SOMETHING WORTH KNOWING.

Johnny Campbell Issues That Quinine is Good for Both Man and Beast.

There are various devices resorted to in these days of every-day racing to enable horses to stand the terrible wear and tear.

"But I haven't malarial fever." "No matter, quinine's good for lots of things besides malaria. You've got a cold, and lots of sickness begins with a cold; quinine will do more for it than anything that I know. It breaks it up."

"But I know it," responded Campbell with some asperity. "I take it whenever anything is the matter with me. It works like a charm. Besides I give it to the horses."

"Certainly in illness accompanied by feverishness." "Ever? No; but when they're well; that is, when they've no sickness, but are stale-like."

"Yes, quinine will keep horses on their feet better than anything I ever tried. Whose horses run more races than mine, and whose win more? The other day I was looking over the 'Guide' and I find mine has won more races than any other stable in the country."

"There's no doubt about it. See how my horses have traveled, too. They run last winter at New Orleans; then they made the circuit up through the south and west; then as far north as St. Paul; then east, and have been running here ever since. They haven't had a let-up, and could win races to-day."

"And all this comes from dosing them with quinine?" "Not dosing exactly, but giving them quinine enough to keep up their strength. Horses that are raced very hard get off their feed, and when they do they lose strength and can't win. Quinine gives them an appetite. It braces 'em up like just as it does a man. Of course you mustn't give them too much, but a little of it is a great thing. I think my horses prove that."
