ALL THREE IN JAIL.

The Men Charged With the Donelson
Robbery Wounded in the Courts.

BUTTE, May 7.—Jack Salmon, arrested
for robbing the jewelry store of J. M.
Donelson was arraigned for preliminary
examination before Judge Eddy, this
afternoon. He waived examination and
was bound over in the sum of \$3,000 to
appear before the district court. Gus Kelly
arrested for complicity in the same crime
was also arraigned and pleaded not
guilty. He is very anxious to have an
examination, saying that he can readily es-
tablish his innocence at the preliminary
hearing. His case was set for 10 o'clock
Friday morning.

There is still another man under arrest
for having a hand in the robbery. He is
J. Poleski, who was arrested at Helena
the same day that Salmon was "pinched"
at Ogden and brought to Butte for exami-
nation. Through his attorney he made
application to the supreme court for a
writ of habeas corpus on the ground of
having been kept in custody beyond the
time allotted by law before being given
a hearing. Accordingly an order was
issued by Chief Justice Blake directing
Sheriff Sullivan to appear in court and
show cause why Poleski should not be re-
leased. Yesterday morning the sheriff
took the prisoner to Helena in obedience
to the order. The motion was heard this
morning and denied and Poleski remains
for examination. Mr. Sullivan and his
prisoner returned this evening. Poleski
will probably be examined to-morrow.

FIRE IN A FOUNDRY.
About \$1,000 Worth of Property Burned at
the Western Iron Works.

BUTTE, May 7.—At a few minutes after
4 o'clock this morning fire was discovered
in the Western Iron Works in East Park
street. The fire was in the pattern room,
and had gained much headway before the
firemen arrived. Further delay was
caused after the hose was attached. A
gravel stopped up the nozzle, and another
hose had to be substituted. That hose
burst, and it was not until a third line of
hose was attached that progress was
made toward extinguishing the fire. The
destruction was confined to the pattern
room, and the fire was extinguished soon
after the firemen got to work.

It is supposed that the fire started be-
tween the foundry and pattern room,
spreading to the pattern room. It is sup-
posed to have started from hot castings
thrown out from the foundry last
evening and communicating with shavings
and timbers placed between the
foundry and pattern room. The entire
damage by the fire it is thought will not
exceed \$1,000 and this is covered by insur-
ance in all cases except in the losses of
the pattern makers, whose tools were in
the pattern room. The loss to stock and
machinery owned by the Western Iron
Works, is covered by insurance as is that
to the building, owned by Shelly Tuttle.

A WASHOUT ON THE U. & N.
Snake River on the Rampage—Trains De-
layed.

BUTTE, May 7.—Reports from down the
line of the Utah & Northern announce
that Snake river is unusually high and
overflowing its banks in many places.
Considerable damage has already been
done to ranches along the stream,
and unless the flow of water soon sub-
sides the loss, it is feared, will be quite
heavy. So far the Utah & Northern Rail-
road company's track a short distance be-
low Eagle has been washed out for about
half a mile, and in account of the washout
it was found necessary to order the aban-
don all through trains until such time as
the break can be repaired; in consequence
no train left here this evening for the south.
The local for Pocatello left this afternoon
on time, and will run as far as the break
at that time, thus delaying passengers and
express and return north.

The Bostonians, who were expected to
arrive from Ogden this afternoon, are on
the south side of the washout, and will
have to wait until transferred to the local
train, thus delaying their arrival here un-
til some time to-morrow.

BUTTE, May 7.—The first regular elec-
tion of the Milwaukee Mining and Smelt-
ing company was held last night at the
office of Curtis & Majors. The officers

H. Curtis called the meeting to order and
was elected temporary superintendent. The
committee appointed for that purpose
submitted a constitution and by-
laws which were adopted after which di-
rectors were elected as follows: J. R. Clark, J. R. Boyce, Jr.,
J. H. Curtis, P. A. Larget, T. H. Klein-
schmidt, W. H. Nichols and J. A. Talbot.
The directors then met and elected the
following officers: President J. A. Talbot;
vice president J. R. Boyce, Jr., secretary
F. P. Gabel, treasurer Green Majors.

The secretary was instructed to have
stock certificates printed at once, which
will be issued as soon as possible.
