The Gloves Were Too Large. There was a scientific glove contest between George La Blanche, the Marine, and Billy Smith, the Australian middle-weight champion, in the National theater, Tacoma, Tuesday night. From start to close both men fought with viciousness, but the gloves were too large to admit of punishment.

Throwing the Lacrosse Ball. In Toronto, Ont., recently, in the competitions for lacrosse and base ball players, the following records were made: Throwing base ball—J. Downs, Park nine, 105 feet 4 inches; Fitten, 2. Throwing lacrosse ball, for distance—H. Adams, Cornwall, 431 feet. When the ball was delivered Adams' front foot was at least a yard behind the scratch line, so that his actual throw was about 434 feet.

Dempsey and La Blanche. From letters received in San Francisco from La Blanche it seems that he has made up his mind to fight Dempsey again. If he sticks to this determination Dempsey's next appearance will doubtless be with the Marine, as he would much

rather fight him than Fitzsimmons or any other middle weight.

Death of a Noted Sprinter. Archie McComb, a noted sprinter, died in San Francisco September 24 from an attack of pneumonia. His death created surprise in local sporting circles. He was ill only one week.
