THEIR LATEST SCHEME

Special to the Standard. HELENA, Dec. 10.—There is no change in the political situation to-night, though the air is filled with rumors. It is said that the conspirators have arranged with the republican senators to have a democratic senator arrested and brought to the senate chamber at the time of meeting.

The house met this morning at the usual hour. Mr. Conly was in the chair in the absence of Speaker Blakely, who arrived from Gallatin this evening. No business was done. A long caucus was held this afternoon by the democratic representatives.

The republican senators met at 10 and 2 o'clock to-day. Nothing was done, as no quorum was present. Sanders, Washfield and Seligman were about the court house to-day hobnobbing with the senators.

LATE NEWS FROM BUTTE

But Two Aldermen Go to Salt Lake to Inspect the Gaynor System.

Butte, Dec. 10.—Only Aldermen Mulville and Tooley represented the city council in the party that left at 7:00 o'clock to-night for Salt Lake city, to inspect the Gaynor fire alarm system. The rest of the party included Fire Marshal O'Brien, Chief of Fire Brigade Thomas, and H. Whiteacre, the Gaynor agent.

A new and exceedingly fiery kind of liquor has apparently been laid in by saloonkeepers of Butte. A long list of arrests for assault, disturbance and fighting appeared on the police docket to-night. Duncan, a gambler, was fined \$50 and costs for spitting a nut on a head operator with a fero box; D. Blake was fined \$5; Frazier \$5; and Miss Jessie \$5 for disturbance of the peace; H. Galloway was arrested for beating his wife on Mercury street; Joseph Baudert was fined \$15 for disturbance; Frank Johnson for disturbance; James Farley for disturbance; W. H. Johnson for disturbance; and Eugene Tremaine for assault and battery on Sallie Doe, plead not guilty and their cases were set for trial; Gordon & Riethic, for obstructing the sidewalk, plead not guilty.

William Jack and wife returned to-night from their trip east, having visited New York, Philadelphia, Pittsburg and other cities. On reaching this city they were met at the depot by a few personal friends. Governor White returned from Bozeman to-night and left on the evening train. Messrs. Prevost and Massey, proprietors of the burly-house, were arrested again to-night. Since the trial when conducted they have been running as before, except that the door between the saloon and dance-hall has been boarded up, and passage from the two places is by a hall, dancing and drinking has proceeded as usual. The men gave bail.

At 11 o'clock to-night fire broke out in a two-story frame lodging house in the alley between West Park street and Broadway. The house was completely gutted before the fire was under control. It is owned by Nichols & Wilcox, and is damaged to the extent of about \$700 insured. It was owned by Mrs. Miller as a lodging house. Mrs. Miller lost considerable furniture and several lodgers lost the contents of their trunks.

All but one of the boys of the Independent messenger service struck to-night, walking out of the office. The boys demand pay at the first of each month, but manager Zeigler had found by experience that several boys when paid in advance had left him before their money was earned. Mr. Ecker has already filled their places and will carry on business as usual.
