, to the effect that he is not a prisoner in the county jail, but a prisoner from this city, having been arrested by the sheriff while on his way to the county jail.
