THE WINDOM SILVER BILL

Text of the Measure Which Will be Introduced This Week. The Secretary of the Treasury Makes Public His Measure Which is Backed Up by the Present Administration.

WASHINGTON, Jan. 20.—The following is the text of the administration bill prepared by Secretary Windom, embodying the silver measure proposed in his annual report, and which will be introduced in the house and senate during the week: A bill authorizing the issue of treasury notes on deposits of bullion.

Section 1. Be it enacted, That any owner of silver bullion, product of mines of the United States, or of ores smelted or refined in the United States, may deposit the same at any assay office in the United States, and receive therefor treasury notes hereinafter provided for equal at the date of deposit of the net value of such silver at the market price, such price to be determined by the secretary of the treasury under the rules and regulations prescribed, based upon the prices current in the leading silver markets of the world; but no deposit consisting in whole or in part of silver bullion or foreign silver coins imported into this country, or bars resulting from being melted, or refined silver coins shall be received under the provisions of this act.

Section 2. That the secretary of the treasury shall cause to be prepared treasury notes in such amount as may be required for the purpose of the absorption of such silver, and such notes shall be of a denomination less than one dollar or more than one thousand dollars.

Section 3. That notes issued under this act shall be receivable for customs, taxes and all public debts and when received under the treasury may be re-issued, and such notes when held by any national banking association shall be counted a part of its lawful reserves.

Section 4. That the notes issued under the provisions of this act shall be redeemed in silver at the option of the United States, or at an office of an assistant treasurer of the United States by the sum of dollars stated thereon at the market price of silver, to be determined as provided in section 1, or such notes may be redeemed in gold coin at the option of the holder, and the amount of gold coin demanded of the holder such notes shall be redeemed in silver dollars.

Section 5. That when the market price of silver as determined by the secretary of the treasury shall exceed one dollar for 371.25 grains of pure silver, it shall be the duty of the secretary of the treasury to refuse to receive deposits of silver bullion for the purpose of this act.

Section 6. That it shall be lawful for the secretary of the treasury, with the approval of the president of the United States, to suspend the operation of this act when he is satisfied that through combinations or speculative manipulations the price of silver bullion is arbitrary, nominal or fictitious.

Section 7. That silver bullion deposited under this act, represented by treasury notes, shall be stored in the vaults of the United States, and may be coined into standard silver dollars, or any other denomination of silver coin not authorized under the provisions of this act, and the same may be used in the redemption of the notes.

Section 8. That so much of the act of February 28, 1878, entitled "An act to authorize the coinage of standard silver dollars, and to restore its legal tender character," as requires the monthly purchase and coinage into silver dollars of not less than \$2,000,000 more than \$2,000,000 worth of silver bullion, is hereby repealed.

Section 9. That any gain or shrinkage arising from coinage which may be executed under the provisions of this act shall be accounted for and paid into the treasury as provided by the existing law.

Section 10. That silver bullion received under the provisions of this act shall be subject to the requirements of the existing law and regulations of the mint service, governing the method of its receipt and determining the amount of pure silver contained and the amount of the charges or deductions, if any to be made.

Section 11. That nothing in this act shall be construed to prevent the purchase from time to time, as may be required of silver bullion, for subsidiary silver coinage.

Section 12. That a sum sufficient to carry out the provisions of this act shall be appropriated out of any money in the treasury not otherwise appropriated.

Section 13. That this act shall take effect 30 days from and after its passage.

Hearing on the silver question. WASHINGTON, Jan. 20.—To-day had been set apart by the house committee on coinage, weights and measures to hear arguments from members of congress who have introduced bills providing for the free coinage of silver. No one appeared to speak, however, and the committee thereupon fixed Monday next as the time when it will give an audience to any persons desiring to be heard upon the silver question in general.

To Close the Coal Mines. READING, Jan. 20.—Philadelphia and leading officials say that unless there is a decided improvement in the coal trade every colliery owned by the company, as well as those by individual operators, will close down. Over one-third of all the collieries are closed, and the rest are barely. These employ about 8,000 men. The officials say that of 20,000 coal cars in the service, 11,000, all loaded, are now lying along the company's lines.

The Jury Disagreed. LONDON, Jan. 21.—The jury in the case of Claude Marks and Sidney Wolfe, joint proprietors of the Mining Record, and Mr. Mart, of the Financial Times, who were charged with blackmail in relation to the obtaining money for the suppression of articles affecting the Gold mining company, have disagreed and been discharged.

HE GOT HIS BRIDE.

A Nebraska Sutor Badly Disfigured but Still in the Ring. WATERLOO, Ia., Jan. 20.—A romantic runaway wedding with interesting developments occurred last night at Nashua, a small town 30 miles north of Waterloo, on a branch of the Illinois Central. A bright, well-to-do young business man named Andrews, residing at St. Paul, Neb., returned to Nashua after several years' absence to claim his bride in the person of the only daughter of Mr. William Waite, a wealthy citizen of Nashua. Waite has always objected to the proposed union of his daughter to young Andrews chiefly because the latter was poor. When, therefore, the young man arrived in Nashua he was speedily singled out by Waite and his two stalwart sons, who demanded that Andrews give up the girl. He refused and they gave him a terrible pounding. They would doubtless have killed him had not bystanders interfered. Andrews had breath enough left in him to promise to leave town and get aboard the first train going south. He stopped at the first station, returned to Nashua in a covered carriage and sent word by a friend to his fiancée, who joined him at his hotel. A justice was summoned and the marriage was consummated. They took the evening train south and a large concourse of admiring friends assembled at the depot to see them safely on their journey. The father was dumbfounded when he heard of the wedding, but the verdict of the brothers is not known, as they returned to Nashua after their assault on Andrews, leaving word with the old gentleman to telephone them in the event of Andrews' return. The brothers' sympathies are said to be with the daughter.

MR. HOWELL'S SERMON.

A Spokane Falls Newspaper Applies It to That City. Commenting editorially upon the sermon of Rev. Mr. Howell of Butte, which was reported in the Standard of Tuesday the Spokane Falls Review says: "That was a bold manly sermon that Rev. Howell, of Butte, preached last Sunday in rebuke of the terrible conditions that have recently resulted in an epidemic of defecation and suicide in that city. The experience there is sufficient answer to the plea advanced by some in this city, that open, uncontrolled gambling is a lesser evil than the 'hidden cancer,' as they call it. As well might one declare that a loathsome ulcer appearing upon a man's face than when concealed by his raiment. 'Many young men have come here pure,' said Rev. Howell, 'their souls are being lost. The city is debauching its own sons. The maelstrom of sin is destroying its young men.'"

Words like that are what ought to fall from every pulpit in this city. How refreshing they are in comparison with much of the dry rot that many ministers delight to foist upon their long suffering congregations. They are words that carry conviction and compel the respect even of the hosts against which they are hurled. There ought to be even a wider ringing in this city. Too many people are still blind to their own interests. The sunnolence of gold is afloat in the air and the sooner it is dispelled the better for the city. It is a disgrace that our sons and daughters are to possess this fair city when this hungry horde of petty thieves and gamblers shall have scattered like the withered leaves of the forest."

Butte Mining Notes. BY THE STANDARD'S SPECIAL WRITER. BUTTE, Jan. 20.—W. A. Sparkman and J. A. Brent will leave to-morrow for the east with their satchels full of Keystone mining stock. There has been a rich strike made in the Keystone and in consequence the stock has jumped from 20 to 50 cents, where it will remain. All stock has been taken off the Montana boards and the sales will be manipulated in the east.

The Muldoon made a contract with its foreman recently to sink another 100 feet. About 40 of the second 100 has now been sunk and signs are reported very favorable. All the stockholders are sanguine of a good strike soon.

Mr. Hoyer, the expert sent by the Montana Mica company to investigate the company's mine, is in the Beaverhead returned yesterday. He reports adversely to the plan for pushing the mine. The tunnel has been sunk in the wrong place and there is to be no money in the scheme as it stands.

Assays were made to-day of the strike in the Gleggery on Saturday. The assay shows two-fifths less than 900 ounces of silver and an ounce of gold.

FOREIGN NOTES.

LONDON, Jan. 6.—H. M. S. Malabar has been much damaged, having been aground. She has arrived at Cadix.

ZANZIBAR, Jan. 20.—Emin Pasha is suffering from an abscess on the exterior of the skull, which has caused partial paralysis of the tongue.

BERLIN, Jan. 20.—Ludwig von Rust who was a member of the Peters expedition, has arrived here. He appears convinced that Peters is dead.

ROME, Jan. 20.—Commentatore Baldacchini, a prominent lawyer, who for 9 years, has been secretary of a wealthy charitable organization, has absconded. His defalcation amounts to \$25,000.

LONDON, Jan. 20.—The protest against the British ultimatum is displayed on the tables in the public squares here and has been signed by many persons. A meeting was called for to-day in 'cavens' square to protest against the action of the British government. Africa will submit to Lord Salisbury's full demands under protest while at the same time it will try to conciliate Portuguese public opinion.

BRUSSELS, Jan. 20.—The infantry was confined to the barracks yesterday in readiness for any emergency in connection with the trouble. A squadron of cavalry has gone to Charleroi, where the miners are arming themselves with axes and other implements and assuming threatening attitudes.

LONDON, Jan. 19.—A terrific gale accompanied by blinding snow prevailed to-day on the Irish sea. Much damage was done to property along the coast. Several persons were killed by lightning and a number were injured. The gale in the English channel continues and shipping has suffered severely. The National line steamer Greenock, from New York, arrived for London, passed lower this morning with a heavy sea to starboard and nearly submerged on the starboard side. Her cargo had apparently shifted.
