BADLY ROUTED.

Governor Toole Drops a Bomb in the Conspirators' Camp.

SANDERS HIRES A HALL

Republican Members Prepare to Organize a Rump Legislature.

TREATHS OF DESERTION.

Some of the Delegates who Don't Propose to be Made Fools of. Selecting a Candidate for Speaker of the House.

HELENA, Nov. 22.—The governor's proclamation, issued at 4 o'clock this afternoon broke the backs of the conspirators. Acting under his undoubted prerogative, he designated the rooms in the court house heretofore used for such purpose as the meeting place of the legislature. This the republican conspirators had anticipated, but his further action in announcing his recognition of men with county clerk certificates was a stunner. On this point the proclamation said:

"WHEREAS, It has come to my knowledge that two sets of certificates have been issued to persons claiming to be elected to said legislative assembly, each emanating from a different source, and not all to the same persons; and

"WHEREAS, It is probable that a conflict may arise between the respective claimants to seats in said body and in the organization thereof which may imperil the peace of the state; and

"WHEREAS, One set of said certificates have been issued and delivered in pursuance to section 1,033 of the general election laws of Montana by the county clerks of the respective counties, and by virtue of section 18, of an act of the legislative assembly of the territory of Montana, entitled 'An act to provide for the registration of electors and to prevent fraud at elections,' approved March 8, A. D., 1889; and

"WHEREAS, By express law the persons holding such certificates are declared to be elected to membership and deemed to be elected for all purposes of organization of either branch of the legislative assembly; and

"WHEREAS, When so organized such legislative assembly, by the constitution, becomes the judge of the qualifications of its own members.

"Now, therefore, I, Joseph K. Toole, governor of the state of Montana, do hereby designate the court house of the county of Lewis and Clarke at the said seat of government as the place where said legislative assembly, comprising the persons holding and presenting certificates of election from said county clerks, shall meet."

The Independent run out the proclamation in a 5 o'clock extra and the action of the governor spread like wildfire. The republican conspirators hastily retired from public view for a back-room conference, which lasted till a late hour to-night. The result was a decision to make a complete back down. The conspirators have abandoned their plan to capture the court house and State Auditor Kenney has issued a call to the rump house of representatives to meet in a room in the Iron block on Lower Main street. The rump house will be short lived. The republican rank and file are not disposed to follow the conspirators much further and some of them will be early deserters—perhaps to-morrow. The governor's prompt action has certainly prevented a collision. The democrats are in good spirits to-night.

It was 1 a. m. before the democratic caucus adjourned. P. Blakely, of Gallatin, was named for speaker; C. S. Pond, of Jefferson, for clerk, and Miles Finley, of Butte, for sergeant-at-arms. Mr. Blakely is the oldest member in point of service, and under the law will swear in the members to-morrow in the absence of the auditor, who goes off with the rump house.

WRECKED NEAR DEER LODGE.

Several Horses Killed and the Time Card Put to Confusion.

What with accidents and storms, the railroad time-cards were turned upside-down yesterday afternoon. The wreck near Missoula put a complete check on traffic between that point and points east, detaining a good many passengers at Garrison. Another smash-up on the Montana Union added to the confusion. Yesterday morning a freight train was wrecked about five miles above Deer Lodge. An axle broke and the rear cars were thrown from the track and badly broken up. Two carloads of horses belonging to the government were thrown into the ditch. Eight of the animals were killed outright and others were badly injured. The morning train going south remained at Deer Lodge till 5 o'clock yesterday afternoon and then went up to meet the north-bound train at the scene of the wreck, where a transfer was made.

Several residents of Anaconda started for Helena at 2:50 o'clock yesterday afternoon. They were in Garrison late last evening and were seeking permission to take the freight train from that point to Helena, thus standing a good chance for a night on the road. The train that leaves this city at 7:15 P. M. to make connection at Stuart did not start out of the depot in Anaconda until 11:30 o'clock last night. It was long past midnight when it pulled back into town again.

IN A HIGH WIND.

Breezes Blowing Down the Canyon and Snow Piling Up in the Streets.

The wind was blowing a gale at 11 o'clock last night and the snow was piled up in drifts wherever the wind could catch it. There was more snow on the streets of town last evening than at any time all last winter. The wind came down the canyon like a young blizzard, yet the cold was by no means intense, the STANDARD's daily record of temperature showing the thermometer at 29 degrees above zero at 8 o'clock last night, at which hour the wind was furious.

But it was a bad enough night to be out, and the streets were deserted during the entire evening. Patrons of a pool and billiards found the Montana an inviting spot and passed the evening there. There was no trade for the merchants and they locked their doors before it was late. The conveyances to Carroll got themselves adjusted to runners and the trip from that suburb to Anaconda was declared to be rough enough by all who ventured it.

Trains Delayed at Missoula.

MISSOULA, Nov. 22.—The wrecked trains on the Northern Pacific east of here are still on the track and no trains have arrived in the last 24 hours from the east. It is probable that the track will not be cleared for traffic before to-morrow morning. No more passengers can be taken last night can be obtained from the scene of the wreck. Both engines in the second wreck were badly smashed. One of them was almost entirely destroyed. The town is full of travelers bound west.

The district court is in session and took up several unimportant civil cases to-day.

MISSOULA, Nov. 22.—The reports of a terrible blizzard in this section is incorrect. There has been but a slight fall of snow.

Two wrecks occurred on the Northern Pacific yesterday, one freight train being wrecked in the yards, and the other in another colliding with a work train. No serious damage was done in either case. One brakeman was slightly injured.

THE BIG STACK DONE

Smoke Seen Curling From its Top Yesterday for the First Time.

Changes at the Smelting Works which Will Soon Carry off Every Vestige of Smoke From the City—The Stack at Carroll Nearly Finished.

The new stack on the hill back of smelters one and two is finished, and smoke floated from its top yesterday morning for the first time. The enormous chimney looks like a sentinel placed on the brow of the rugged mountain to have an eye out over the entire works. At its base, the new stack has a foundation of solid masonry 40 feet square. The chimney rises on this foundation to a height of 140 feet. Its cap is nearly 500 feet above the level of the city at the corner of Main and First street. It is of uniform size from bottom to top, and has an inside diameter of 16 feet.

The flue connecting the works with the stack starts at a point between the two smelters at the upper works, making a gradual climb up the side of the mountain for a distance of 1,400 feet. The flue is 10 feet wide and about 14 feet high, inside measurement. In the construction of the stack alone, nearly 70,000 brick were used.

Yesterday morning smoke rolled out of the new stack in a cloud and was wafted by the prevailing wind for miles across the crest of the range and far across the valley. The connections with the two smelters have not yet been entirely completed. A week or more will be needed for that work, and when that is done not a particle of the disagreeable smoke will lodge over the works. The change will be welcomed by every person whose duty compels him to spend many hours of the day or night on the other side of the creek. The advantage to the city will be very great.

Within ten days the second stack at Carroll will be completed. The work there has been pushed with remarkable speed, as will appear when the reader recalls the fact that the work was not begun until the 21st day of September. Brick and stone are being wrought in a mammoth structure in so short a space of time. With this stack at Carroll completed the Anaconda works will be applied for all time to come with appliances for lifting all the smoke generated at both works and carrying it away in the upper air. A fortune that would gratify all the longings of most mortals is invested in these three enormous stacks. When they are in full operation, work in the Anaconda smelters will be as healthful and agreeable as in any workshop in the world.

GREAT FALLS, Nov. 22.—Details have been received from Lewistown of the accident which befell Senator McNamara on Thursday, November 14. He had taken up a couple of his blooded spring colts and had them stabled in Fort Maginnis. One of the spirited youngsters took flight at something and delivered a vicious kick in Mr. McNamara's side, breaking two ribs and knocking him a distance of eight or 10 feet. Mr. McNamara was soon under the post surgeon's care and is now confined to his bed from the injuries which are very painful.

The Irish-Americans of Sand Colee commended to-night the death of the patriots, Allen, Larkin and O'Brien. Charles Egan made an able speech. A grand ball followed.

Gamblers Arrested at Spokane.

SPOKANE FALLS, Nov. 22.—All gambling games in the city having been closed last night by Sheriff Hincheliffe and deputies, several games of round table stud poker were inaugurated in various gambling houses to-day with a view of evading the order. This evening the sheriff and his deputies made another raid, arresting a large number of persons and closing the game. They will be tried to-morrow.
