SHE IS FROM THIS CITY. The Adventures of Miss Ella Walker of Anaconda in the City of Butte.

"Cholly" Jones of the Tunnel Precinct Notoriety Arrested on a Charge of Abduction - A Mother's Efforts to Rescue Her Child.

BUTTE, Nov. 5. - A genuine sensation was unheated in the police court to-night. "Cholly" Jones, the young man employed in Thompson Campbell's law office, and who was secretary of the republican county central committee in the recent election, and who is also known to fame as Bernard's accomplice in obtaining affidavits for the republicans at the tunnel precinct, was to-night arrested by Officer Leonard on a charge of abducting a girl under 16 years of age for purposes of prostitution. Jones' arrest was brought about in a peculiar manner.

Mrs. Jennie B. Walker, a widow living in Anaconda, came into the city clerk's office about 5 o'clock this evening and tearfully told the officers that her daughter had been abducted by the proprietor of a house of ill-fame on Galena street. She said that her daughter, Ella Martina Walker, who is not over 16 years old, had been sent to school in Utah some months ago, and while in Ogden had been led astray by some villain. Mrs. Walker says she learned that her daughter was in a house of prostitution in Butte. She immediately came to Butte and after a long search found the girl at the house of Frankie Barnes, corner of Galena and Wyoming streets. Mrs. Walker took her daughter away, and since then they have been hiding together at Anaconda until to-day, when the mother and daughter came to Butte and went to the Barnes woman's house and asked for Ella's clothes. Mrs. Walker says when she and her daughter went to the Barnes house they found Charles Jones there. Mrs. Walker asked Miss Barnes for Ella's clothes, and while they were being procured the daughter was taken by Jones and two inmates of the house to another room. There was some difficulty between Miss Barnes and Mrs. Walker about the girl, which the Barnes woman claimed as her property. The girl did not return to her mother as she promised and soon the agonized mother found that her daughter had again been spirited away from her. The women in the house said they did not know where the girl had gone. The mother asked the proprietress for the girl, but that creature denied all knowledge of her whereabouts. After waiting for her daughter's return for a long time, Mrs. Walker says she was ordered out of the house. She then left and went to the police court and secured a warrant for the arrest of the Barnes woman.

Marshal McArthur and Officer McLagan went at once to the house and arrested Mrs. Barnes on a charge of abduction and creating a disturbance. The latter charge was dismissed for want of evidence. In the case of the alleged abduction Charles Jones appeared for the defense of his friend, Miss Barnes, and entered a plea of not guilty. The Barnes woman was then admitted to bail, furnishing \$500 bond.

During the trial the officers had been searching for, walked into the court room and in a loud manner informed her mother that she had been "doing the town." The poor mother seemed to feel very great sorrow over her unfortunate daughter's action, and so great was the strain upon her nerves that she fainted. Her daughter expressed surprise when she found that Miss Barnes had been arrested charged with her abduction. The afflicted mother was carried into the city clerk's office after her father, who was a reporter, went in to interview the wayward girl who was sitting with her mother. Miss Walker is a fully developed woman of very attractive appearance. Her features are regular and clear, and her manner is boisterous and her actions bold. She did not seem to feel very sorry for her mother. The reporter heard Miss Walker say to her mother, "What do you had no right to arrest that woman for coaxing me away. If any one should be arrested it is the man who coaxed me to leave you."

The reporter asked the girl what man had induced her to leave and she replied, "No one asked me to go away."

"But I heard you tell your mother that some man ought to be arrested, what man did you mean?" asked the reporter.

"Oh, I was only joking," replied Miss Ella, somewhat confusedly. Meanwhile the reporter was looking at the girl. Jones was defending his client, Miss Barnes, and W. J. Lippincott and Ed. S. Booth were prosecuting the case something occurred that led Mr. Lippincott to suspect that Jones was not entirely ignorant of the whereabouts of the girl from the time she left her mother in the morning until her return to the police court to-night. The police officers also kept their ears open and found that there was some evidence to connect Jones with the girl's abduction. In fact, Jones is said to have admitted to Jones that he had a good deal to do with the girl giving her mother the shake in the Barnes house this morning.

A STANDARD reporter saw Jones in the Barnes woman's house, not even when Mrs. Walker says he was there in the morning when her girl got away from her. Mrs. Walker says she was so frightened by her attempt to procure her daughter after the girl's flight, Jones told a STANDARD reporter that he was in the house purely on professional business, having been sent for by Miss Barnes to advise her as to the best course to pursue in the event of her arrest. This could certainly explain his presence in the house in the afternoon, but he must have had some other than a professional reason to take him to the house in the morning before the Walker girl came to the city. Jones' activity in the case, which he evidently desired to mention, led the police and prosecuting attorneys to believe that he was not himself entirely innocent of the girl's disappearance and upon instructions Chief Smith promptly made out a warrant for the arrest of Jones, and gave instructions to Officer Terry Leonard. Jones was out rustling up bond for Miss Barnes' release. The officer found him in East Park street about 8:30 o'clock, and touching him on the shoulder, said: "I want you."

"What's that? What me?" asked Jones. "Yes, I'll have to arrest on a charge of abduction."

Thompson Campbell becoming responsible for his appearance when called upon. The girl, Ella Walker, was locked up in county jail, being held as a witness. Miss Walker called to a STANDARD reporter. "I came here from Ogden to Butte in company with three other girls. We were induced to come here and enter a life of shame by Phil Shaaron, Miss Emma Abbey sent to him to send her four girls and he induced us to come. We did not stop long with Miss Abbey and three of us went to a party given by Frank Barnes, where my mother found me. Now that I am started, I don't think there is much use in my trying to reform. I'm only fit now for such a life."

Mrs. Walker says she is a widow, and washes and works hard in Anaconda for her living. She says she had not enough money to pay her fare to Butte to-day and pawned a watch for \$7.50. She had no money to-night to pay for lodging and Marshal McArthur gave her an order to go to a hotel.
