

NORTHWEST NEWS.

Topics of General Interest in the Four New States and Elsewhere.

Tacoma is to build a hotel to eclipse anything on the Northwest Pacific coast. Victoria, B. C., contemplates the erection of a sugar refinery and flouring mill. Seattle will have an elevator to hold 250,000 bushels of grain by the 1st of the New Year.

Six children at play at Portland Sunday found a man's ear on the sidewalk. No owner has been found for it. Six Chinamen who crossed the line at Tia Juana have been arrested. They were well armed and inclined to be ugly.

All the public schools and churches at Heppner, Oregon, have been ordered closed on account of the prevalence of typhoid fever in that town.

Sixty-two sticks of giant powder caught fire and exploded at Portland Tuesday and shook the whole city, but nobody was seriously hurt. The building in which the powder was stored was blown into fragments.

Mrs. H. W. Hunton, the wife of a well-to-do farmer living near Spangle, Wash., was found dead in a smokehouse Monday morning. A towel was tightly wrapped around her throat, and the supposition is that she committed suicide.

A reward of \$10,000 has been offered for the recovery of Emil Frank, the Colfax merchant, who was last seen in Spokane Falls nearly two months ago. The services of an experienced detective have been secured to wipe away the mystery.

The Oregon Pacific railroad track is now laid sixty miles east of Albany, Ore. One thousand men are at work grading the road towards the summit. Only fifteen miles of unfinished work remains between the end of the track and the summit.

The books of City Treasurer Parker, of Seattle, which, upon his retirement from office August 1, were found in most inextricable confusion, and showing an apparent deficit in the funds of \$14,131.46, have at last been straightened out, with the result that the deficit is now reduced to \$10,389.47.

The tracklayers on the Washington & Idaho railroad are now one and a half miles above Osborn, Wash. The grading between Wallace and Mullan is almost entirely completed, but few places remaining to be filled in. The bridge men are working a short distance below Mullan, and if nothing happens the road will be in Mullan on Christmas day.

Samuel A. Linnox, a rancher, while on his way to Olympia, Wash., on Monday was halted by two armed men between that city and Tenino, who demanded his money. After dispossessing him of \$500 in cash and a gold watch and chain valued at \$50, they compelled him to strip off his clothes, which they appropriated, leaving him to go his way entirely divested of clothing.

J. O'Brien, who lately came into the valley from Anaconda to spend the winter on his ranch on the east side, met with a bad accident last Saturday. While out attending the horses one of them kicked him on the leg between the knee and thigh, badly fracturing the bone. Dr. Sanders was called and set the broken member, and now the patient is doing finely. -Inter Lake.

Astoria republicans elected everything at the municipal contest on Wednesday. The city's officers for the ensuing year are: Mayor, M. C. Crosby; councilmen, H. B. Parker and Frederick Wickman; chief of police, W. J. Barry; auditor and police judge, T. S. Jewett; city attorney, C. J. Curtis; city treasurer, J. G. Hustler, street superintendent, N. Clinton; city surveyor, H. B. Thielson; harbor master, Phil Johnson.

A case of second eyesight is reported by the Dayton (Wash.) Inlander: "Grandpa Morris accompanied his sons, W. A. and J. B. Morris, from Spokane Tuesday. The old gentleman says he will spend the balance of his days in Dayton. He is 84 years of age, and we are pleased to learn, is enjoying good health and also his second eyesight. He has laid aside his glasses and now reads with the naked eye."

Contracts have been let for a third bridge across the Willamette river in the city front at Portland: Including approaches, it will be 2,270 feet long, and will have six spans besides a draw span 320 feet long. The bridge is intended to bring the Hawthorne avenue and Woodstock motor lines into the city and will have a roadway for vehicles. Work will begin at once, as the draw must be built during low water and it is expected the structure will be completed by June.

The Walla Walla Union announces C. B. Hopkins has sold his system of telephone lines in Washington to a syndicate of gentlemen from San Francisco, that the papers have been made out and signed, and that the property will be turned over to the purchasers as soon as their company is fully organized and articles of incorporation filed. The sale includes the exchanges at Walla Walla and Colfax, and the long line telephone from here to Spokane Falls, besides the various branches in Whitman county.

The local customs over in Prineville, Ore., are somewhat peculiar, as the following from the News of that town will show: Stealing chickens, turkeys and the like, borrowing wood under cover of darkness, milking other people's cows in the gloaming or elsewhere, as the case may be, is not according to law, but is simply a local custom. 
