THAT AFFIDAVIT MILL

Grand Total of the Swearing Done by the Deer Lodge Lawyer.

He Struck Out for a Laboring Man Every Time and Usually Hit a Democrat—Something About the Challenged Voters in this City.

The Deer Lodge lawyer who came over to Anaconda one day this week to disfranchise half the town, managed to fire off three hundred and ninety affidavits all told. His challenges hit 102 voters at the Carroll precinct, the balance are in this city. The bundle of affidavits has been filed with the registrar, they will be marked as the law directs and the judges will have to administer an oath before the challenged voters can get their ballots into the box. The affidavits will occasion considerable annoyance and delay at the polls—that is exactly what they are intended for, in the hope that, at the larger precincts in this city, the hours of election day will be too short to accommodate all the voters.

Reputable republicans in this city stoutly deny all knowledge of what was proposed by the Deer Lodge lawyer in affidavits when he came to this city. The fair appears to be a little side-issue in the campaign line gotten up for Mr. O'Bannon's exclusive use and benefit. That eminent attorney sent his affidavits flying right and left as soon as the list was turned over to him for his inspection. He managed to hit a laboring man every time. The STANDARD has already explained that the fact recited in each affidavit is that the naturalization papers of those whom he challenged were not on file at Deer Lodge at the time these men applied for registry. The fact is that the naturalization papers were in the hands of the deputy clerk, in this city, who filed them several days ago, as soon as he was released from duty here in getting the papers issued. Following is the form used:

TERRITORY OF MONTANA, ss. County of Deer Lodge, ss. I, _____, being duly sworn, say: That I am a qualified elector of Registration District No. _____, whose name appears on the Registered List of Voters, Precinct No. _____, and have no right to vote at the coming election. I am not a citizen of the United States, and have not declared my intention to become such; that the so-called "Declaration of Intention" upon which said _____ was registered is not a copy of any such declaration, and that there is not now any record of such Declaration of Intention in the office of the Clerk of the District Court of the 2d Judicial District of Montana, in and for Deer Lodge County, from which the purpose of this affidavit is to be issued, and that in truth and fact it was never issued from said office, and the facts above set forth are true to the best of my knowledge and belief.

The STANDARD has already shown how it happens that, in Montana and in other sections of the northwest, it has been custom, time out of mind, for the court to send out deputy clerks empowered to issue papers. It has always been done for the accommodation of voters in this section, whose settlements are scattered and distances are great.

It is easy to account for the large number of naturalization papers issued this year in Anaconda. Practically, this is the first formal session for issuing papers that has been held here in three years. During that time the city has doubled its population. Then there are in town scores of men, some of whom have lived four or five years in Anaconda, who have never before felt disposed to become citizens while Montana remained a territory. Now that it is to be a state, they propose to become citizens and they wanted to make sure of their papers this year, because, under the new constitution, which is quite stringent in this matter, many of them would be forced to wait from one to four years.

Naturally enough, the democratic workers in this city were much annoyed at first when the existence of the O'Bannon affidavits was announced. Their first business was to secure the best possible list of names of those who had been challenged, and to know that their name had been called in question without cause and without warrant. Many of them who have been constant residents of Montana for years and who have families and property in town, were very severe in their comments. They asserted that they were willing to withdraw if they were not lawfully entitled to acquire citizenship, but they condemned the strongly partisan spirit manifested in affidavits founded on fiction and aimed without exception at laboring men. "You bet your life," said one of the men yesterday, "this thing won't work the way that Deer Lodge lawyers planned it. You will find that it will make votes for the democratic ticket. It is all well enough for these tender-hearted republican papers to tell how much they think of us. Now, we can take pretty good care of ourselves, and they needn't waste their breath trying to 'p' millionaires' over our shoulders."

The STANDARD has a full list of names of voters who are included in the job lot of O'Bannon affidavits. The first name to catch the reporter's eye, when he examined the list from the registrar, was that of Peter Curley. He has lived five years in Anaconda, and is the owner of several pieces of property in town. Like a majority of those who are under the ban of affidavits, he is an Irishman.

Barney Manan has not been out of Anaconda in two years. He is an old timer in Montana and is steadily employed at work, with good wages. "Joe" Herbicks, one of the challenged, has worked in Anaconda for nearly two years. He formerly lived in Pittsburg, and came here to join his family, members of which have been here nearly four years. He owns property in Anaconda and is a Russian by birth. William Cheyne has lived in Anaconda nearly eighteen months. Edward Clemas came here two years ago. Frank Vanboe is within the limit marked by law with plenty of time to spare. He came here from Nebraska. Walter McEbillly has made Anaconda his home since 1888; Joseph Irving, who came from Ireland seven years ago, has lived here more than a year, with his family. John Krockcrank has worked for the past two years at the smelter. Edward McNellis came to America from Ireland eight years ago, and has worked steadily for the Anaconda company for the past seventeen months. Patrick Flynn has lived fifteen months in Anaconda and came to this country from Ireland nearly three years ago. James Kain has spent several years in America, and came to Montana nineteen months ago. John Lowrey has been here a year. He came from Fall River, Mass., and to that place from Ireland. John Creedon left Ireland four years ago for the United States, and has lived nine months in Montana. The list might be lengthened indefinitely to show the grade of men whom the Deer Lodge attorney proposed to shut out. The names just quoted are without exception the first ones selected at random out of the lists at the registry office.

Below is a list of all the challenges for the first precinct in this city. Most of the men are well known to the people of the community. A majority of them are democrats. Some of them declined to say yesterday how they propose to vote. Many of them are tax-paying property owners and some of them have a comfortable bank account. HE HAD A BIG HOUSE

Congressman Reed's Reasons for Wanting Montana to Go Republican.

He Avoids the Silver Discussion and a Question From the Audience Finds No Answer—Dr. McMillan's Address.

Big Tom Reed of Maine, who with his Ingersollian features, Ingersollian accent, and Ingersollian stomach, is enough like the original Bob to be his brother, held the boards at Evans opera house last night, flinging to his great joy that all the virtue and wealth and intellect in the land is confined to the republican party, and discovering to his ill-concealed horror that the democratic organization was born of the devil and with the assistance of that personage was bent on plunging the country into execrating misery and woe everlasting.

The audience was large and though mainly democratic, listened to the congressman with the utmost attention and respect. But one question came from the audience—and that was a body blow, from which the speaker did not recover. J. E. Losee presided. The first speaker was Dr. D. J. McMillan of Deer Lodge, republican candidate for state senator. Of the two speakers, one was a conservative and the other progressive. One was forever looking backward and quoting Jefferson and Jackson for his support, the other was forever looking forward and quoting Jefferson and Jackson for his support. The speaker who was a conservative and the other progressive, particularly the democratic attitude towards the tariff. The great majority of that party is to-day composed of citizens of the southern states, and they control the democratic party because they are a majority.
